WNA General Meeting Minutes: May 24, 2007

The Woodmere Neighborhood Association met on Thursday, May 24, 2007 for its quarterly meeting at the Museum of Fine Arts Auditorium. President Sam Whatley called the meeting to order. The guest speakers were Councilman Charles Jinright, Probate Judge Reese McKinney, Montgomery County Elections Director Trey Granger and David Seward of Brinks Home Security.

Councilman Jinright discussed the projects going on in downtown Montgomery including the new hotel, the fountain roundabout, and the convention center. He also discussed how streets are chosen to be repaved and asked that any requests for repaving to be turned in to him. District 20, which includes Woodmere, has \$100,000 per year allocated for repaving.

Trey Granger and Judge Reese McKinney discussed the special election scheduled for June 5 and briefly summarized the two amendments to appear on the ballot.

David Seward of Brinks Home Security offered advice on things that can be done to discourage burglars and outlined the differences and features of various home security systems. Most home break-in's are now occurring during the daytime. He said that for each Brinks system placed in Woodmere, WNA will receive a \$50.00 referral fee.

In the business session, Treasurer Charles Collins reported that as of April 30, 2007 the WNA account balance was \$3010.60 with \$270.00 received in the month of April for membership dues, etc.

Jimmy Gunn, Parks Committee Chairman, reported that during the March 24th Clean-Up Campaign, 18 people collected 60 bags of trash from the Woodmere Park, berms and common areas. Lunch for the workers was provided by Jim Sadie of Sadie's Deli. We hope to have another park clean-up day in September. Come out and join us.

A report was presented by Jessie Donaldson concerning the Long Range Planning Taskforce Nominating Committee. The proposed mission statement was presented and adopted.

Sam Whatley reported that the WNA had a very successful Easter Egg Hunt on April 7th and we extend thanks to Frieda Dority and her committee for all of their hard work.

In new business, it was reported that WNA has joined the new East Montgomery Neighborhood Alliance with Michaela Hutcheson serving as Woodmere's representative. The cost was \$50.00 to join and \$25.00 dues per year. There are 27 neighborhood associations East of Perry Hill Road who are members of the Alliance.

Woodmere now has three members who are serving as Volunteers In Police Service (VIPS). WNA can have a police car for the VIPS to patrol the neighborhood. Montgomery Police officers on bicycles are now patrolling Woodmere. If you see them in the neighborhood, be sure to tell them you appreciate them being here.

WNA Secretary Peggy Agent has resigned due to health problems. We are in need of a volunteer to fill this position until elections in November. We also need a Newsletter Editor and a Chairman for the Streets and Sidewalks Committee. If you know of anyone who would be willing to serve in these positions, please contact Sam Whatley.





Antarctica - The South Pole

As Alabama temperatures hit 100 degrees, Antarctica dips to -100 degrees. Our winter temperatures are often warmer than Antarctic summer highs of 45 degrees. Even in summer (January-March) it snows in Antarctica. Yet the entire continent receives less than 5 inches of snow annually. It is technically a desert even though 98% of the continent is covered in ice. It is the coldest, driest of all the continents on earth.

No people or mammals live on the continent permanently. During summer months personnel at scientific and military sites rotate and cruise ships visit select coastal ports and islands. Visiting Antarctica with several scientists was a thrill I experienced in 2004. We were lucky to see whales and seals summering there, but I was most fascinated by the four species of penguins we saw. Penguins live only in the southern hemisphere as far north as the Galapagos; penguins don't live in the Arctic.

When the weather cooperated, we boarded rubber zodiacs and landed along the Antarctica Peninsula to watch penguins. Penguins build their nests with pebbles carried to the nest one by one. Any penguin that attempts to steal the odd pebble from another nest will reap the wrath of other penguins. Penguin colonies or "rookeries" are very noisy, but they are also communities of law and order! All species hatch one or two eggs. Most species will opt to feed only the stronger of two chicks, but all work hard to feed and protect their babies. While we watched the penguins, the penguins "people watched". We were not allowed to approach closer than 6 feet and directed to move back if the pen-

guins seemed agitated. That doesn't prevent them from coming closer to inspect the traveler. Penguins may deposit regurgitated red kreel on the tourist. They can spit and defecate six feet arcs simultaneously. No matter which end it comes from, this kreel "souvenir" is quite unpleasant. Kreel, a tiny crustacean, provides the primary food source

Paradise Harbour, a Chilean outpost, was the only opportunity to land on the Antarctic continent. It was also our chance to have our passports stamped with the Antarctica stamp. Whalebones dotted the landscape, but the Gentoo penguins were the main attraction. In contrast to other penguin rookeries, Gentoo colonies are sedate. Gentoos are unique, as mating pairs tend to stay together all year. They are the shyest of the Antarctic penguins but no less curious. One Gentoo was attracted to my red rubber boots and followed me until I re-boarded the zodiac.

The antics of the penguins and the pristine beauty are beckoning again, so I plan another trip. Both the Antarctic continent and the wildlife population are shrinking. Calving has damaged parts of the coast in the past two years. Sadly, pollution is also increasing. I want to see the effect of these changes for myself.
