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HUNT MUSK OX & REINDEER (CARIBOU) In GREENLAND

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(Ovibos moschatus wardi) (R. tarandus)

Musk Ox These seemingly huge pre-historic looking animals with long, thick and dark brown to black coats are impressive trophies with a high scarcity value. Because of excellent vegetation, trophy Musk Ox in the area you will be hunting are more numerous. Hunting this ancient game species in the rough but fascinating landscape of Greenland is an experience that enthuses every hunter. Musk oxen are hard to bring down, and hunters are advised to use calibers from 30-06 and larger with heavy bullets. Mature bulls stand from 43" to 60" inches high at the shoulder and weigh between 660 lbs. and 880 lbs. Horns of mature bulls reach lengths of 20 inches to 25 1/2 inches. The hunt is a real and challenging spot and stalk hunt. You will often be close to the big arctic Musk Ox when the shot has to be taken.

Caribou In South Greenland, the main trophy, along with Musk Ox, is wild reindeer (Rangifer tarandus tarandus). This species is one of two reindeer/caribou species in Greenland and were brought in from Scandinavia in 1952. Caribou and reindeer are of the same genus and species, Rangifer tarandus, and are differentiated only by sub-species. The feral reindeer are larger than its indigenous Barren Ground Caribou but aside from that their appearance and habits are similar. Reindeer, pronounced Tuttu in Greenlandic, are of great importance to the Inuit as a source of meat, but also plays a role in their history, culture, and traditions. They can vary considerably in size, with females weighing up to 90 kg (198 lb.) and male bulls 150 kg (331 lb.). Reindeer hunting is a challenging experience involving great personal reward. Hunters can choose from various calibers to hunt Reindeer but the 300 Win Mag, the 378 Weatherby, 30 Nosler and 300

Greenland is huge-at over 1,242,737 miles. It's by far the world's largest island and it is the 12 largest country. 82% of Greenland is covered by the ice sheet, yet its close-knit population of just 56,000 would fit on a single soccer field. These few inhabitants are scattered along the thin ribbon of coastline with around a quarter of them living in the capital, Nuuk. The whole northeast region is a national part that is 100 times bigger than Yellowstone and about the size of France and Spain combined. Viking Erik the Red discovered it in the 10th century, optimistically naming it Greenland to encourage his fellow Norsemen to join him there. It is obviously cold, but the weather is far more complicated than this. You must

be prepared for surprises, as conditions can change suddenly. However, the mean 24-hour temperature in June, July and August in most every town is 50°F while all places are below freezing from November through April. The sun doesn't set from May 25 to July 25. This is the time of the midnight sun. Roaming Greenland's tundra and ice are polar bear, musk ox, reindeer, artic fox and mountain hare. The shoreline and waters are visited by, or home to, five different species of seals, 15 types of whale plus walrus.

The camp: Built in 2012, the camp has running water. Most of the menu originates in area (caribou meat, arctic char and fish from the sea). There are 12 cabins, 24 beds, shared bathroom facilities; 6 WC, 4 showers, beds are made up daily and towels, full equipped kitchen, sea- and mountain view, outdoor area with terraces, BBQ's and open fire, fishing, hunting, and sightseeing, outdoor and wilderness camp with all modern facilities, and Sauna.

Itinerary: Fly 3 hours from Reykjavik, Iceland to Narsaruaq, Greenland. The hunting season is from end of July through September. There are options for 3, 4, 6 or 7 nights based on the flight schedule from Narsaruaq to Reykjavik. The 6 night stay is only possible in July and August.

Arrival day 1: Depart from Reykjavik, Iceland at 2:45 PM, arrive in Narsaruaq, Greenland at 3:45 PM (note time zone change), local time. You will be welcomed at the airport and taken by boat to a very scenic 2 1/2-hour boat ride. There will either be a short stopover in the village or Narsaq where hunters can stock up on personal supplies (toiletries, beverages) or this can be done upon arrival in Narsaruaq. It is also possible to take a helicopter transfer between Narsaruaq and the camp for an additional fee (take 30 minutes). When arriving at the camp, the guides and the staff will welcome the hunters with a hot dinner. In the evening hunters settle into camp and if they wish, they can

go to the nearest river and fish.

Hunting and Fishing (days 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 depending upon the length of the stay). Hunters will hunt the whole coastline with their guide until they spot the right trophy that they desire to take. Breakfast and dinner are served at the lodge. While hunting, lunch packages will be brought. After the hunter has taken his trophy, the rest of the time can be spent hunting Artic Fox, Mountain Hare or Seal (which is not exportable) and fishing. It is also possible for the hunter to take another trophy, paid beforehand or on the spot. We do recommend that hunters and anglers take some time off to go on sightseeing around the area.

Departure day (day 4,5, 7 or 8) breakfast and preparation for departure. Transfer to Narsaruaq airport. The latest check in is at 3:30 PM. Flight departure from Narsaruaq to Reykjavik at 4:30 PM, arrival at 9:30 PM local time in Iceland. At Reykjavik airport, you will be welcomed to Iceland and taken to the hotel of your choice (not included).

The law is that all trophies are skinned and caped and then frozen until the end of the hunting season which is usually in October and, at that time, they are all shipped to Denmark where the skulls are cleaned, and the hides are prepared for export to the hunter's home country or total mounting and shipping can be done from First Class Trophy: www.firstclasstrophy.com or email: office@firstclasstrophy.com

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Price Includes: Meeting upon arrival in Reykjavik Airport, Iceland, transfer for Greenland flight, welcoming at arrival in Greenland, transportation by boats according to the itinerary, full board and lodging at the camp, shared cabin, 1 guide to every 2 hunters, all hunting and fishing licenses in Greenland, 1 reindeer trophy and all paperwork for importing rifles and ammunitions to Greenland.

Price Excludes: Flight to and from Reykjavik to/from Narsaruaq Greenland, optional helicopter transfers, skinning, caping and shipping to Iceland (First Class Trophy in Denmark and the shipment to Denmark and to your importer & taxidermist), beverages, gratuities, rifle rental (\$100 per day of use and ammo from \$4 - \$7 per shell), special food, cost of medications, immunizations, hospitalizations and services of doctors, charges for evacuation of rescue by ambulance helicopter or airplane and any other services or product that is not agreed or mentioned in this document.

The hunting grounds for the Musk Ox are 4 hours away by boat. Hunters and their guide are taken to the grounds in the morning and return them to the camp in the evening.
