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## COASTAL BROWN BEAR HUNT IN ALASKA

(Ursus gyas)

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#### SPRING AND FALL HUNTS

Cold Bay/Izembek Refuge, State & Native lands which are historically and consistently one of the very best areas for trophy Brown Bear in the world. In spring, the big Bears are hunted by the spot and stalk method as they emerge from the den with their thick coats of winter hair. It is common to watch big males following sows for the purpose of breeding. Wolves are also prevalent in the area. In fall, hunting is also done by the spot and stalk method along salmon choked rivers. As the bears leave the salmon streams, you will hunt higher in the prime berry areas and below denning areas as the voracious bruins prepare for a long winter. Wolf and wolverine are present in the area and will often respond to a predator call.

License, Tags, Registration Bear Permit RB370 is <u>MANDATORY</u> with no fee. These should be secured on line well in advance of your hunt at:


License: \$160, non-resident hunting tag: \$1,000-Brown Bear, Wolverine \$175, Wolf-no tag required, Fishing \$105. It is recommended that you purchase a metal locking tag for wolverine. This is in addition to your Brown Bear tag and Hunting License.

**PRICE INCLUDES:** Accommodations, food and beverages, trophy field preparation.

**PRICE EXCLUDES:** Air fare from Anchorage to Cold Bay on PenAir (approx. \$860), charter in Cessna 207 or Piper Aztec twin with Kenai Floatplane Service, (approx. \$1,400-can split if in a group) trophy shipment, special food, cost of medications, immunizations, hospitalizations and services of doctors, charges for evacuation or rescue by ambulance, helicopter or airplane and any other service or product that is not agreed or mentioned in this document.

It is strongly recommended that you purchase a changeable airline ticket. Arctic weather is highly unpredictable at this time of year.

Base Camp Accommodations: Enjoy comfortable heated cabins situated around the kitchen and dining facilities. Share camaraderie while feasting on home cooked meals. Power and hot showers are available at the beginning and end of the hunt. This, however, is a bear camp, not a lodge. Established campsites are in key positions that have been proven over the past 40 years. Each camp consists of 2 tents outfitted with cots, pads, warm sleeping bags, tables, chairs, lanterns, heaters and lots of good food along with skilled and personable guides. Satellite phones are in each camp and each guide is on a check-in schedule with the base camp.



Reservations & Payments: Per person in U.S. Dollars only, confirmation will be upon receipt of a 50% deposit. Balance is due July 1 of the hunt year. You must also read, understand and accept by signing the Terms and Conditions, Release of Liability and the Hunting Contract. Balance is due in cash at the beginning of the hunt. Upon entry into the U.S. with a trophy, present to authorities your Wildlife Declaration Form 3-177. All clients must comply with the U.S. Department of the Interior/Fish and Wildlife Services laws, requirements and conditions.



**Trophy Care**: All bear hides are professionally skinned, fleshed, salted and dried. They are shipped at your expense to an expeditor who will then ship them to your taxidermist. It is best to have your bear hide tanned in Anchorage which assists with the CITES Export Permit and entry Permit to your home country.



Prior to arrival you must have <u>ADF&G Registration Bear Permit</u> <u>RBH368</u>. After arriving in Anchorage, take Peninsula Airways (Pen-Air) to Cold Bay. Pen-Air Reservations 1-800-448-4226 (Cold Bay 907-532-2485). Request David River Lodge rate (10% discount). You will need to pre-arrange your charter with Kenai Floatplane Service (907-2237/4080 (Theo Chesley) who will be there to fly you to David river (base camp). Arrive in Base Camp 2 days prior to start of hunt (allow for weather). Due to size of aircraft we recommend bringing your priority hunting gear in carry-on bags and in your gun case. Your rifle should be equipped with a weather-proof scope and dialed in 2" high at 100 yards. Synthetic stocks perform best in the inclimate weather

The hides of these beautiful bears are the thickest and most luxurious in the world. As a rule of thumb, the prime time is from April 20th to May 5th. During this time, conditions are usually the best All hunts are conducted one guide per hunter. These bears are true inland grizzlies, and are classified as such for B&C. A hunter normally sees around ten bears in a ten day hunt, but like all bear hunting you might see three one day and then none for two days. Please note that we do not hunt Arctic Grizzly every year. The Alaska Department of Fish & Game manages bear seasons on the Alaska Peninsula by staggering the seasons instead of going to a registration or drawing permit system. In addition, we have implemented our own management system in the Arctic to insure good quality Bear hunting for generations to come. Accommodations are in trappers' cabins or Artic Oven tents with wood stoves. This is a very unique hunt and one can expect to see some incredible scenery as well as witness nature in its rawest form. Have you ever seen bears on a kill, a wolf in the wild, or had a lynx cross a path in front of you? Wolverines are sometimes seen; pound for pound, they are the toughest animal in all North America.

Ptarmigan abound in the area and we often awake in the early hours to their distinct clucking. The season is open until April 30 and the fowl is good fare. Wolves are Tundra wolf are prevalent during this season. Wolf tags are no longer necessary in unit 9D. Fishing for Steelhead (if running) can provide much enjoyment if weather and time permits. If you wish to consume liquor it is recommended you bring your favorite adult beverage. We just ask that you do so responsibly. After arriving in David River (base camp) you will be flown to your spike camp.



# FALL MOOSE HUNTS (MUST BE A TWO SPECIE HUNT)

Hunt moose and grizzly bears in the Central Brooks Range, an extremely remote and unspoiled part of Alaska. We've been hunting this area since the early 1990's. All hunters are guided one on one and there are typically between two and four hunters in the field at any time. The only other hunters you can expect to see are those who may be sharing camp.

You will hunt primarily from spike camps equipped with cots, lanterns, and a heat source - either propane or woodstove. Depending on game movement, hunters may spend several days in more primitive backpack spike camp conditions but guides are in routine communication through radio and satellite phone. Float hunts are a very effective way to hunt moose in our area and one we use commonly. Dry bags and waterproof gear are a must on trips of this nature.

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# **HUNT DALL SHEEP** in ALASKA

(Ovis dalli)

This hunt is extremely strenuous. In order to be successful, you are advised to train and arrive in top physical condition. The camp consists of wall tents and bomb shelter style tent camping. Home cooked meals over the Yukon stove or around the camp fire in the old traditional way. Hot showers, wood heat, tables, chairs and enough creature comforts to enjoy without losing the feel of being in the mountains. Spike camps have lightweight expedition grade backpack tents. In most cases, you will share this tent with your guide. Spike camps consist of MSR stoves, freeze dried food, sleeping bags and pads along with a space blanket, your rifle and your personal gear. You will need a frame pack; or make prior arrangements with the outfitter to hire a packer. Cost of a packer is \$250 per day. Guided Fly out fishing is available for lake trout, sheefish, dolly varden, & pike. Non-Resident sheep tag-\$850, Hunting License-\$160, Fishing-\$70 for 7 days, Wolf tag \$30


