
Ash Wednesday—March 6

Choir Member of the Month— Robert Phillips



Robert Phillips is our church keyboardist, master of the piano and organ. He can also play other instruments, including the triangle and kazoo, and he can belch a recognizable melody. His parents noted his musical talent when, while he was still in diapers, he reworked his Mattel See

and Say to play Bach cantatas and he started composing baroque pieces using his toy piano.

At age 5, Robert started taking piano lessons, frustrating his mom by endlessly playing "Alley Cat" and other novelty songs. He switched to organ at age 12 and got his first church organist job a year later. The clergyperson chastised Robert for playing too loudly during prayer time, so one Sunday, Robert just pretended to play. HYGIENE KITS

On the morning of February 12th, our small group (M and M) plus a few friends were able to put together 50 hygiene kits. These kits include water, toilet paper, deodorant, toothbrush/tooth paste, comb, shampoo, conditioner, soap and lotion. We were able to take 25 kits to Hope Partners in Pomona. As was mentioned before, our goal is to take 25 kits a month to Hope Partners. We also have kits available to share with our homeless/low income who inquire at the church.

Again, we received a nice thank you note from Inland Valley Hope Partners for our efforts.

FOOD POUCHES

We continued to have food pouches available at the church for those in need. These pouches contain items such as water, chips or crackers, potted meat, fruit snack, granola bars/cookies or similar items.



FOOD PANTRY

We continue to share what we have with those in need from our food pantry. Recently we were able to find those items that were due to expire and we took them to Hope Partners as they are used almost immediately. Also, the SOUPER BOWL cans of soup were split between HOPE PARTNERS and the NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE here in Chino. So these food items were put to good use. Again, we can always use more food items.

For St. Patrick's Day (March 17) this year, we'll be having a special contest during coffee hour in the social hall. The person who wears the most green will be named our parish leprechaun and will get a special prize. Please be there—the prize just might be a pot of gold!

Patrick (Maewyn) was born in 385 in Roman Britannia in the modern-day town of Dumbarton, Scotland. He opens his autobiographical St. Patrick's *Confession* with these lines:

My name is Patrick. I am a sinner, a simple country person, and the least of all believers. I am looked down upon by many. My father was Calpornius. He was a deacon; his father was Potitus, a priest, who lived at Bannavem Taburniae. His home was near there, and that is where I was taken prisoner. I was about sixteen at the time.

Known as the Patron Saint Of Ireland, Patrick was instrumental in bringing Christian beliefs to Ireland. Saint Patrick's Day became a day to commemorate Catholicism in Ireland. Originally, it was a day of feasting and celebration held every year on the day of St. Patrick's death, although until the 1700s, the holiday didn't exist in any formal capacity.

One of the more popular myths about St. Patrick is that he drove all the snakes from Ireland after they attacked him during a 40-day fast. He supposedly drove all the snakes into the sea, and that is why there are no slithering serpents in Ireland today.

We now know, however, that there were never any snakes in Ireland. The legends about the snakes actually served as a metaphor for Druidic symbols in Ireland and of St. Patrick's eradication of the pagan traditions that preceded Catholicism in Ireland.

St. Patrick was taken from his home at age 16 and became a slave to Irish pirates for six years. When he was free, he entered the clergy and later returned to Ireland as a missionary. Before he was a prisoner, Patrick's Christian faith meant little to him. That changed during his captivity. His previously ambivalent faith galvanized and served to buoy him through those long, dark days. When he returned home and became a priest, he felt a tremendous burden for the people that had kidnapped him, so he returned to Ireland with a mission.

While he was not, in fact, Irish by birth, he embodied the spirit of Ireland and a love for the country. Somewhat ironically, St. Patrick was an immigrant to Ireland the same way so many Irish would later become immigrants to the United States, where modern St. Patrick's Day was born.

St. Patrick never wore green, according to most accounts, but he did use the Irish shamrock to explain the Holy Trinity to his followers.

The shamrock was meaningful long before Catholicism made its way to Ireland, as it was used in Druid rituals and stories. The significance was the three prongs. Three held significance in pagan traditions. Patrick was successful in converting and baptizing the pagan king.

Green was a color associated with the shamrock and certain groups in Ireland, but in the mid-1700s it fell out of fashion. Blue was the color then most commonly associated with St. Patrick. A group of Irish Protestants rebelled against the British and reclaimed green as their symbolic color. "Wearing the green" came from a popular theme song for the rebellion and has

been synonymous with Irish nationalism ever since.

The very first St. Patrick's Day parade was held in Boston in 1737 as a celebration of Irish culture in the colonies. It later spread in popularity to Dublin and to other American cities, and is now popular in other countries, including Asia. The first parade in Ireland was held in the 1930s.

Patrick was never canonized by the Roman Catholic Church as a saint. Patrick himself told us he was a sinner, not a saint. He died on March 17, 461, in Saul, where he planted his first church.

"St. Patrick's Breastplate" is attributed to Patrick. The word breastplate is a translation of the Latin word *lorica*, a prayer, especially for protection. These prayers were written out and placed on shields of soldiers and knights as they went out to battle. St. Patrick's *Lorica* points beyond himself and his adventurous life. It points to Christ, the one he proclaimed to the people who had taken him captive:

Christ with me.

Christ before me,

Christ behind me,

Christ in me,

Christ beneath me,

Christ above me.

Christ on my right,

Christ on my left,

Christ when I lie down,

Christ when I sit down,

Christ when I arise,

Christ in the heart of every man who thinks of me,

Christ in the mouth of everyone who speaks of me,

Christ in every eye that sees me,

Christ in every ear that hears me.
