

Chasing Our Tales, Part XV

Welcome to our 15th visit here with Chasing Our Tales. We pick up right where we left off from our last visit with Chasing Our Tales XIV

It is a hot, humid day on August 30, 1813 and the 550 people within Ft. Mims in South Alabama Territory are about to experience a horror beyond belief. Nearly 1,000 hostile Red Stick Creek warriors are hidden in a ravine within 400 yards of the fort. At least twice that morning, the commander of the fort, Major Beasley, was warned of the impeding attack. At least twice he dismissed the warnings as being false.



The main gate to the fort is jammed and cannot be fully closed because of shifting sand. A new shipment of rum has arrived and Major Beasley has been sampling the shipment to the point of intoxication.

We are nearing the noon hour at which time a drum sounds to indicate the time for the noon meal. A state of relaxation arrives at the fort. The settlers and friendly Indians within the fort stop their chores and begin to make their way toward the food. Dozens of happy children visit from door to door and tent to tent. The soldiers on guard duty relax and walk away from their posts to take their noon meal. Several card games break out in various spots.

At that instant, the Red Sticks attack with loud war screams. With the Red Sticks are William Weatherford (Red Eagle - one of the planners of the attack), Peter McQueen, Paddy Welch, Far Off Warrior, Josiah Francis (the prophet), High Head Jim, Hannah Moniac (sister of Sam Moniac), and others. Within the fort are William Weatherford's sister, Weatherfords's brother, Weatherford's half-brother, David Tate, David Tate's first wife, Mary Randon, with two of her daughters and many others related to members of the Red Stick war party.

Prior to this date, a second defensive wall had been constructed inside the fort a few yards inside the main outer wall. Within this inner enclosure were several buildings including a blockhouse. The outer wall featured several firing loopholes from which the defenders could fire their weapons in defense of the fort.

Instant panic strikes the people within the fort. Women and children begin screaming. A mad scramble occurs as people try to make their way inside the inner defensive wall. Major Beasley, recognizing the emergency in spite of his condition, drew his sword and, with help, fought valiantly to close the outer gate against the sand. He was quickly clubbed to death by the attackers. Four Red Sticks rushed to enter the opening at the main gate. Three of these were shot down within seconds. Other Red Sticks were able to reach the firing loopholes outside the outer wall where they immediately began a murderous fire as they cut down troops and people trying to rush to safety inside.

Dixon Bailey, veteran of the Burnt Corn Creek Battle (Chasing Our Tales XIV), assumed command of the troops. Led by Bailey, a group of soldiers took command of some of the firing loopholes not occupied by the Indians to establish a defensive fire. Other soldiers established a defense behind the inner wall and among the buildings inside. By the element of surprise and sheer numbers, the Red Sticks quickly established a foothold inside the outer walls of the fort and all of the settlers and soldiers were pushed back inside the inner defensive walls. The soldiers and settlers began an intensive defensive fire upon the attackers from inside these inner walls.

Although the Red Sticks had a tremendous advantage in numbers, most of the hostiles were only armed with tomahawks, war clubs, knives, and bow and arrows. The Red Sticks began to accumulate heavy losses. In spite of this, nearly 100 of the defenders were killed in the first few minutes of the battle. More were being killed as the Indians fired through the loopholes in the defensive walls. Most of the buildings inside the inner walls were set on fire by fire arrows. Many people burned alive. The fort's powder magazine inside one of the inner cabins was ignited and exploded.

By 3:00 p. m., the battle was still not decided and raged on. The Red Sticks were exhausted and many were ready to quit the battle and retreat into the woods. Upon seeing their comrades beginning to falter, the Red Stick leaders began to rally their warriors and whip them into a new frenzy. Most of the defenders of Ft. Mims had sought refuge inside two buildings inside the inner walls where they were determinedly holding out. Now these two buildings were set on fire. Some people died in these fires, but most were forced out to meet their fate at the hands of the warriors. Dixon Bailey was killed in these closing moments of the battle.

Now the slaughter was on. Many people fell to the terrible war clubs of the Red Sticks. Some people were scalped before they were killed. Women and children were brutalized and killed. Those wounded and many of the

dead were thrown into the fires of the burning buildings. Unbelievably, not all of the Red Sticks participated in this slaughter. One of the survivors of the battle reported seeing a Creek named Johomobtee shoot and kill three Red Sticks that were killing women.

Another survivor watched her husband being killed and, then, took the hands of her two children and marched into the middle of the carnage to meet her fate. Surprisingly, she encountered a young warrior named Dog Warrior whom she had befriended when he was a child. Dog Warrior led her and her children to safety outside the fort.

Supposedly William Weatherford was horrified by the carnage and tried to stop the slaughter, but the warriors had their blood up in anger at the deaths of so many comrades and the killing frenzy could not be stopped. A surviving slave told authorities he and others including Dixon Bailey's sister were in the Mims' cabin when the hostiles entered the building. A warrior asked Bailey's sister if she was related to anyone in the fort. She pointed to the body of Bailey and said "I am the sister of that man you have murdered there" upon which she was immediately struck down and mutilated.

By 5:00 p. m., the battle was over and the Red Sticks with their captives left the burning fort and the dead behind. Exact casualty figures do not exist but estimates are that about 400 of the people at Ft. Mims lost their lives. The Red Sticks spared the lives of many of the slaves at the fort and took them as captives. Three weeks after the battle, Major Kennedy of the Militia commanded a detachment sent to the fort to bury the dead. The detachment was horrified to find flocks of vultures and packs of wild dogs which had been attracted to the bodies. About 100 Indians were found buried in the woods nearby. Estimates are that the Red Sticks may have lost 300 to 400 warriors in the battle.

The events at Ft. Mims and the prior events at Burnt Corn Creek began the struggle known as the First Creek War which would rage until March, 1814 when General Jackson defeated the Creeks at the Battle at Horseshoe Bend on the Tallapoosa River near present day Dadeville, Alabama. What happened next is a matter of history and we will cover details of that next time we visit with Chasing Our Tales.

Have You Been to the Cloverdale Playhouse?

There's an exciting theatre venue down in Cloverdale with roots right here in Woodmere. Its premiere artistic director was Greg Thornton, a popular ASF actor in years past and still a Woodmere neighbor. Now in its 5th season, the Cloverdale Playhouse is situated in a former church building and was recently named a *This Place Matters* treasure as part of the Montgomery Landmark Foundation's Campaign.


Current artistic director, Sarah Thornton, is the product of Baldwin, BTW, and ASF's theatre programs. She started her acting career with the other neighborhood children in her Woodmere dining room and graduated to the ASF stage as one of its child actors. After many years in NYC, where she helped found the BAMA Theatre Company, she returned to MGM and took up the reins at the Playhouse. She's encouraging you to join her there to help bring more stories to life.

The Playhouse offers an affordable live theatre experience – only \$18 for full length plays with student discounts available. The offerings are funny, edgy, and thoughtful and are usually plays you won't see anywhere else in the Montgomery area. The current season, for instance, has already presented a Christopher Durang play, *Vanya and Sonia and Sasha and Spike*, that's all the rage around the rest of the country and sent some pretty lively discussions into the neighboring Cloverdale restaurants.

The Playhouse's June offering, *Strip Talk on the Boulevard*, was a world premiere of a play that may well make it to Broadway down the road. Its author, Donna Spector, submitted it to the Playhouse's competitive "Page to Stage" program which netted 180 submissions from all over the U.S.A. last year. "Page to Stage" was designed to encourage new works and give playwrights a chance to be heard as well as read. Guidelines are available on the Playhouse website.

One of CP's most loved offerings is the Third Tuesday "Guitar Pull" every month. Along the lines of a house concert, each "Pull" brings in three or four singer-songwriters who illustrate stories about their craft with the songs they produce along the way. Songwriters from as far away as Nashville, Atlanta and New Orleans vie for spots on the Pull schedules along with Montgomery's homegrown talent. And now, on the beautiful summer or fall Third Tuesday, the Guitar Pull is set under the stars on the Playhouse's new outdoor Courtyard Stage.

Lest Montgomery's younger artists be overlooked, the Playhouse also offers The Playhouse Troupe with special plays for kids performed by kids. The Troupe will present *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer* on July 29-31st. Theatre classes (for kids of almost ALL ages) and student camp sessions run during the school year and in July sessions. Special adult workshops in movement, auditioning, and other creative endeavors pop up as qualified teachers become available. Registering on the website for announcements is a good idea if you think you might want to dip your toe into the pool.

HELPING THE MONTGOMERY POLICE DEPARTMENT

Waldo Spencer, Arnold Thompson, and Gerry Shook are members of the WNA who have volunteered a combined total of 23 years with the Montgomery Police Department. There are approximately 65 active Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS) who have saved the city over \$300,000 last year and have put in over 2500 hours per year for the 12 years that the program has been in Montgomery.

Duties vary among the volunteers including: checking homes of residents who are on vacation, assisting the MPD at headquarters and other MPD locations, and helping with special events.
