I called yesterday about a hanging pine tree limb over the sidewalk at the corner of Carmichael Road and Woodmere Drive and the limb was cut down and removed the same day. You can't ask for better service than that. For police emergencies, still use 911 or the 241-2651 non-emergency number.

#### The Cost of Litter

#### **Montgomery Clean City Commission**

Everyone can see that litter is unsightly. What is not always clear is the lesser known "costs" of litter to a community.

Litter costs money. Taxpayers pay upwards of \$1.5 million annually to pick up trash from the nation's roadsides and that is just cleaning up the most littered areas. Without programs such as Adopt-a-Highway and community volunteers, DOT estimates clean up would cost \$50 million annually. And that is just to pick it up. Then there is the money lost when businesses do not want to locate in littered, unkempt areas. Add lost tourism dollars to the equations and the cost keeps going up.

**Litter is a safety hazard.** Litter attracts rats, roaches and other disease-causing creatures and bacteria. It is a breeding ground for fire. Litter also impacts insurance rates due to the hundreds of thousands of litter-related auto accidents each year.

**Litter increases the possibility of crime.** In the 1980s George Kelling, a former probation officer in New York City, developed the "broken window theory" which stated that petty criminal behavior such as graffiti and

littering increased the possibility of more crime. Then in a paper release in November 2008, Kees Keizer, of the University of Groningen in the Netherlands, revealed the results of a scientific study which demonstrated that signs of vandalism, litter and low-level lawbreaking changed the way people behaved by doubling the number of citizens prepared to litter and/ or steal. The theory become a scientific fact.

In short, littler makes an area less safe, less healthy, and less economically viable.

If you piled up all the litter thrown away in the United States each year, it would cover at least 100 soccer fields with piles of waste 30 stories high.

#### **Golf Carts**

There are about 1,000 golf cart accidents a month. Roughly half the accidents occurred on golf courses, the other half at homes, on streets and on other public property. They are quite dangerous, especially when used on public roads. Fractures and head trauma were the most common injuries found in the UAB study of 2008. The highest injury rates were found in 10 to 19 year olds and men older than 80. There are a hodgepodge of state and local regulations governing golf carts. But in Alabama, it is illegal to operate an unlicensed vehicle, including a golf cart, on public streets and on sidewalks.

## **Pedestrian Safety**

Beautiful scenery surrounds the Woodmere neighborhood and we know it is hard to resist taking advantage of this amenity. However, it's very important to use caution when walking. Follow these tips to insure you have a safe and fun walk!

- Always walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk and you have to walk in the road, ALWAYS walk facing traffic so that you can see any car that might become out of control.
- Dress to be seen. Brightly colored clothing makes it easier for drivers to see you during the daytime. At night, you should wear special reflective material on your clothing so that you are easily seen by traffic.
- 3. Tips for Crossing the Street:
  - Cross only at corners or marked crosswalks.
  - Stop at the curb or the edge of the road. Look thoroughly to the left and right for traffic before you step into the street.
  - Remember when crossing walk, don't run!

- Dogs Off Leash The city of Montgomery requires all dogs to be leashed. Leashes must be used in the areas around the lakes, on the roadways and walking trails and in any open spaces. There have been reports of loose dogs frightening children and scaring and injuring the wildlife.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT is designed to:


- Heighten crime and drug prevention awareness;
