Biden Declares June LGBTQ Pride Month Amid 'Unconscionable Attacks'

The president condemned a recent slew of "dangerous" anti-LGBTQ state laws and bills, which he said have negatively affected LGBTQ youths' mental health.

President Joe Biden declared June LGBTQ Pride Month while calling attention to "unconscionable attacks" on the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer and intersex community.

"I often say that America can be defined by one word: possibilities," Biden wrote in a presidential proclamation released Tuesday, May 31, 2022, the eve of Pride Month. "This month, we celebrate generations of LGBTQI+ people who have fought to make the possibilities of our Nation real for every American."

Biden said his administration sees LGBTQ people "for who you are — deserving of dignity, respect, and support."

He condemned the recent slew of bills targeting LGBTQ people's rights considered by state legislatures nationwide. The annual number has skyrocketed in recent years. In 2018, 41 anti-LGBTQ bills were filed in state legislatures, compared to 238 in just the first three months of this year, according to an NBC News analysis conducted in March. As of May, more than 320 anti-LGBTQ bills have been introduced, according to the Human Rights Campaign.

Most of the bills target transgender youth, either by restricting their participation in school sports or limiting their access to certain gender-affirming medical care. So far, 17 states have banned transgender students from participating on school sports teams that align with their gender identities, and three states have enacted measures that ban or restrict access to some transition-related care.

Some of the other legislation, such as a measure recently enacted in Florida, limits classroom discussion of LGBTQ topics, leading critics to call Florida's measure the "Don't Say Gay or Trans" bill.



Biden called the bills "unconscionable attacks" that have left "LGBTQI+ families in fear and pain."

"All of this compounded has been especially difficult on LGBTQI+ youth, 45 percent of whom seriously considered attempting suicide in the last year — a devastating reality that our Nation must work urgently to address," he said, citing research conducted by The Trevor Project, an LGBTQ youth suicide prevention and crisis intervention organization.

He also spoke directly to trans youth, as he has in his past two State of the Union addresses: "I will always have your back as your President so that you can be yourself and reach your God-given potential."

Biden noted some of the actions his administration has taken to advance LGBTQ equality, including an executive order he issued on the first day of his presidency to expand nondiscrimination protections for LGBTQ people under federal laws such as the Fair Housing Act. He also issued an executive order reversing the ban on transgender people enlisting and openly serving in



the military.

In April, the administration added a gender-neutral "X" option for the gender marker on U.S. passport books, and it is in the midst of changing airport security processes to make them safer for trans travelers.

But Biden said Tuesday that "there is more work to be done." He called on Congress to pass the Equality Act, which would create the first federal protections from discrimination for LGBTQ people in employment, housing, jury duty and more.

"This month, we honor the resilience of LGBTQI+ people, who are fighting to live authentically and freely," he said. "We reaffirm our belief that LGBTQI+ rights are human rights. And we recommit to delivering protections, safety, and equality to LGBTQI+ families so that everyone can realize the full promise of America."

THE EVENTS AND PEOPLE THAT ARE SHAPING LGBTQ+ MILWAUKEE

The Fight For Queer Rights Continues

The first time I went to the Stone-wall Inn, I couldn't even sit inside. COVID-19 was still raging and the bar was organized like a restaurant — every party to their own socially distanced table outside in the cool night.

As we sipped our drinks and huddled for warmth, I marveled at how casually my partner and I sat on the street in New York City where the queer-rights movement began in a fiery riot.

In June 1969, the police attempted to raid the Stonewall and arrest the patrons. Rather than submit again, the people of Stonewall fought back. Led by trans and queer people of color, protests ensued and people declared that they'd had enough. They would not tolerate being arrested for their sexuality and gender expression. They were done living lives of quiet desperation.

I watched as people walked into the impromptu courtyard outside of Stonewall, masks secured while showing their vaccine cards. It struck me that this was not our first pandemic, not for the queer community. In the early 1980s, a mysterious new disease began wreaking havoc among gay men.

With no treatment and the government refusing to acknowledge its impact, our people watched friends decline and pass away. For many who had been disowned after coming out, this was their only family. It was a dark and painful era for our community, one that lives on in empty seats beside our older generation.

In the age of marriage equality and "RuPaul's Drag Race," it is tempting to



think that those days are past. Historical trauma, however, casts a long shadow. The queer identity is unique because this inherited trauma is not passed from families of origin. Instead, people join this community through shared experiences, including rejection and shame.

We still fight legal battles for nondiscrimination and trans rights. Violence against queer people, especially trans women of color, is still common. Medications can treat HIV and prevent transmission, but there is still stigma against those living with HIV.

We feel the fury of Stonewall anew when politicians belittle us and when our relationships are voted on or debated before a judge. At its worst, Stonewall echoes in new acts of hatred such as Orlando's Pulse Nightclub shooting. This time not a raid, but a massacre.

It is no surprise that queer people are overrepresented in mental health care. We are more likely to struggle with anxiety and depression, to abuse substances and have higher rates of suicidality. It is critical that each of us prioritizes our mental health and seek help on our own healing journey.


True to history, though, we are resilient. This month we again take to the streets, not in protest but in celebration. Where once we remained hidden, finding refuge only in darkened bars, we now fill the streets in brilliant rainbows for all to see. Where once we did not belong, we now wrap arms around anyone who will join us.

Pride offers a strong antidote to the shame of personal and historical trauma. Shame withers in the daylight, and Pride invites us all to step into the sun. To be seen is vulnerable, especially when we've been hurt before, so Pride is also an invitation to courage.

As we left Stonewall into the damp New York night, I felt a deep sense of reverence for that small bar. I choked back emotion as I thought about the queer people who fought on that street so that I could feel safe holding my partner's hand. The pains of previous generations live with us, but we also inherit their courage, resilience and determination.

The fight for queer rights continues. We still need greater access to mental health care, legislation protecting the rights of gay and trans people and racial equity in our legal and social institutions. This Pride season, may we all find the courage to stand up for one another and to seek out the help we need to live proud.

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

Educational Mobile App With Walking Tours About Milwaukee's LGBTQ+ History Debuts At Pridefest

While "Don't Say Gay" legislation continues to circulate in 16 states, a group of local activists, educators and historians have taken action to connect Wisconsin with its diverse LGBTQ heritage.

LGBT MilWALKee, a mobile app offering guided, interactive, and multimedia walking tours through generations of local LGBTQ history, will launch in June to celebrate National LGBTQ Pride Month.

"Our history has been one of erasure," said Dr. Brice Smith, project director. "It's not taught in schools. It's not passed down between generations. It's not visible in our cityscape. In 2022, there are still no historical markers in Milwaukee about LGBTQ events. There are no memorials to any LGBTQ people."

Thanks to generous financial support, the LGBT MilWALKee project already achieved its first round of fundraising goals. It has received over \$28,000 through donations, corporate sponsorships. LGBTQ philanthropists, business allies, and everyday citizens who value of history and the Milwaukee's LGBTQ community."

"No more," said Dr. Smith. "This app will reveal the spaces we claimed, the roles we played, the lives we led, the love we spread throughout the city we call home. It will help us all rethink how we walk through life. We are deeply grateful for everyone believing in us and making this app experience possible for the public."

After downloading the app, users will have their choice of multiple, self-guided walking tours with unique location markers. Each location will include a



present-day photo of the site, as well as a 2-3 minute narrated video sharing the site's LGBTQ story. These mini-documentaries will provide a rich multimedia experience that can be enjoyed time and again.

More than 100 potential sites have been identified for the project. The app will launch with the first five tours and 50 locations in June. Of special interest is the tour site at 400 N. Plankinton Avenue created for the Black Nite, scene of Wisconsin's first LGBTQ uprising in 1961, later known as "Wisconsin's Stonewall."

"Tour locations will reflect not only the diversity of who we are, but also the diversity of when, where and how we've left our mark," said Dr. Smith. "We're telling stories. It's not like cracking open a history textbook and reading a bunch of words about boring facts."

For years, Dr. Smith has researched local LGBTQ history through the Milwaukee Transgender Oral History Project and extensive research on trans pioneer Lou Sullivan.

"We're using sites to tell the stories of the LGBTQ people, organizations and events that transformed and transfixed our beloved city," said Dr. Smith. "We're doing it in a way that feels like sitting with a friend at a bar, or going through an old photo album with your aunt or uncle, or looking in the mirror and liking what you see. And it is LGBTQ Milwaukee through and through."

For the project, Dr. Smith assembled a team of talent to help bring his vision to life. Members included Ashley Altadonna, videographer and filmmaker, proprietor of Tall Lady Productions; Michail Takach, historian, author and curator of Wisconsin LGBTQ History Project; Aimee Gironimi, narrator and voiceover actor; proprietor of Wise Owl Productions; Robert McCarthy, CEO of Accurate Web Solutions and regional ambassador for the Wisconsin LGBT Chamber of Commerce.

LGBT MilWALKee has also been working closely with established community resources, including the Milwaukee County Historical Society,



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
Tickets, Full Lineup, & More at Summerfest.com Milwaukee Public Library, UWM Archives, and the Wisconsin LGBTQ History Project, to bring this history to life.

"I'm hopeful that our successful launch will lead to more funding, so we can pursue even more compelling and vital stories such as these," said Dr. Smith. "I look forward to working with community elders, leaders and icons, like Janice Colby, to document and preserve what has always been an oral history within a closed community. Together, we can save their stories for future generations to know."

LGBT MilWALKee will make its PrideFest debut on June 3 at the Stonewall Stage. In addition, Dr. Smith and team will showcase the app at their Health and Wellness table from June 2 to June 4.

"Recent political events have only motivated our team to do more," added Dr. Smith. "The idea that LGBTQ history might be erased, censored, or filtered through a conservative view of what is and is not appropriate history is deeply disturbing. This approach isolated, separated and demoralized our LGBTQ ancestors specifically to keep them in line. No more. The LGBT MilWALKee app is a lifeline to generations of history and heritage, right in the palm of your hand. We are telling our own stories, by LGBTQ people for LGBTQ people. We are here to be a lifeline."

On June 2-4, 2022, Milwaukee's PrideFest made its return to the Henry Maier Festival Park. According to Milwaukee Pride, 38,731 people greeted the annual festival's return after a two year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic. That is a new three-day record for the event, breaking 2017's previous title-holding three-day total of 37,682. The event featured more than 300 performers, from DJs to drag queens and more, across the PrideFest's five stages – with at least 90 percent of those in the spotlight based in Wisconsin.
