

James Anthony & Agnes Hart-Lawrence 50th Golden Anniversary Portrait

This picture was taken at the home of William Hugh Eugene & Mary Ellen "Annie" Neiderer-Lawrence at 1071 Irishtown Road, right after James Anthony & Agnes Hart-Lawrence's 50th Golden Anniversary Mass on December 30, 1913. Genevieve is with her parents Turnie & Alverta Slusser-Lawrence, grandparents Eugene & Annie and great grandparents making this a four-generation picture.



This professional looking photo was provided to friends and family members, we have personally seen this picture from three different families.

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One relatives photo copy has a handwritten note stating the photo was taken in Irishtown at the home later owned by Elmer Shrader. This building was later destroyed by fire in 1954 and was replaced later with a small Shrader general Store. This same property was once owned by John L and Elizabeth Weaver-Lawrence who raised a family of eleven children. John was a Blacksmith along with four of his sons James Anthony, Henry Jacob, Francis Charles, and George William. Later William Hugh "Eugene" Lawrence took ownership and lived there until the late 1930's, when he and his wife Annie Neiderer- Lawrence moved into their in-laws (see attached census reports).

Later this property was purchased by Elmer Shrader and family who lived in it from around 1940 until a fire in 1954 burnt the house and other facilities way beyond repair. This location eventually became the site of Shrader's grocery store and now apartments.

It was quite popular during this time to have grand anniversary celebrations. This four-day of festivities started with a high Catholic Mass on the morning of Tuesday December 30, 1913, and ended with a Friday

GOLDEN WEDDING CELEBRATION.

Mr and Mrs. James Lawrence, an aged and well-known couple, of Irishtown, cel ebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary, Tuesday, December 30th, with a Sol emn High Mass at 8:30 a. m., in Sacred Heart Church, (Conewago Chapel), where half a century ago, they were married by Father Catanni.

Numerous relatives and friends from Hanover, McSherrystown, New Oxford, and the Conewago parish, were present.

The music and singing were enchantingly rendered by Miss Anna Lippy, the church organist, assisted by the Sacred Heart choir.

The aged couple, attended by Mr. and Mrs Eugene Lawrence, their eldest son, and wife, marched down the aisle to the music of a beautiful wedding march Thuchurch was elaborately decorated with gold, ferns and various cut flowers, all brilliantly, illuminated by electric lights. 


Irishtown in the early 1900's had many Lawrence family relatives living in this small village. In two historic maps, we can see the location of John L Lawrence house.

> The attached sample census report from 1940 shows Elmer Shrader's residence that later had a threealarm fire and was destroyed, only remnants of some walls remained.

One last note on this well-preserved photo. Some thought the picture location was at the Slusser family house at 2000 Centennial Road. After all, Alverta's father Eugen was a carpenter and he built and owned homes / property in the area.

Research shows (via Zillow website) that this house was built in 1920 and the front Door, to the front Window offset, does not match this photo, thus dispelling this theory...

This is a current (2020) photo from Google Maps of the 2000 Centennial Rd. house which was the original Slusser home.

As you can see the windows spacing is reversed. The window on the right is closest to the Door in the original photo. This is opposite from that screen capture from Google maps of 2020 which shows that the left window

is closer to the door. The Slusser house was built in 1920 so there is no way that this theory works and has been put to rest...

The Hanover Sun and Gettysburg Times had multiple articles regarding the fire that totally destroyed the now owned Shrader home.

Many provided donations so the family was quickly housed in a new location with many items replaced and clothes provided.



The High Mass was sung by Rev. Jerome Lawrence, son of the aged couple, assisted by Rev. Benjamin Smith, S J., as deacon, Rev. John Smythe as sub-deacon, and Rev. Germanus Kohi as master of cere monics, who also delivered a most touching address.

Before the mass was sung, the aged couple renewed their marriage vows and received the jubilee benediction, before the altar, and, accompanied by their children, also received the Blessed Eucharist.

After the services, at the entrance of the church, the bride and groom received the hearty congratulations of all their relatives and friends

Their home was beautifully decorated with ferns and a profusion of other flowers A sumptuous banquet was served at 1 p. m, and a presentation of a purse of gold was donated them by their children and relatives, and many other presents by their numerous friends.

A social was also given in the evening, for the grandchildren, 31 in number, and one great grandchild.

At the wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence, 50 years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Jol.n Staub were the attendants Mr. Staub hes been carried away by desth and Mrs. Staub, who resides at Fairfield, was unable to be present.

Rev. Jerome Lawrence, the son, who sung the mass, is professor of higher mathematics and Prefect of the Junior Department of St Bernard College, Cullman, Alabama. He is also Director of all outdoor sports at the institution, where he has returned to resume his work.

Miss Emmma Lawrence has returned to Chattanooga, Tenn., to finish her studies in Chattanooga Business College.

Mr. Harry F. Lawrence, a well known Cigar Manufacturer and Justice of the Peace, of Chattanooga, Tenn, was the only son who was unable to attend

FAMILY UNITED AFTER BLAZE

Mr. and Mrs. Eimer Shrader and family were united Monday in a new home in Irishtown, after having been burned out of their original home there last Thursday.

Donations by residents of the county and Hanover, plus the offer of a home by Robert Bolin. New Oxford, permitted the family to reunite after they had resided at homes of various relatives after the fire.

Fire Chief John L. Sneeringer. Irishtown Fire Chief, who headed the drive to aid the burned-out family, said that cash donations, in addition to the gifts of clothing, furnishings and food, total slightly more than \$500. The cash is being deposited to Mr. Shrader's account at the Farmers and Merchants Bank, New Oxford.

Donations gave the family "everything they need, except maybe a few dressers, or bureaus, or articles of that type for the bedrooms," the Irishtown firemen said today.

James A. Lawrence. of Irishtown, died Wednesday morning from a com-. plication of diseases, aged 80 years, 8 months and 25 days.


He was a veteran of the Civil War, having served as a Sergeant of Company H, 165th Regiment. under Capt. William H. Gordmier. He was a member of Major Jenkins Post No. 99, G. A. R., of Hanover.

He leaves his widow and the following children: Eugene W. Lawrence, Irishtown; Henry A. Lawrence, Chattanooga, Tenn.; Mrs. Edw. Hemler, Irishtown: Mrs. William Losman, McSherrystown; Mrs. Peter Long, New Oxford: Miss Isabelle Lawrence, at home; Rev. Jerome Lawrence, of St. Bernard's College, Coleman, Alabama; Frank L. Lawrence, Irishtown; Miss Emma Lawrence, Birmingham, Alabama. There are also 33 grandchildren and seven greatgrandchildren.

One brother. George W. Lawrence. and three sisters, Mrs. Kate Staub, Mrs. Salhe Overbaugh and Mrs. Anna Leonard, also survive.

Had Narrow Escape.

Mrs. James A. Lawrence, of Irishtown, had a narrow escape from being crushed under wheels of a train at the crossing of the W. M. R R. on Lincoln Way, West, on Tuesday. Mrs Lawrence, who is well advanced in years, was driving Westward, and was just in the act of crossing the railroad when the engine of the 9:49 mail train Westward, appeared from between the buildings. With great presence of mind the woman quickly turned the horse she was driving, to the side, up on the lawn, allowing the train to pass within two feet of the vehicle. Eye wit nesses of the affair trembled in fear that the woman would be crushed under the train. Mrs. Lawrence failed to hear the whistle of the engine or the alarm gong close to the crossing.



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
