

#### The Stop Sign Story

In May many Woodmere neighbors were surprised to see traffic slow down on Woodmere Boulevard. A new All-Way Stop Sign was erected at the intersection of Woodmere Boulevard and Woodmere Drive (at the park). It came about through the efforts of many Woodmere volunteers over a period of six months.

Last fall we asked City Engineer Locke D. Bowden to approve a stop sign to slow down traffic on Woodmere Boulevard. He replied that we would need a petition signed (either yes or no) by every resident whose property touched either Woodmere Boulevard or Woodmere Drive. At least 90% would have to agree to the stop sign.

The final results were that 73 signed yes, 2 signed no, 2 refused to sign, 2 were vacant, and at 1 the wife signed one way and the husband signed another. But fortunately 73 out of 80 equals 91.25 %. Mr. Locke D. Bowden approved the sign. He will be speaking at our Quarterly Meeting, August 14<sup>th</sup>, at the Museum of Fine Arts. Come out and thank him for helping us slow down the traffic and hear what he has to say about red lights and cameras.


We urge all of you to join the neighborhood association and participate in our meetings and events. Thanks for making our neighborhood a safe and beautiful area to live in.

# WOODMERE NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION QUARTERLY MEETING THURSDAY, MAY 8, 2008 MUSEUM OF FINE ARTS AUDITORIUM

The meeting was called to order by Sam Whatley, President.

Sam Whatley presented the speaker, Ms. Natalie Roberts, Sales Manager of the Renaissance Hotel & Spa at the Convention Center.

Ms. Roberts gave a brief overview of the Renaissance Center. Local businesses are invited to use the center for seminars and other activities. It seats 1,800 guests, has 18 meetings rooms, and one ballroom. Brunch is served on Sundays and a Luncheon Buffet is served during the week. The large convention center, including the Exhibit Hall, accommodates 10,000. The convention hall consists of 72,000 square feet and seats 7,000 people. Ms. Roberts entertained questions from the audience.

#### Dear Woodmere Neighbor

Thank you for choosing to live in Woodmere. Your Woodmere Neighborhood Association stands ready to support you through your Block Captain, Zone Coordinator, Officers, and Standing Committees. Together we have better access to the police, maintenance, and parks departments of Montgomery. A recent example of our association's initiative is the installation of a new stop sign at the park. This has slowed down traffic on Woodmere Boulevard and made it much safer to cross.

Through WNA's encouragement more than a dozen Woodmere streets were repaved last year. A barrier fence was erected at the end of Woody Lane. And at the park, security lights were installed in the parking lot, a line of trees was planted, and extra wooden fencing was erected to keep cars off the grass.

The WNA provides such things as the Day in the Park, the Children's Spring Festival, the Annual Woodmere Yard Sale, quarterly meetings at the Museum, the quarterly Woodmere News delivered at your door, the WNA website, and our E-news update (for members who share their email addresses with us). We also do Spring and Fall Clean-ups to spruce up common areas.

We do all of this with volunteer labor and voluntary annual dues from those who join WNA. All memberships are \$25.00 and expire on Dec. 31<sup>st</sup> of each year.
