downcast but we, as supporters, could only have been happier if we had won. As Head Coach Alex Rae put it, "We should have been out of sight." Suspect training this week will again be intensive.

Coventry Rugby is in a good place, I hope you would agree. Gates, or attendances, are holding up pretty well, especially in terms of the current cost of living difficulties and strains. Thank you, I am sure, on behalf of the club for your continued support.

As a Supporters Club we can only marvel at this continued support. CRSC will continue to run coaches to away fixtures, as long as you continue to support them. The good news is that our trip to Doncaster Knights this month has sold out, this coach

is being sponsored by Hinckley firm, Sapphire Lourves, the firm's proprietor, Steve Brown, almost eligible for 'frequent traveller' status on his CRSC trips! Thank you Steve.

But not to worry, we still have some away trips to plan, Richmond (15.4.2023) and Bedford Blues (29.4.2023), currently the final game of the season, sure to be a thriller. We need your support for this one! There is also the small matter of the away game Ampthill to be officially at rearranged. This has, due to the regulations, to come from the RFU, then Ampthill will let us know. I am sure most of us have a suspicion of when that date will be but, until our Governing Body confirm this.....! Think they might have a few other issues to deal with at the moment.

So, tell me Paul, what's the next Championship season going to look like? I wish I knew!

It really seems to be a while before that is generally known. All that I can glean from rumours, statements and conjecture is that there will be a Wasps side in the Championship after, seeming, to pass the requirements to be admitted to the competition. Since then there is more radio silence than a nuclear submarine on operational duties. Worcester Warriors, through their new owners, Atlas, withdrew their request to join the Championship and seem to have other plans. We await developments on these plans, although radio silence seems to be in play here also.

It's not generally known that Coventry Rugby, owing to our determined stance not to be 'railroaded' into RFU/PL plans are seen to be one of the 'awkward' clubs, along with Ealing and Pirates. I think it's fair to say CRSC support the club's stance.

From what I can gather, or glean, the

Championship Clubs Committee could be be viewed in distinct groups:

The Firm Stancers': Cov, Cornish Pirates and Ealing, clubs who are determined to not be walked over by the GB or the elite clubs.

Willing to Accept: Ampthill, Bedford, Doncaster. Hartpury, Jersev. Nottingham, happy to form 'strategic partnerships' with elite clubs, being used and using players from these clubs because, 'we will take players from the elites, overloading squads with players, because it works for us (whilst sacrificing their own identity)'. (I have included Hartpury in this group as they offer a chance for Bris/Glaws to give players a runout and it offers Bill Sweeney a chance to highlight Hartpury as his ideal type of club in a 'franchise setting).

Waiting and Watchers: Caldy, London Scottish, Richmond, these three are trying to maintain their identities, although The Exiles are in danger of becoming purely and simply a reserve side for Harlequins, 'McQuins' and losing their own distinct identity. Some of their fans are not very happy.

And that's about enough from me, although in the background, major plans are underway by Coventry Rugby for the next 15 months or so. Keep looking out for the information that will soon be released via social media outlets and prepare to get involved and celebrate!

#### FREE SCORING COV REPEL MILITARY ADVANCE

Cov's first 'Gift to the Community' game wasn't short on action, skills and efforts, Cov easing to a 65-12 win over the visiting UKArmed forces side, (formerly known as Combined Servises). Most of the action, and not without its controversial or at least surprising moments, took place in the first period.

Cov, with a side bolstered by Tobi Wilson, Joe Snow, Ollie Betteridge, George Smith took control practically from the off, despite a yellow card for Ray Kanyasa for what looked like a line out offence, jumped into a 17-0 lead through close range tries for hooker Owen Postlethwaite and Smith and a fine run from



George Hallam, Wilson converting the initial score, this with 25 minutes gone.

The UKAF team then lost their outside centre to a red card for a tip tackle on the impressive David Okupu a few minutes later.

Smith's galloping run on 33, the lock giving his finest Harlem Globetrotter's impression, one-handed carrying and passing inside to the supporting Snow. Wilson converted.

Two more visiting yellow cards, for offside at a close in ruck and another maul offence sandwiched tries for the impressive James Bennett and the powerful Kanyasa, Wilson converting the former, another Kanyasa try, unconverted, close out the half for a 43-0 home lead, the servicemen ending the first period with 12 players.

It had been an impressive first half for Cov.

Home changes at the break, Wilson, Betteridge, Snow and Smith all being replaced, but the scores continued unabated.



James Bennett grabbed his second, Okupo and replacement, Christian Bannister, also crossed the whitewash, all unconverted.

Two late scores(65) and (74) from the visitors were just rewards for their commitment and efforts, the latter converted.

It was left to Kanyasa to complete

the scoring, the lock completing his hat-trick for his eventful 80 minutes. Leo Jowett added the extras.

David Okupo was named Man of the Match, a fitting and deserved acknowledgment of a display of pace and verve throughout.

## HIGH FLYING RAF SOAR TO NEW HEIGHTS

#### Coventry 17 RAF 66

In an impressive display, epitomised by a dominant pack performance, the RAF side served up a performance of power and speed in a final prep game before facing The Army at Kingsholm, on April 15th.

Five tries to the good, a penalty try included, by halftime, including a brace for live wire scrum half, Corporal Joe Parkin, the servicemen led 33-5 at the break. Cov loose head prop Ollie Stone was yellow carded for his indiscretion when the penalty try was awarded.

The only highlight for Cov was an eighth minute try, all his own work, fielding a high ball and running it back from 40 metres out for the unconverted score.

The Cov eight will have been glad of the 15 minutes break. It had been a torrid half as the RAF dominated the scrums at will.

Two more visiting scores, both converted, meant the flyers stretched further away in the opening minutes.

However, Cov finally struck back with two tries from flanker, Harry Stone (50) and 54 minutes, the latter converted for a 17-47 score line.

Sadly, that was as good as it got. Three more tries in the last quarter, the latter two converted, meant an easy win for the strong RAF side.

Overall, a difficult evening for the youthful home side but the rugged visitors were full value for the win. The final 'Gift to the Community' game is scheduled have promotion chasing Leicester Lions visiting the BPA on Good Friday, April 7th, 7.30pm. Let's hope it's at least good, or at least a better, outcome than this.

John, last year you celebrated 50 years in broadcasting. Been a long stint, but tell us your first memories of watching Coventry RFC, as it was then.

My first memories of watching Coventry RFC go back way before broadcasting began in 1972. April 1947 was the first actual time when my Dad took me to watch them play Old Blues. Onwards to September 1955 & when I first started selling match programmes. From there roles which I loved within the Supporters' Club & later the Coventry club.

#### **Happy memories?**

Oh many. Cov winning the two Twickenham finals in 1973 &1974 both stand out. The defeat deep in injury time v Newcastle in 1996 also stands out. I must also mention my first visit to Twickenham in 1959 when I saw Peter Jackson score his match winning try for 14 man England v Australia to seal a 9 -6 win in injury time. No replacements in those days, with Cov's Peter Robbins moving to centre to cover the injury. I lost my voice for a week!

## I know you have a long association with Rugby Union and both your boys played rugby didn't they?

Yes, they did & both played for Coventry Colts as scrum halves. Dave the eldest made his first team debut in 1993 v Rugby Lions at Webb Ellis Road. He had to come on & play on the wing where he found himself marking Eddie Saunders. Just after a replacement appearance again v Wanderers in Dublin, that time at full back. That was special for me because it was on one of the several occasions I ventured over to sample the Wanderers hospitality.

Mike, two years younger, made his debut v Moseley at the Reddings in 1995, where he marked Richard Moon. Just afterwards the club asked him to play fly half down at Newport, when Cov, through injuries, sent a very weakened sidedown.

Mike then in December that year won his Oxford Blue in a losing side against Cambridge. At fly half for Oxford was David Humpfries who went on to play for Ireland.

After University, Dave joined Walsall, Mike, with his job taking him to the North East joined Blaydon.

## The game of Rugby Union has changed greatly and continues to change. For the best?

No, not always. Some of the elements brought in have improved areas of play, for example not being able to kick direct to touch outside your 22 & the more recent one where a long kick into opposition territory can bring an attacking line out providing the ball rolls into touch.

Conversely, hookers are almost redundant with scrum ball invariably being put into the second row of a scrum. Teams are also being given far too long to form a line out. The

most recent edict to referees to speed matches up might hopefully change the latter. That latter element I have to say continues to bug me!

As regards all the recent publicity over the height of tackling, the jury is surely out, but the controversy has certainly hit hard in the game below professional level.

## You have been involved with Cov for many years and in many different roles. Your most satisfying role?

Being asked to become Fixture Secretary in 1985, a role I then held until 1998.

I took over from the late John Barton. Fixture Secretaries in those days were almost like a part of being in "a club in themselves". The closeness & contacts built up were just stupendous. I always considered it a real privilege to have worked along side many famous names who had graced the game as players. The fact that I had not been able to go down that route never made the slightest difference, they were all pretty well without exception brilliant. Peter Ford of Gloucester is one who stood out for me; doing me personally a great favour very early on when I needed to break up a run of away dates. Peter could well have taken real stick for that at Kingsholm.

When I took over, Cov ran just the two sides, 1st team & Extra Firsts, but within two years came the decision to run a Wanderers 3rd team & Colts. That made for many interesting challenges; the first colts captain was Richard Cockerill.

On the downside, with the advent of league Rugby in 1987, very soon after came the loss of the Welsh fixtures; that was tough to take, but there was nothing I could do about it.

## During the 1960's and, as is often described, 'the glory years' of the 1970's, who, of the many famous and revered Cov names, always endures in your mind?

There are so many. Peter Jackson my boyhood hero & later to become a close personal family friend. David Duckham, was he the greatest Cov player ever? That discussion will rumble on for sure. Phil Judd, "Bomber" Evans, George Cole. In honesty I could go on & on.

#### The two wins in the old John Player Cup must bring back happy memories.

Actually thinking back, the dear old RFU did not like the word "cup" in those far off days, John Player came later, with Cov winning the quaintly named "RFU Club Knock Out Competition". The first was at the end of my opening season in local radio, with the commentary shared with BBC Radio Bristol. We were placed in the Overseas Commentators Box in the old West Stand at Twickenham. Bearing in mind the box overhung between the upper & lower tiers & the only way in was through the roof! No health & safety to my knowledge in 1973! Climbing out for a toilet break at half time was an interesting experience.

1974 & London Scottish saw Anne & myself sitting in the West Stand. With no other

station to share costs with, BBC Radio Birmingham, as they were then, decided not to cover the game. One of the rare occasions over the last 50 years when I have been able to bellow out "c'mon Cov".

#### What is your greatest Coventry Rugby moment?

The win over Newcastle in "that game" in 1996, ranks there, probably shared now with the recent superb first ever win at Ealing Trailfinders.

Our paths crossed many times in the broadcasting arena, what is your worst moment broadcasting? Mine was when on air, trying to do a report and choking on air, and I heard the presenter in the studio say, "We'll go back to Paul once he has finished his lunch!" Mortified, I was. Have you experienced anything similar?

Probably back in the Mercia Sound days of the 1980's. A mid week game at Nuneaton against whom I cannot remember. The Wednesday evening though was freezing cold & I had taken the radio car to the Harry Cleaver ground. The car was fitted with a retractable thick aerial, which meant when it was in position the car engine would not fire. Come the end of the game & the aerial was frozen solid & I could not budge it. What to do? A knock on the Nuneaton dressing room door proved to be the answer; would a number of strapping forwards kindly brave the cold again & apply some help. It did not take them long, I have to say the sight of them in action ranked with the game itself!

A close second. Again a Mercia Sound radio car this time beaking down just outside Otley, after I had covered Rugby Lions up there. Thankfully even though it was not my car & my membership details were at home, the RAC came to the rescue. You should have seen the thickness of the jump leads they used!

#### What are your thoughts on the games future?

At the moment, very mixed. The game in general would benefit immensely from better leadership both from the International Game Board, but also the Rugby Football Union. There are many concerns being expressed concerning the way the RFU have handled the amended tackling law & unless they clear up the mess they have left there, those concerns will only grow particularly below professional level. A real risk of players leaving the game, plus others not joining because of it. Concussion issues have to be resolved for sure, but the way that is dealt with is also so important.

The unanswered questions too from RFU relative as to how the Championship in England will survive? Certainly not in it's present form & where will proper funding & sponsorship come from if it is to become a clear link with the Premiership, the latter particularly being vitally important?

Fifty years in broadcasting is a massive achievement. Did you ever imagine it would last so long when you first picked up the microphone?

Good gracious no! It all began quite casually with the then BBC Radio Birmingham coming to the Club early in 1972 saying, "we have covered Rugby at Moseley since our inception last year, would anyone at Coventry feel like getting on board"? Only two came forward, former Cov Rugby prop forward & icon Mike McLean & yours truly. Mike sadly died very suddenly in 1978, as for the rest I have simply tried my best always to carry it on. Always importantly enjoying doing it, which I hope still comes through.

As most people know, a life long problem with my back & right leg will never go away & with worsening mobility, I sadly had to make the decision in 2022

to only cover home games. I am still getting used to listening to others when Cov are away, both Richard Moon & Alec Blackman & BBC CWR are continuing to carry on the tradition consummately.

## Thank you for your time John and hope broadcasting retirement is a long way off.

Thank you so much for this opportunity to pen some thoughts, I still nurture hopes of seeing Cov back in the Premiership (it was not called that of course at the time Cov had the one season there in 1987). We can all dream!



### **OBITUARY - DAVE SMITH**

Although not a CRSC member, we have been made aware of the sad passing of David Smith. David was a longtime Coventry Rugby supporter who used to travel on many away days in the previous body of Coventry Supporters Club.

Living in Litchfield, Dave's match day travelling used to involve train from Litchfield, and bus to Coventry, with the same return journey. A true traveller.

Dave was a gentle man, softly spoken and quietly knowledgeable. Nothing would please Dave more than arriving in the clubhouse fairly early, sit quietly at a table and chat to old friends, many fellow past Cov supporting travellers.

In recent years Dave was to be found at Bath Rugby matches at the Rec, where a friend had a season ticket

However, Dave saw the light and had returned to supporting Cov.

We do not have funeral details to hand but from us all at CRSC, RIP Dave. You will be missed.
