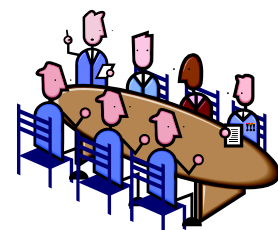

VIPS (Volunteers in Police Service)

I have been with Volunteers in Police Service for one year now. I find it enjoyable and rewarding, knowing that VIPS provides services that free up our police officers to perform higher priority duties.

Types of services done by VIPS include: Theft Prevention (Neighborhood Watch or Home Security), Education Programs (such as Stranger Danger or Children's ID), School Patrol, Vacation Home Check, Administrative Duties (directing visitors or reporting case status to victims) and many others.

As a VIP participant you can choose from many available volunteer job openings and time slots. Volunteers must be at least 50 years of age and work at least one four-hour shift per week. To qualify you must attend the Citizen Police Academy.

The next Citizens Police Academy will be Jan. 12 to May 23, 2010. Classes are from 6 pm-9 pm each Tuesday. Anyone interested should call Sgt. George Brooks at 241-2572. There are 35 slots per class.

WOODMERE NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION QUARTERLY MEETING MINUTES THURSDAY, AUGUST 13, 2009 MUSEUM OF FINE ARTS AUDITORIUM

The Woodmere Neighborhood Association met on Thursday, August 13, 2009 for its quarterly meeting at the Museum of Fine Arts Auditorium. President Jimmy Gunn called the meeting to order. The invocation was presented by Sam Whatley. The guest speakers were Councilman Charles Jinright and Mayor Todd Strange. Councilman Jinright spoke first and introduced Todd Strange.

Mayor Strange discussed many topics, including the shortfall of the city's budget. Among those topics were the intentions to reduce the number of city employees by 150 people. Mayor Strange announced that the city would cease to pick up recyclable material bags left by the street. There will be several sites designated around the city as locations where citizens can turn in the recyclable items. The city is looking into turning the recycling program over to a contractor. The mayor also discussed the enforcement of ordinances, including the ones pertaining to keeping lawns cut, cars parked on lawns and keeping pools clean.

Jimmy Gunn announced that we have 127 members. The WNA has 53 block captain positions. Many are vacant. Each zone is in need of volunteers to fill these positions.

Sam Whatley introduced a proposal to amend the WNA by-laws to allow us to file for a federal designation as a 501(c)3 non-profit organization. The amendment would designate the WNA as non-profit and would include a clause for dissolution of the WNA funds in the event of disbandment. The non-profit designation would mean that annual dues would be tax deductible and allow the WNA to apply for certain grants, particularly grants offered by Alabama Power for the purchase of trees to be planted in the Woodmere Park and along Woodmere Boulevard.

Arlene Gomez introduced a proposal to amend the WNA by-laws referenced in article 8, section 4 of the by-laws pertaining to the crime prevention committee. The proposed amendment would allow better facilitation of the crime watch program. Both proposed amendments will be voted on at the General Assembly meeting of November 12, 2009.

Jimmy Gunn reported that five new Neighborhood Crime Watch signs have been acquired and installed. Two of these were free and the WNA paid for three signs at a cost of \$85 each.

Jimmy also offered a report from the streets & sidewalks committee. There will be a three-way stop sign installed at the intersection of Woodmere Boulevard and the 2100 block of Woodmere Loop.

In a meeting with Russell Stringer, city forester, and Linda Wool, city long range planning coordinator, a master plan for the beautification of Woodmere Boulevard and Woodmere Park was discussed. Linda Wool has a master level grant writer working on the project. The project would include the planting of trees in Woodmere Park and along the north side of Woodmere Boulevard. Trees will be planted in the park in the approximate location of the old goal posts in the West Park in November of this year.

In new business, the possibility of a new interchange to be built at the intersection of Bell Road and I-85 was discussed. The proposed interchange would cut down on the traffic flow through Woodmere to the East Boulevard from Bell Road. State Representative David Grimes announced that he had asked the Alabama DOT for the interchange.

Jimmy Gunn announced that the Fall Clean-Up day is set for October 24. The next General Meeting to be held on November 12 at the Museum of Fine Arts Auditorium at 6:30 p.m..

Proposed WNA By-Laws Changes for 2009

The WNA is filing for 501 (c) (3) federal recognition as a tax-exempt non-profit organization. To do so, we must make two changes to our By-Laws at our November meeting. These changes were discussed at our August 13th meeting. Below is a third proposed change to our By-Laws to reflect our new commitment to prevent crime in Woodmere.

Article 8: Section 4

Current Language:

The Crime Prevention Committee, upon direction from the Board of Directors, may act as a liaison between the Woodmere Community and the Montgomery City Police Department. It reports all information to the Board of Directors. Zone Coordinators relay pertinent information from this committee to their block captains.

Proposed Language:

The Crime Prevention Committee Chair and/or committee members will attend all city meetings necessary to keep the Neighborhood Watch Program active in the Woodmere neighborhood. The Crime Prevention Committee, along with participation from the board, will make a concerted effort to participate in city-suggested activities such as National Night Out and provide publicity of such as appropriate.

CREATING A SAFE PASSWORD

Your passwords are the keys you use to access personal information that you've stored on your computer and in your online accounts. If criminals or other malicious users steal this information, they can use your name to open new credit card accounts, apply for a mortgage, or pose as you in online transactions. In many cases you would not notice these attacks until it was too late.

What makes a strong password?

To an attacker, a strong password should appear to be a random string of characters. The following criteria can help your passwords do so:

Make it lengthy. Each character that you add to your password increases the protection that it provides many times over. Your passwords should be 8 or more characters in length; 14 characters or longer is ideal.

Many systems also support use of the space bar in passwords, so you can create a phrase made of many words (a "pass phrase"). A pass phrase is often easier to remember than a simple password, as well as longer and harder to guess.

Combine letters, numbers, and symbols. The greater variety of characters that you have in your password, the harder it is to guess.

Create a strong, memorable password in 5 steps

1. Think of a sentence that you can remember.
2. Check if the computer or online system supports the pass phrase directly.
3. If the computer or online system does not support pass phrases, convert it to a password.
4. Add complexity
5. Finally, substitute some special characters.



Password strategies to avoid

Some common methods used to create passwords are easy to guess by criminals. To avoid weak, easy-to-guess passwords:

Avoid sequences or repeated characters. "12345678,"

Avoid using only look-alike substitutions of numbers or symbols. '@' as in "P@ssw0rd".

Avoid your login name.

Avoid dictionary words in any language.

Use more than one password everywhere.

Avoid using online storage.
