We learned about sawmills, textile mills, micro yarn mills, blacksmith shops, the aerospace industry, agriculture, Florida state government at the Old Historic Capitol, the Pacific theater of WWII, aquaponics and hydroponic greenhouses, Spanish missions, whaling in New England, and the music of the Jazz Age.

We experienced a bit of sparkle and magic on our travels with Christmas lights in Atlanta, the Mardi Gras Museum in Mobile, spray painting at The Cadillac Ranch in Texas, the puppet museum in Atlanta, hot air balloons in New Mexico, fireworks, sampling international Coca-Cola flavors, and a fun murder mystery dinner – all adding a touch of magic and warmth to our journey.

We traveled via airplane, bus, trolley, tramway, boat, ferry, gondola, river cruise, and paddlewheel riverboat.

We delved into presidential history and the personal lives of influential leaders: George W. Bush Presidential Library and Museum, the Jimmy Carter Center, the LBJ Ranch, and the Kennedy Compound and Memorial in Hyannis Port, supporting the preservation of our national heritage.

We reveled in nature at an eco-resort, caverns, botanical gardens, a national estuarine research reserve, a pitcher plant bog, marine life at America's largest aquarium, and state and national parks, appreciating the beauty and significance of our natural world.

We journeyed into the past as we learned the history of the Alamo, the Indian Pueblo culture, antebellum homes during the Civil War, the Pilgrims at Plymouth Rock, old whaling ports in New England, and Spanish colonial life.

We enjoyed local art scenes with musical plays, folk-life plays, dramatic plays, the making of historic Cajun accordions, seeing the summer homes of artists and writers on Martha's Vineyard, and visiting the lively artist colony in Provincetown, the tip of Cape Cod.

We sampled regional food everywhere we went: Cajun food in Louisiana, lobster and clam chowder in coastal New England, cannoli in Boston, tacos, queso, and margaritas in Texas and New Mexico, German and Mexican street markets, and good ole' Southern food in Atlanta – dressing, greens, turkey, cornbread, and peach cobbler.
