Progress and another idea

My headline last month was "Progress and another idea." The more things change, the more they stay the same.

My partnerships with Chemists Without Borders and the local private school are going well. CWB is about to update its website and put out a newsletter. The website will mention the science education clearinghouses. We are close to finding teachers for the summer camps at the private school, and I am making good progress in the curriculum development. I also submitted a proposal to the summer camp my younger daughter went to for many years. The intent would be to conduct a fun, brief seminar on the science of light and color, as it is an arts camp.

Due to <u>NaNoWriMo</u>, the books for kids about what scientists do has taken a back seat. However, <u>Camp Nano</u> (April and July) will be an ideal time to work on those projects.

My next new idea: I connected with an elementary school teacher, and we had a good discussion about her students' upcoming science fair projects. This teacher has a science background, but many do not. I think it might be useful to provide pro bono consulting to elementary school teachers on science fairs and science projects. This would not be a replacement of their curriculum, but a chance for teachers to work through any questions with an actual scientist. More later!

Advisory Board Ideas

On November 9th, SIE held its first advisory board meeting. The wide-ranging discussion covered a lot of ground, and I discuss the highlights here.

Suggestions for further SIE activities:

- 1) Bring alumni scientists into school classrooms as guest speakers/demonstrators. Some of this has been done virtually during the pandemic.
- 2) Get students to act as demonstrators of cool science to younger students
- 3) Include community/citizen science in the SIE clearinghouses. An example of citizen science includes a long effort on monarch butterfly migration. Some organizations already promote this work, such as communityscienceexchange.org

Ideas about what is important for SIE are: diversity, books, science is everywhere, professional development, teacher training, shared educational resources, and science communication.
