

DEAR NEIGHBORS:

I hope everyone is enjoying the spring weather and you are ready to start going outdoors again. Lawn mowing season has officially begun. If you have driven down Carmichael Road into our neighborhood lately, you probably have noticed that part of our Woodmere Neighborhood Sign was Jimmy Gunn, hit and destroyed by a vehicle. The sign is being repaired as we speak. The Board was able to find the driver of the vehicle that hit the sign and contacted his insurance company who will take care of the repair bill for the sign.

That brings me to this point. It is becoming dangerous to walk close to our streets due to the cars speeding through our neighborhood. The cars come down my street (Woodmere Drive) doing 50 miles per hour. I had two speeding cars pass each other on my street the other day. All of the stop signs in Woodmere can be taken up since most cars blow through them without stopping anyway. You never know if the drivers are going to stop for you when you have the right-of-way. The cut thru from Eastern Bypass to Bell Road through our neighborhood has increased the traffic in our neighborhood. Carmichael Road and Woodmere Boulevard are in need of repaying due to this increase in traffic. Litter is being thrown out on a daily basis so we can never keep up with getting it collected on a routine basis. I have asked MPD for more patrol units in our neighbor on a regular basis. I would ask that you contact MPD also to ask for their help.

The property on Woodmere Boulevard near the apartments that is up for rezoning will not have a service station on it. The Board has met with the owner of the property and reached an agreement regarding prohibiting certain undesirable businesses from being built on this property. This

Montgomerian Anne Goldthwaite (American, 1869–1944) is best known as a painter of Southern subjects who spent the majority of her professional career in New York. Goldthwaite was an even more prolific printmaker during a period when women were just beginning to establish themselves in that role in the art world. This exhibition will survey Goldthwaite's print oeuvre (it exceeds 300 subjects), beginning with her student work in Paris and extending to works produced near the end of her life when she created many subjects in lithography.

Clean Up Your Neighborhood

The WNA will perform quarterly or more often trash pickup missions on the two streets within the confines of the Woodmere neighborhood. The next organized trash pickup will be held Saturday, May 12, 2018 and those interested in participating should meet at the parking lot on Woodmere Drive at 9:00 a.m. on May 12. Bring your own grabbers and trash bags from home. Let's participate and help keep our neighborhood clean.

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TALES OF THE HIBISCUS

We will pick up the story began in the Fall 2017 edition of the Woodmere News about the plants known as hardy hibiscus. In the early 1950s, a man named Robert Darby split his time working as a hardy Hibiscus breeder/ hybridizer between Behnke nurseries in Beltsville, Maryland and the USDA. He began by mixing the halberd-leaf mallow *Hibiscus laevis*, the scarlet rose mallow Hibiscus coccineus, and the rose mallow Hibiscus moscheutos in an effort to create interesting new plants for the gardening world. The very first plant he released and sold in 1955 though Behnke nurseries

was *Hibiscus* 'Lord Baltimore'. This cultivar boasted huge, 10" wide, waxy, lipstick-red flowers on 4 ft. to 8 ft. stems that brought an interesting, perennial, tropical-looking beauty to zones 4 and higher. A vigorously flowering plant, each Lord Baltimore flower lasts about one day which is typical for all hardy hibiscus. Each plant can produce up to 250 flowers



per growing season. Other hardy hibiscus introductions from Robert Darby include Lady Baltimore, Anne Arundel, and Turn of the Century.


Meanwhile, the Flemings would release such hybrids as Kopper King, Plum Crazy, Fireball, Fantasia, Robert Fleming and Dream Catcher. Although the last of the Fleming brothers, Dave, died in late 2001, the Flemings Flower Fields and others continue the work began by the Flemings and Robert Darby with new varieties appearing on the market. Monrovia Nursery is an industry giant that continues a lot of research in this area using environmentally sustainable methods. Monrovia operates a giant nursery in Cairo, Georgia among other locations. Walters Gardens is another developer of new hardy hibiscus with their Summerific® varieties such as Summer Storm and Cherry Cheesecake.

The public cannot buy from Walters Gardens or Monrovia. They market strictly through specific nurseries. There are 6 or 8 nurseries across the country that offer the plants on the internet and they

are very proficient at shipping them around the country, both by means of bare root specimens and small green plants.

Typically, hardy hibiscus are propagated by cuttings rather than using cell tissue and radiation methods. However, the group of hardy hibiscus known as Luna Hibiscus is better propagated from seed. During the 1960s, the Sakata Seed Corporation in Japan began hybridizing hardy hibiscus from the native wild



In the early 1990s, Dr. Ying Doon Moy, a refugee from China, developed a hybrid hibiscus while he was working as the research and development horticulturist at the San Antonio Botanical Center in Texas. He created a hybrid known as the Moy Grande, the largest, openface hibiscus flower in the world. The Moy Grande is said to produce 12-inch wide blossoms. Although Dr. Moy passed away in 2012, the Botanical Gardens still maintain a display of his namesake hibiscus in

his honor. Dr. Moy also genetically crossed the "Changsha" tangerine with a Mandarin Orange (Satsuma) to produce a high quality fruit



which is mostly seedless and more cold hardy than Satsumas called White Luna Hibiscus "Changsats". The first commercial release of this fruit was named 'Orange Frost' (but Dr. Moy called it 'Flourishing') and his high-yielding variety of this citrus fruit he named 'Bumper' was available all over Texas in 2013. The new variety will lead to growth and production of citrus in areas where this was previously impossible.

New varieties of hibiscus must be

proven through four or five gen-Moy Grande erations of the plant to be sure the new plant will hold its characteristics before it is marketed. Even then, enough specimens must be grown to meet market demand. New varieties may take five to eight years before they are brought to market representing a significant investment by the nursery with many hours spent in development. Many of the new varieties available on the market now are patented and only licensed nurseries can legally sell the plants.

The hardy hibiscus is really relatively easy to grow requiring little care. They are sun lovers and require at least half-a-day of full sun. They do not like to dry out and require watering if we do not **Heart Throb Hibiscus** receive rain. They thrive best on organic fertilizers such as compost. I have perhaps 12 or 14 different varieties that I grow. They will be in full bloom by early to mid June with blooming season lasting until September or October. Consider this an invitation to come by and see them for yourself.

If you are interested in growing hardy hibiscus for a hobby, contact me and I will give you the websites of the various nurseries across the country where you can purchase the plants. Most of the nurseries sell out of the plants by June and many of them will not ship the plants during the heat of the summer. Occasionally you will come across a couple of the varieties at your local nurseries and at Lowe's or Home Depot.

Know Your Ordinances

DIVISION 2. OVERGROWN GRASS AND WEEDS

Sec. 12-61. Overgrown grass or weeds prohibited and declared a nuisance.

It shall be unlawful and declared a nuisance and injurious to public health, safety and general welfare for any occupant, owner, lessee, or person in control of any property within the city or any occupant, owner, lessee or person in control whose property abuts city streets to allow an abundance of overgrown grass or weeds to exist if any of the following conditions are met: (1) the grass or weeds provide breeding grounds and shelter for rats, mice, snakes, mosquitoes and other vermin, insects and pests; (2) the grass or weeds attain such heights and dryness so as to constitute serious fire threat or hazard; (3) the grass or weeds bear wingy or downy seeds, when mature, that cause the spread of weeds, and when breathed, irritation to the throat, lungs and eyes of the public; (4) the grass or weeds are capable of hiding debris, such as broken glass or metal, which could inflict injury on any person going upon the property; (5) the grass or weeds are unsightly; or (6) if not grown as ornamental plant growth, the grass or weeds exceed 12 inches in height. Said property shall include, but not be limited to, sidewalks, city right-of-way strips, alleys, parking lots, driveways, grounds, fences, walls, property lines, privately owned storm drains, and vacant lots within the citv.
