A revival service, which lasted for 32 days, was the beginning of the Karval Church of the Nazarene. The "Big Tent," was set up in July, 1931, on the acre lot in the middle of Karval on land since made known was to be used for "church purposes only."

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Another beginning...

Karval Church of the Nazarene received a facelift on August 26 (2017) when the "Magnificent Twelve" arrived from Cornerstone Church in Falcon to help with electrical repairs, woodwork projects, cleaning, replacing carpet, plumbing needs, tree trimming and mowing.

The church reopened its doors for its first worship service in nearly a year on Sunday, October 1 at 9:30 am. Under the name of New Day Community, it will be an open door to everyone. The church will provide ministries for children, youth and adults, and opportunities to become part of the church through worship, missions, discipleship and community service.


Although the church has seen troubled times, God is leading to put the past behind and join Him in doing a new thing!

Our roots run deep...



The merger of the Holiness Church of Christ in the south and the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene took place on Tuesday, October 13, 1908, at 10:40 am in Pilot Point, Texas,, "amid great shouts of joy and holy enthusiasm." The newly merged Church of the Nazarene began with 10,034 members, 228 congregations, 11 districts, and 19 missionaries, according to historical records. Phineas F. Bresee, Hiram F. Reynolds and E.P. Ellyson were elected general superintendents.

Today, the Church of the Nazarene has 30,875 churches in 164 world areas, with a total of 2,616,741 members. While our base is in Kansas City, Missouri, we are a global church functioning in six regions (USA/Canada, Meso-America, South America, Eurasia, Africa, and Asia-Pacific). We now have six General Superintendents to oversee the work of the regions and lead the denomination. There are currently 78 districts in the USA/Canada region, and 62 churches on the Colorado District.

Small churches hold their ground...

In a world of mega-churches, the small, rural churches continue to flourish in their own right. The average size of a Nazarene church is around 80 attendees, or less. While small towns have lost their gas stations, stores, and more, the rural churches remain. In a recent study, Glenn Damon states: "The church was more than a church for the people who met each week. It was regarded by many to be "their church" even though they never attended. As is often the case in rural communities, people are religious and will identify with a church in the community even though they may never attend. For them, the presence of the church is a part of the community identity." Aaron Morrow adds, "In rural communities, the church plays a more important role than just offering a meeting place for the local congregation. It brings stability and supports the whole community." It is our heart's desire at New Day Community Church of the Nazarene to be the church you call home, and a place where you will find friendship and God's love when you are in need or simply when you want "to come home."



Denalyn, Max Lucado's wife, called him as he was driving home from the office. "Can you stop at the grocery store and pick up some bread?"

"Of course," he says.

"Do I need to tell you where to find it?"

"Are you kidding? I was born with a bread-aisle tracking system."

"Just stay focused, Max."

She was nervous. Rightly so. My mom once sent me to buy butter and milk; I bought buttermilk. I mistook a tube of hair cream for toothpaste. I am a charter member of the Clueless Husband Shopping Squad. I can relate to the fellow who came home from the grocery store with one carton of eggs, two sacks of flour, three boxes of cake mix, four sacks of sugar and five cans of cake frosting. His wife looked at the sacks of groceries and lamented, "I never should have numbered the list."

So knowing that Denalyn was counting on me, I parked the car at the market and entered the door. En route to the bread aisle, I spotted my favorite cereal, so I picked up a box, which made me wonder if we needed milk. I found a gallon in the dairy section. The cold milk stirred images of one of God's great gifts to humanity: Oreo cookies. I grabbed a pack of cookies, which happened to occupy the same half of the store as barbecue potato chips. What a wonderful world this is—cookies and barbecue chips under the same roof! On the way to the checkout counter, I spotted some ice cream. Within a few minutes I'd filled the basket with every essential item for a happy and fulfilled life. I checked out and drove home.

Denalyn looked at my purchases, then at me. Can you guess her question? All together now: "Where's the bread? I forgot the bread. The one thing I went to get. The one essential product (from preaching.com, "Don't Forget the Bread").

In the Gospel of John, chapter 6, a large crowd gathered around Jesus and His disciples. He asks His disciples, "Where shall we buy bread for these people to eat?" As the disciples look around them and consider the number of people present, they get a little bit overwhelmed. Is he asking them to literally go buy bread for everyone? Phillip is the first to say, "It would take nearly half our year's wages to buy enough bread for everyone to even have one bite." Andrew pipes up and says, "Here's a boy that has five barley loaves and two fish, but how far will that go?" Andrew had no clue he held the answer in his hands! Being a miracle worker, Jesus could work with that and before the day was done, over 5,000 people had their fill.

As the disciples ponder the day's events, and wondering how they too could be used in such a miraculous way, they inquire of Jesus, "What works do we have to do to be able to do God's work?" Realizing they are still struggling to capture the reality of what it means to be His disciple, Jesus says, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty" (John 6:35); "For my Father's will is that everyone who looks to the Son and believes in him shall have eternal life, and I will raise them up at the last day" (John 6:40). It wasn't about the miracles - it was about receiving and taking in the fullness of who Jesus was - the Bread of Life.

In order to curb our physical hunger and thirst, we must eat and drink on a daily basis. The same is true in our spiritual life, but the food we need to take in to satisfy our spiritual hunger is Jesus. How do we do that? First, we must accept His invitation to come to the table, which is recognizing our need for salvation. Like sending the children to wash their hands before a meal, we too must wash and be cleansed. This is done by acknowledging that we, as all people, have sinned and fallen short of God's glory; then with a penitent heart, simply ask Him to forgive us of our sins and come into our heart, then walk by faith believing that he has done just that. Once we have submitted ourselves to Him, we must eat daily, feeding our soul through the hearing and reading of His Word, through our prayers and quiet time listening for His voice, through obedience as the Holy Spirit does His work in and through us, and become part of His work through the fellowship of other believers and serving others.

The crowd who gathered around Jesus and the disciples were first and foremost hungry for spiritual things. Jesus was the one who also acknowledged their need for physical food. Could it be that he not only wants to satisfy our spiritual hunger, but also generously provide for our daily needs? Come and eat - the Bread of Life is here for you.

In the beginning continued...

"A wonderful service of salvation," says Rev. C.W. and Florence Davis, Superintendent of the Colorado District at the time, whose preaching truly anointed of the Holy Spirit lead many families in the community to find God. The results of that revival still lasts.

The church worshipped in the little white community church, which was very small. In 1933, the decision to build during the depression had God's favor as the whole Karval Community donated with labor, some a portion of their crops, some a brood of turkeys and chickens. Rev. C.W. Davis said, "I have never seen so many who were friends of a church."

Each year, the Nazarenes continued to improve "God's house." In 1942, an old house was moved in just east of the church and fixed up for a parsonage and in 1950 was completely renovated. The estimated cost of materials, donated labor, etc. totaled approximately \$3,000. The renovations were completed in the spring of 1961.

From early days the church has been blessed by God. The standard of holiness enriched the lives of those who consecrated their life to God, which maintained an influence far and wide. The people put God first in their lives and believed the source of all spiritual truth is the Word of God, the Bible, that the Blood of Jesus Christ saves us from all sin, through a second work of grace - entire sanctification, the carnal nature or bent to sinning is removed. The Holy Spirit is manifested through a testimony, proper witnessing, a song sung, a prayer, and preaching Christ from the pulpit.

We are a missionary minded church. Karval Church always turned a willing hand in any zone or district project or task assigned. In 1944, the young people sold more Herald of Holiness subscriptions (215) than any church on the district.

The earliest Sunday School record of 1941 shows an average attendance of 38. By 1961, it had increased to 63. At the close of the 1961-62 assembly year, the average attendance was 80 and on June 12, 1962, all records were broken with 161 in attendance. The church began to look for options to meet the growth and in April 1962 began the process of building the current church building,. Again with the help of many community members, donations of material, skills, labor and funds, the church was completed in 1963 for an approximate cost of \$30,000.

We are accepting donations of one or all of the items listed above for an ongoing period of time. It is important that the sizes indicated are selected due to restrictions on shipments going through ports of entry. Donations may be left at the church on Sunday mornings, or dropped off at the parsonage, 28953 Leland Street in Karval (gray house located north of the church with green/yellow tractor tires out front). The Crisis Care Kits have been used in many places across the United States and even in Colorado after the Waldo Canyon and Black Forest fires. More often they are shipped over seas to help meet the needs of those suffering from life-changing disasters.
