Leno at his Big Dog Garage in Burbank, California. But Jon tells his story the best ... see below. MH

Visiting Jay Leno's garage has been on my bucket list ever since I've been going to California for the Pomona drag races over the past 15 years, but I wasn't sure that I might ever get the chance. One day while I was helping Mark Henderson get a fuel injection conversion sorted out on his 1969 Grand Prix, I mentioned the nitro funny car team that I work with part time and my upcoming travel plans to Las Vegas and then Pomona to support the final two national-level drag races of the season. I planned to stay out West for a bit over two weeks, combining periods of professional focus with some much-needed vacation time. I also mentioned that I would be flying into Burbank and at that point Mark perked up and said that if I would like to visit the Big Dog Garage and (an even bigger 'IF') maybe meet Jay Leno, then he could try to help arrange it.

The stars apparently aligned because everything worked out perfectly. I and several other car/drag race buddies were able to get a tour led by none other than Mr. Leno himself. We had a really special guest with us too ... Ed Iskenderian, the "King of Camshafts". He is 102 years old and is still very sharp, but he admits to learning more each



and every day. We met Isky about 13 years ago at the NHRA museum and we try to take him wherever he wants to go while we are in town. Ed has had a very interesting career. He is a rock star in hot rod land; everybody wants to talk to him and take pictures with him wherever he goes. Jay's shop holds an huge number of cars and motorcycles. The walls are packed with beautiful and unique artwork and automobilia. And make no mistake, Jay knows every nook and cranny of the space. He is truly the master of all he surveys. As he pointed out so many highlights of his collection, he easily proved that he is a walking encyclopedia about every vehicle within his purview ... One historical item Jay wanted us to see was a portable record player from the '20s. He unfolded it and cranked it up (like a miniature Victrola) and played a 78 record for us. He pointed out his Duesenbergs along with several other cars with Merlin engines under the hood (the Rolls Royce V12, like the P51 Mustangs and other warbirds used). Each of his vehicles has a story; I think Jay appreciates each tale as much as he respects the technologies of the time that made these unique vehicles what they were, for example the 4-valves-per-cylinder setups and the overhead cams in the 1910s and 1920s.

A more modern OHC engine was represented by the Pontiac OHC in his '69 Firebird convertible, which also had the 4-barrel high-output inline 6. Jay also likes steam power; he has a room full of steam driven vehicles and even some stationary-base steam engines. He had his folks fire up one of the steam cars and also got several of the stationary engines going while we were there.

His collection is wide ranging: from million dollar plus cars down to ones that even most of us might still afford. Honestly, I think he values all of them equally. His restoration shop is large and extremely impressive. It seems to be geared up to handle just about anything; paint, metal forming, fabrication, engine work and mechanical jobs can all taken care of within his four walls. They also do 3D printing to make parts and/or molds to cast needed components. Many of his vehicles are rare enough that new parts are either impossible to find or cost a fortune to obtain.

Jay is the same in person as he is on TV. He's very down to earth and a true car guy, although admittedly at a completely different level than most of the rest of us. I (along with probably everybody else who visits) asked what his favorite vehicle was. Jay said he likes them all (of course) and drives them all (wow!). The folks in the shop confirmed that.

I'd love to go back and visit again, but only after watching all of Jay's YouTube shows on his website so I could better understand more details regarding his collection. Heck, I want to go back again just because there was so much to take in. It was impossible to truly absorb the grandeur of the entire place in just one visit. I could easily spend days there.

I have to say that I have done some interesting things in my travels but our visit with Jay has gotten the most reaction from my friends. This trip definitely checked off a bucket list item! My thanks to Mark again for helping make the arrangements and to Jay for letting us in! WOW!!! JC

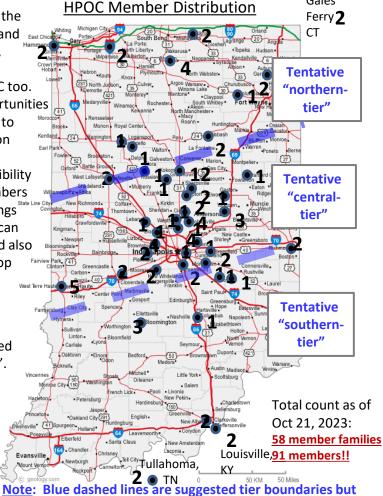
You're going to see and hear several reminders that it's time to update your annual membership for 2024. This requirement does <u>not</u> apply to folks who are already registered and paid up as "lifetime" members in HPOC. Please be responsive to these requests. If you have any questions here then please contact Prez/Treasurer Mike Gerdes.

One significant new change is coming up ... Since the Hoosier Pontiac Oakland Club covers the entire state of Indiana from a membership standpoint, it can be difficult to try to keep up with our entire group at times. HPOC's leadership has decided to appoint some *Regional Directors* (or RDIRs) to help make this task easier. Two club members help cover the northern "tier" of the state and another club member has been assigned to help oversee our southern "tier". No hard boundaries have been established but a sketch of the general idea has been provided on the member map below.

Each RDIR is being asked to do three things for the club. 1) They are tasked with seeking out info and suggestions regarding activities, shows, events, cruises, etc within their region of Indiana that might be attractive for other members of HPOC too. If they hear about some neat and unique opportunities then they will help work with HPOC leadership to get the word out in real time, within their region and across our entire membership. 2) We are assuming that each RDIR will also take responsibility for occasionally touching base with HPOC members within their particular region, to make sure things are OK in general and to determine if our club can be of some assistance. 3) And finally, we would also ask our RDIRs to keep club leadership in the loop as appropriate.

We are pleased to say that no arm twisting seemed to be required to get a little help here. Robert (Bob) Harris from New Albany has agreed to serve as the RDIR for HPOC's "southern-tier". Charles Graf is from the Hammond/Monticello part of the state and Gary Winters resides in the Ft. Wayne area; together they will share RDIR tasks across the "northern-tier" of the Hoosier State. Finally, Mark Henderson will continue to provide RDIR coverage for our club's "central-tier".

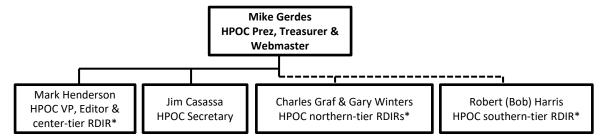

The main goals of the new RDIRs are to help keep in touch with regional members and regional opportunities, to act as an open club interface and to encourage club communication across the state. In general, the organization would look like this:



Regional-tier Director (RDIR\*) jobs are basically about improving and encouraging better club communication across the state (including some members who reside outside the state as well). In short:

- We're looking for more opportunities to get together, recognizing that this can be difficult on a state-wide basis. However, working together region-by-region, we may be able to attack this problem a little more successfully. We'll start by gathering more info from everyone and sharing it better across the board, then we'll see how it goes from there.
- Regardless of whether we can actually get everybody in one place at the same time, we can certainly
  do a better job communicating across the club as a whole, at least that's what we're going to try to do.

Your comments about how to make this whole thing work better would be deeply appreciated!! If you have any suggestions or ideas here, please contact your club leadership, including your RDIRs, and share your thoughts. Our contact info is in the new (1Q2024 release) club directory!!

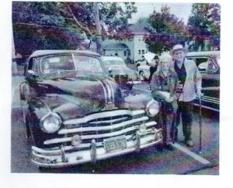

The Montgomery County Rotary Jail was built in 1882 & was the first rotary jail built in the U.S. and was in use until 1973. It was then opened as a museum & restoration began in 1975 & it is listed in the National Register of Historic Places 1975. The circular cell block has 16 wedge shaped cells on a two story turntable around a central shaft. The cell block was immobilized in the 1930s as a hazard to prisoners. It was a very interesting place and the curator demonstrated how the cells actually rotated.

As usual one of our group misbehaved and almost got locked up!





On Wednesday most of rest of our group arrived. We had our usual "Meet & Greet" at The Creekside Inn where everyone got to get the party started. 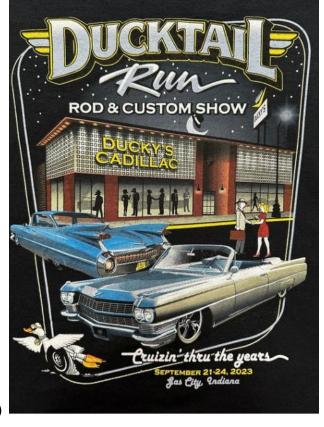

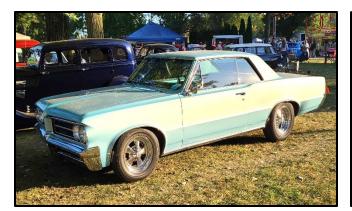

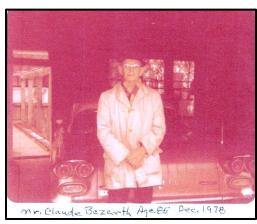
#### Existing Members ... Roger & Joyce Smith – Richmond, Indiana

## <u>Existing Member ... Jim Richardson – Sharpsville, Indiana</u>

Editor's Note: If this bio looks somewhat familiar, it's based on an article written about Jim for "Chiefly Pontiac" back in 2014 with a couple of suitable updates. Hope you enjoy. MH

"I've always loved cars and the freedom they give you to travel".

Indiana holds a prolific position in the history of the automobile. Over 150 brands of cars have, at some point, been assembled within the Hoosier State. Then there is the region's penchant for racing, including dirt track, banked oval, and quarter mile contests as well as the venerable Indianapolis Speedway. In a state full of car fanatics, Jim Richardson of Sharpsville stands out as a genuine enthusiast, preservationist and philanthropist.

Jim was infatuated with automobiles from an early age. "The first sound I made was the sound of an engine" he recalls, from which he earned the nickname "motor". Those interests continued to build into his teenage years and he fondly shares one tale in particular. After World War II, Jim's family was traveling to Michigan looking for a job when their 1929 Essex broke down. His uncle tried to repair their car but it tumbled from the jack and fell on top of him. Jim's family had to live in a barn during his uncle's recuperation and picked tomatoes to pay the hospital bills. Every weekend, the local farmers would have large gatherings and the roads alongside the tomato fields would become lined with long, lean and powerful cars. Jim and his brother would go search out their favorites, always looking for "the really fast ones" of course.

Jim remembers that in the 1950s, everyone wanted to have their ... (story cont. on page 25)

own business or a good job so they could afford one of those beautiful cars with long tail fins and one of those little houses with a white picket fence. He worked tirelessly to help his family but also began to save a little toward buying his dream car one day. Jim's motto became "Dream so big that people make fun of you, then work hard to make it happen". This was the time when his entrepreneurial spirits began to engage.





Better paying factory jobs eventually came along in the 1960s. Jim began building automotive components for a living, accelerating his passion for fast and fancy vehicles. His very first car was a used 1949 Chevy Styleline 2-door, but his stable eventually grew to include a '57 Ford convertible, a '57 Chevy convertible, a '55 Chevy Gasser, two '58 Ford Police Interceptors, and many other fine automobiles. Jim's first new car was a triple-black 1964 Pontiac 2+2 convertible "with gorgeous 8-lug wheels". "Of course, none of those cars were ever raced on the street" says Jim with a sly smile. Occasionally, he may have taken a gentlemanly sprint down a secluded stretch of highway just to "blow the carbon out". He might have even exceeded the speed limit marginally with a friend in the adjacent lane, but only to verify that all his mechanicals were in good working order and that his alignment was straight and true.

Big dreams and personal determination ultimately drove Jim away from the grind of large factories and into the realm of independent entrepreneurship. One business grew into two and then into more, while Jim's ideas continued to multiply. He acted on one brainstorm in particular. As Jim tells the story, "I've always loved cars and the freedom they give you to travel. My wife and I would take summer drives into the rural countryside. We would crest a hill or round a curve and see a town in the distance that would stir a remembrance of where I grew up. But sometimes when entering the town, the nostalgia would evaporate as there were no General Stores or Wizzer motor bikes running around." So in 1989, Jim decided to build his own "ideal memory" and created a sketch of a small Indiana town nestled right in his own back yard.

A Summer Place began construction in 1992, flourishing to include a diner, a post office, a barber shop, a firehouse, a gas station, a Ferris wheel, a railroad station, and a recreation of an iconic local movie theatre. The town provided an additional benefit; ... (story cont. on page 26)

it included plenty of garage and storage space for Jim's cars and projects. The backyard property became a wonderful spot for family, friends and fellow motor heads to gather and relax. Over time it evolved into a lucrative venture, serving as a site for reunions, weddings and other social gatherings. A Summer Place also grew to support charitable purposes near and dear to Jim's heart.

During the 1990s, Jim and his wife Tricia made the personal decision to adopt children. Their experiences gave Jim inspiration to help create "A Home for Every Child", a foundation geared to provide support, advice and monetary assistance for parents hoping to adopt but not easily able to do so. His relationships within the automotive hobby and his appealing property became important elements in his overall plan.

A Summer Place has often served as the host site for a very special automotive get-together held every Memorial Day weekend with all proceeds benefitting "A Home for Every Child". This annual gathering transformed into a substantial event where over 400 participants have driven in from all over the lower forty-eight and Canada. Factory originals, concourse restorations, restomods, full-up racing machines, drivers and projects-in-pieces are all on display. The public was always invited. They could wander the grounds to admire the rows of magnificent machines and look in on any works-in-progress Jim has tucked away in his garages. Plentiful shade, great eats, and pleasant music helped ensure that folks will want to return the following year. A Summer Place has provided a haven where cars and charity have been able to blend, and Jim Richardson has set high standards for how the collector car hobby can have a positive impact on the community and those in need.

Jim's dream town got a big surprise in October 2014 when a "special guest" came to Kokomo for a visit. Jay Leno dropped in by invitation and one of his stops had to be *A Summer Place*. It goes without saying that Jay was very impressed with Jim's lil' Hoosier burg in his own back yard.

Unfortunately, COVID took its toll and *A Summer Place's* programs sort of came to a screeching halt for a while. Finally, in fall of 2023, Jim invited the world once more to visit *A Summer Place*, this time for a Labor Day event. The weather was



gorgeous, the field was full of shiny metal, the food was delicious and the people were happy. Hopefully that will be the start of another great trend. In the meantime, we wish Jim and Tricia and their family every best wish. **JR, MH** 



#### From the Driver's Seat:

I usually try to utilize my editor's column as an "objective" forum. You believe that, right? Yes, I have been known to "vent" here on occasion, but this column has never been intended to serve as a platform for giving much voice to my frustrations, mechanical or otherwise. My apologies if I've ever made you feel different. From now on, if I get bent out of shape, I may just go back to tossing wrenches across the garage or down the driveway. Sheesh.

However, it's no secret to anyone who knows me that I have been a little perplexed (I'm keeping it clean here) with the EFI conversion for my '69 GP. I won't focus on the brand of the EFI system because at this level of product, I'll bet they are all similarly "hobby" capable with unique sets of pros and cons. I'm guessing that some amount of learning curve and tweaking is likely necessary across the board to make everything work. OK ... fine.

However, I am finding out that a trick is to try to electrically and mechanically install any new automotive stuff, whether OEM or aftermarket, as correctly as possible. Programming and/or calibrating can take a different skill set altogether (i.e. a different brain) and perhaps unique tools that the typical weekend mechanic may not yet have. The assumption is that people are still smart enough to learn what to do. Yes, I do keep trying to improve!

Today, let's talk about a the general process of getting such things done. Next time we'll talk more tech-ish.

- First and foremost, don't be "that guy". Whether it's a really complex installation or something you
  just aren't familiar with, <u>read the instructions first</u>. If you've done "something similar to that before"
  and don't read the instructions, then we wish you luck but don't say we didn't warn you.
- If your repair or installation involves related electrical connections, it may be wise to disconnect the battery first before moving forward with any other tasks at hand.
- Try to determine what extra parts and pieces are going to be handy to do the job properly. At the very least, make your preliminary list early. You might even do some local and/or catalog shopping ahead of time to have most everything ready and at your disposal.
- A great tool available via the web is <u>the forum</u>. By typing "how do I install X" into your browser, you may get any number of instructions, opinions, pictures, drawings, and/or general wisdom from people out there who have done "X" before. You can also research available forums before the work begins or wait until you're knee deep in some kind of trouble. The "when" is kind of up to you.
- Before you start, test fit parts and pieces, LOOK at how things should fit, READ how much torque to apply, and so on. Become familiar with how "X" should go together and function when done.
- Consider what best practices ought to be applied. THINK ahead about necessary electrical connections, especially grounds. What mechanical features should to be lubricated and with what? When you bolt things together, should lock-tite be used or not? Etc.
- To summarize to avoid unnecessary and frustrating issues and errors, review the job BEFORE you begin, work carefully and methodically, and try to do things properly the first time through.

Unless you break something thoroughly, it may be possible to redo it again to make it right. You'll lose some time and maybe some money, but you'll learn and gain some wisdom. Try to be patient (*I need to work on this part A LOT!*) You'll get there, and then you can enjoy the ride. Now *Go Exercise the Go Pedal*!!! All the best, **MH**

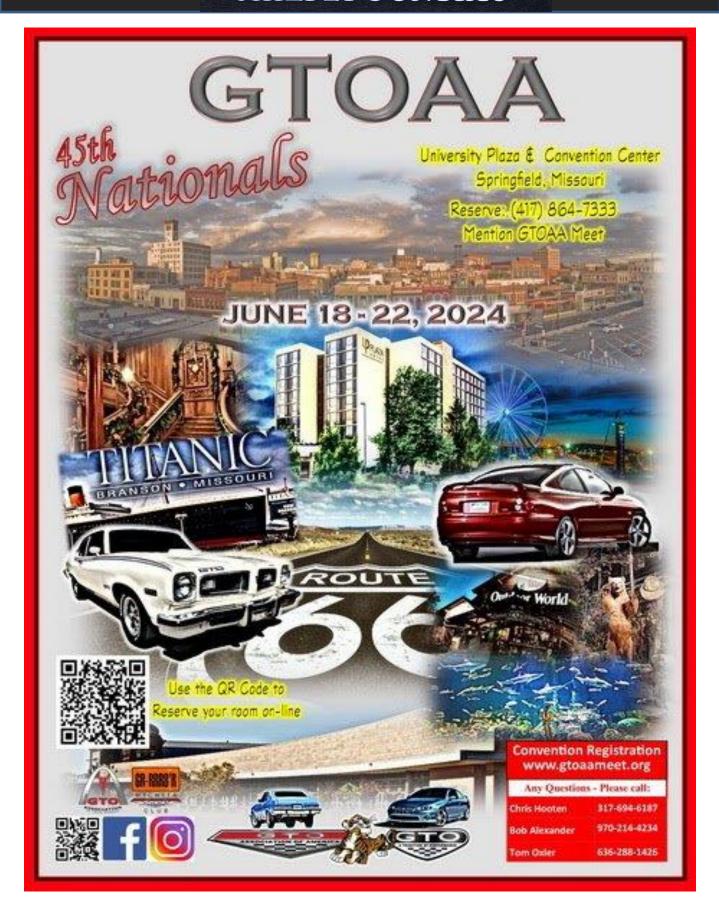
