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Bans on the LGBTQ pride flag spark a debate about inclusion and civil rights

LGBTQ advocates are increasingly concerned as municipalities and school districts across the country take action to ban the display of the Rainbow Pride flag on public property and in classrooms.

Some say the moves reflect a broader wave of GOP-supported reforms and policy efforts that include book bans, changes to school curriculum, attacks on preferred pronoun use and restrictions on reproductive rights.

"We are in the midst of an avalanche of anti-trans and anti-LGBTQ legislation," said Dara Adkison, board secretary of TransOhio, a transgender equality organization in Columbus. "You're playing this numbers game, what can we squeak through?"

A rainbow pride flag will be raised at the Capitol in Madison, Wisconsin in June 2022. School board members in the state's Kettle Moraine District approved a policy prohibiting teachers and staff from displaying gay pride flags and other items that district officials deem to be political in nature.

Such restrictions have been approved in Delaware, Ohio and Cold Spring, New York, and in school districts from Davis County, Utah to Wales, Wisconsin.



In Green Bay, Wisconsin, an attempt to advance a similar citywide measure was narrowly defeated earlier this month.

And in Florida, Republican Rep. David Borrero introduced a bill that would similarly restrict flag displays at all state and public school buildings statewide.

How do these measures ban Pride Flags?

The municipal measures banning rainbow flags are not specifically identified as such. Presented as a way to avoid favoring one group over another, they limit flag display to government and military flags – but the effect is the same.

In the Ohio, Delaware measure, in May 2022, city manager Thomas Homan notified flag and banner applicants that the city is suspending its program for review, in light of a decision by the U.S. Supreme Court this month that ruled that city officials Boston violated the freedom of a Christian group to speak when they turned down a request for a Christian flag to be raised over City Hall. Delaware's program allowed organizations to request that their flags be displayed on street poles around the city.

"While it is unfortunate for our local nonprofits to use the ban-

ner and flag program to support cultural and community events, it is sensible and prudent to take this step to protect our city's interests," he wrote.

The story goes on

A city spokesman told *USA Today* the review is ongoing.

On March 7, members of the Huntington Beach, California city council are scheduled to take their final vote on a similar measure.

At the council meeting earlier this week, board member Dan Kalmick criticized the proposal as cloaked in language that betrayed his true intentions.

"This is a poor and cowardly regulation worded in 'equality," Kalmick said. "It is of course a ban on the city from flying the Pride flag. Call it what it is... If it runs like a ban and quacks like a ban, it's a ban."

Two previous Council votes have favored Regulation 4-3. The proposed measure notes that businesses and individuals can continue to fly flags of their choice on private property.

Last week, Debbie Chang, president and CEO of the private foundation funded by the nonprofit Blue Shield of California health plan, informed Huntington Beach officials that the group canceled plans to conduct a two-day retreat for trustees and executives in light of the situation in the city in June.

"We have decided that until the uncertainty of this situation is resolved, we can no longer in good conscience meet in your city," Chang wrote in a letter on Friday.

Given the high rates of health injustice and domestic violence in the LGBTQ community, she said, the city's move to ban the Pride flag puts "a vulnerable population at risk of further harm."

In response, Huntington Beach Councilor Casey McKeon said at this week's meeting: "I don't know why they are trying to blackmail us economically when we design our government flag policy to only fly government flags that represent everyone equally. "

Why is the rainbow flag important?

Gilbert Baker, a Kansas-born artist who spent much of his life in San Francisco, created the iconic six-striped rainbow flag in 1978 at the behest of LGBTQ activist and lawmaker Harvey Milk, according to the New York-based Gilbert Baker Foundation. He died in 2017.

The symbol has since become an icon of LGBTQ inclusion.

"It's that ancient visibility of knowing where you're welcome," said Adkison of TransOhio. "The Pride flag is an easy way to know you have some allies there."

Peg Corley, executive director of LGBTQ Center OC, based in Santa Ana, Calif., said Huntington Beach council members sent "a very loud message" by considering the measure.

The rainbow flag "is the most diverse symbol we have," Corley said. "Literally every walk of life is represented in the LGBTQ community, so let's say we're not going to fly a symbol of diversity and inclusion — that's the message they're sending."

How is the LGBTQ community reacting?

The Gilbert Baker Foundation, the New York-based organization named after the flag's creator, launched a "Save the Rainbow Flag" campaign on Friday with instructions for local community officials on how to mobilize and letter-writing, as well as an open letter from the ACLU with legal Arguments against flag restrictions.

"Make no mistake – right wing groups want to push back on LGBTQ+ rights and they are beginning to ban the rainbow flag," Charley Beal, the foundation's president, said in a press release.

Some of those bans have already been reversed — for example, in Newberg, Oregon, school board members last month reversed a controversial 2021 measure banning political signage, which included the rainbow flag, after the measure was challenged by the ACLU.

But, according to Beal, "each month brings with it a new threat to LGBTQ+ rights and equality. It's time to stop the haters."

Corley, whose organization was asked to participate in public rainbow flag raisings as Orange County communities kicked off Pride Month celebrations in recent years, said she expects more businesses to pull out of Huntington Beach should the ban go Remain in force.

"We are people, not a political agenda," she said.

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Wis. School District Bans First Graders From Singing Cyrus-Parton Duet 'Rainbowland' At Concert

The Waukesha School District said the "song could be deemed controversial." The school instead suggested the class sing "Rainbow Connection," from "The Muppet Movie."

A Wisconsin school district has banned a first grade class from singing Miley Cyrus and Dolly Parton's duet *"Rainbowland"* because it was deemed *"controversial"* and conflicting with school policy.

Melissa Tempel, a teacher at Heyer Elementary School in Waukesha, tweeted March 21 that her first graders were "so excited" to sing "*Rainbowland*" for a spring concert but that administrators vetoed it.

The 2017 song talks about working together and living in harmony, with lyrics like "Cause I know if we try, we could really make a difference in this world" and "Living in a Rainbowland ... Where we're free to be exactly who we are / Let's all dig down deep inside / Brush the judgment and fear aside."

Venting her frustration over being barred from using the song, Tempel tweeted, "When will it end?"

The Waukesha School District said in a statement Friday that there's an approval process for instances like these.

In this case, a teacher suggested "*Rainbowland*" to the music teacher, who checked with the principal, who checked with the central office administrator, "so they could review the song together and alongside our Board Policy 2240 — Controversial Issues in the Classroom." The district policy describes what determines whether a topic is controversial and says such matters must be approved by the principal.



"They determined that the song could be deemed controversial in accordance with the policy," the district said.

In 2017, Parton told Taste of Country the song was about inspiring hope and positivity.

"It's really about if we could love one another a little better or be a little kinder, be a little sweeter, we could live in rainbow land," Parton said. "It's really just about dreaming and hoping that we could all do better. It's a good song for the times right now."

In the end, the principal asked the music teacher to choose a different song, and "Rainbow Connection" by Kermit the Frog was selected.

Tempel said on Twitter that officials later turned their backs against the class' singing "*Rainbow Connection*," from "*The Muppet Movie*," which led her to suspect there was an issue with the use of rainbows. The class ultimately stuck with "*Rainbow Connection*" after "parents sent emails to admin," Tempel said. Tempel said the controversy over the song was much bigger than her class-room.

"The *Rainbowland* story is about much more than a banned song. The result of the political pushback on LGBTQ+ inclusivity and rights in schools is unfolding and it's tragic," she tweeted.

The district didn't elaborate on why "*Rainbowland*" was so controversial to begin with.

"This entire matter has been reviewed and the outcomes are fully supported by the Superintendent. At no time was the Board of Education involved in this matter," the district said.

Tempel tweeted Friday: "The latest I heard is that the song was banned bc @MileyCyrus is controversial. D'oh, I thought for sure it was @DollyParton and her beautiful drag queen followers! Oh well, I can't stop my students if they still sing Rainbowland. It's a fun, catchy song!"

The incident is the latest political showdown in school boards and classrooms across the country, which have hosted intense debates over how sexuality, gender identity and race are taught. District Superintendent James Sebert had prohibited rainbows and pride flags from being displayed in Waukesha classrooms, *The Associated Press* reported.

THE EVENTS AND PEOPLE THAT ARE SHAPING LGBTQ+ MILWAUKEE

Honoring LGBTQ Leaders for Women's History Month

This Women's History Month, we have chosen to honor some of the innumerable LGBTQ women, non-binary people, and femmes who have impacted the world throughout history. Our community is powerful, and each person has their own remarkable part to play. We celebrate them this month, and all year long: those who came before us, or are making history right now. At GLAD we remain committed to uplifting these voices and building a world that celebrates them unreservedly.



Marsha P. Johnson

Marsha P. Johnson (August 24, 1945 - July 6, 1992) was an outspoken gay liberation activist and self-identified drag queen. Along with her close friend Sylvia Rivera, she was one of the key people involved in the 1969 Stonewall uprising. Stories differ on whether she threw a brick or threw a shot glass, but she became a symbol involved with the event to this day. A popular member of the New York Art scene, she worked with Andy Warhol and as a drag performer. After working in the Gay Liberation Front, Marsha co-founded Street Transvestites Action Revolutionaries (S.T.A.R.). She worked with STAR for years, founding the STAR House, a

shelter for gender-nonconforming and transgender youth. She moved specifically into AIDS-related activism in the 1980s, working with groups like ACT UP.

Marsha was a cornerstone of the queer community in New York and beyond until she died in July of 1992. Her death was originally ruled a suicide, but after extensive pressure from her close friends and family, advocacy groups, and fellow activists, it was reopened as a possible homicide. Since her passing, she remains one of the most wellknown figures in the queer community. Her story, recently memorialized in the documentary "The Death and Life of Marsha P. Johnson," inspired many activists and LGBTQ people today to fight for what they believe in. In her memory, the Marsha P. Johnson Foundation fights for the equality and rights of Black transgender individuals.



Pragati Singh

Pragati Singh is an activist and one of the preeminent leaders of the asexual rights movement in India. She began her career as a maternal health doctor, when she discovered that there were no online communities for anyone on the asexual spectrum in India. She created Indian Aces, a group designed to help foster community and support. Dr. Singh also conducted research to identify the unique challenges and hopes of India's asexual community. She was able to push against a rigid medical establishment to get her research published, helping to raise awareness of people on the ace spectrum in both the medical field and the country at large. Her groundbreaking work enabled her to present at international conferences and was chosen to be one of the BBC's 100 Women of the Year in 2019. She continues to work to provide a space and a voice for the ace community in India.



Christine Jorgenson

Christine Jorgenson (May 30, 1926 -May 3, 1989) was the first person in the United States widely known to have received gender-confirming surgery. The Bronx native and World War II veteran received medical care in Denmark in 1952 and immediately became a media sensation. Christine originally intended to live a private life but realized she had a platform to speak up. She became a performer, went on talk shows and radio shows, and wrote her autobiography. From the '60s to the '80s, she toured college campuses and other venues to speak about issues of transgender rights. Christine passed away in 1989 from

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cancer, but her legacy helped change the way people thought about LGBTQ people. Her fame brought about visibility at a time when there were very few people living openly as transgender and shaped the national discussion on gender identity.



Tammy Baldwin

Tammy Baldwin was the first openly gay person to be elected to both chambers of Congress. Baldwin has been an advocate for LGBTQ rights, access to healthcare, and student debt relief. She introduced the Ending LGBT Health Disparities Act which sought to fund research and cultural competence for LGBTQ healthcare. She has regularly fought for these issues, including supporting the upcoming Equality Act, which would close many gaps in nondiscrimination protections for LGBTQ individuals, women, people of color, and people of minority faiths.



Brenda Howard

Brenda Howard (December 24, 1946 – June 28, 2005) was heavily involved in planning the first Pride event in 1970 after coordinating rallies to commemorate the 1-month, 1-year, and subsequent anniversaries of the Stonewall Rebellion of 1969. Known by some as "Mother of Pride," Brenda is widely credited with coming up with the modern idea of the week-long pride event that we see celebrated internationally. Initially active in the feminist and antiwar movements, in 1987 she turned more towards bisexual-specific organizing with organizations like BiNet USA and the New York Area Bisexual Network. She helped plan dozens of marches and brought issues of bisexual representation to the forefront in the queer community, and worked for kink and polyamory visibility. Sadly, she passed away from cancer in 2005, but her legacy lives on Pride celebrations worldwide.



Kim Coco Iwamoto

Kim Coco Iwamoto is a politician from Hawaii. From both her lived experience as a transgender individual and her grandparents' experience as survivors of Japanese internment in California, she grew up no stranger to the pressing need to protect all people's rights. To this end, she served on the Hawaii Board of Education, and later on the Hawaii Civil Rights Commission. This made Kim the first openly transgender person elected to statewide office in the country. She ran both for Lieutenant Governor and State Representative, only narrowly losing both races. Kim continues to push the boundaries for the Asian-American LGBTQ community and fights to represent all people's interests in her work, including leading advocacy efforts for LGBTQ youth experiencing homelessness in Hawaii.

Janet Mock

Janet Mock is a transgender rights advocate, writer, and media producer. Originally from Hawaii, she worked



as the staff editor for People magazine, where she came out as transgender. She wrote her first autobiography in 2012, which began her entry into more overt advocacy by speaking on her experience transitioning as a teen in Hawaii. She worked for a medley of media organizations and formats before settling into screenwriting. After writing her second autobiography, she began writing the critically-acclaimed show Pose on FX. Pose was groundbreaking for casting trans actors to play trans characters and accurately depicting the Ballroom scene of 1980's New York. Janet is the first openly transgender woman of color to write a television episode and secure a major studio deal. Her work on and offscreen has increased crucial transgender representation in the media.



Amazin LeThi

Born in Saigon, Amazin LeThi is a fierce advocate for LGBTQ kids in sports. Amazin was adopted into a white family in Australia and began her lifelong passion for athletics as a bodybuilder at age 6. She was bullied both for being Asian and LGBTQ, and her work at the intersection of these identities has been influential. She founded the Amazin LeThi Foundation, which works to prevent anti-LGBTQ and anti-AIDS discrimination. She works tirelessly for the inclusion of LGBTQ people in sports and has worked publicly to further queer Asian representation in sports and the media with Athlete Ally, the BBC, and the Obama White House, among many others.



Angela Davis

Angela Davis is a longtime activist, first in the movement against the Vietnam War and as a defining second-wave Black feminist. A self-identified, longtime Communist, she has been a vocal advocate for prison abolition and alternatives to incarceration. Angela has been an educator for many years, lecturing on feminism at colleges across the globe. Through her work in these movements, Davis has consistently advocated for women and the LGBTQ community, even to the point of breaking with other leaders who were not listening to those voices. She has been a leading advocate for intersectional advocacy and activism and has led the field by example. She lives now with her long-time partner and fellow UC Santa Cruz professor Gina Dent.



Jennicet Gutierrez

Jennicet Gutierrez is an advocate for the trans undocumented community. Jennicet moved to the US at 15, learning English and being subjected to intolerance simultaneously. Famously, she interrupted President Obama during an LGBTQ Pride reception to raise the issue of his administration's treatment of transgender immigrants. This generated a national conversation on the issue and the politics of respectability in the LGBTQ movement. She was a founding member of La Familia: Trans Queer Liberation Movement, an organization that works at the local and national levels to achieve the collective liberation of trans, queer, and gender-expansive Latinx people.



Yasmin Benoit

Yasmin Benoit is an asexual and aromantic activist in the UK. She is one of the first and most successful Black alternative models. Pushing into a white-dominated field with Eurocentric standards of beauty, she got many questions from journalists and had to advocate for herself from the beginning of her career. As a model, she has also gotten many questions about her asexuality and fights many misconceptions about the ace community. Benoit has said in interviews, "I'm not trying to sell myself, I'm selling a product," a refrain she has had to repeat over her career. She has worked with AVEN, the Asexuality Visibility and Education Network (where she now serves on the Board of Directors), to increase the knowledge of and acceptance for the asexual and aromantic community. She is also lending her perspective to a movement that often is dominated by white voices, showing how diverse the queer community really is.



Deborah Batts

Deborah Batts was the nation's first openly gay federal judge. She served as an Assistant US Attorney in New York and was a professor at Fordham Law School before she was nominated for the Southern District of New York seat, following the recommendation of Senator Patrick Moynihan. Her confirmation in 1994 made her the first openly lesbian federal judge, not to mention the first African-American lesbian judge. While she never stressed her sexuality, she understood that she was a role model for many. In a 2019 interview, when asked about her thoughts on being a role model, she said "You can certainly be a mentor, someone who encourages people who think that they can't do it. They can do it."


