March for the Sultan Abdul Medjid, Gioacchino Rossini

When Sultan Abdul Medjid Khan of Turkey decided to have the military music of his army revised to be comparable to military bands in Western Europe, he invited Giuseppe Donizetti, brother of the famous opera composer, Gaetano, to assume the task. Giuseppe Donizetti agreed and resided in Turkey for many years as director of the Sultan's military band activities. He was a prolific composer, producing many compositions and arrangements, including a march dedicated to the Sultan. He commissioned his brother and Rossini each to write a march for the Sultan, so there are three marches bearing the

Douglas Townsend found a manuscript of the Rossini march in the library of the Milan Conservatory of Music and adapted it in a modern instrumentation. Saxophones, euphoniums, bass clarinets, and valved brass instruments had not been invented in Rossini's era, so they are not included in the score. On the assumption that Rossini would have used modern instruments had he lived into the 20th century, they are included in this setting for band.

I first heard the Rossini march in a performance by the US Marine Band as the opener of a concert given at the Mid-West Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago. It is a vigorous little piece, chock full of notes, but notably lacking the extended crescendos for which Rossini is famous in his overtures. Rossini's music is often commandeered to accompany film productions. One cannot hear William Tell or Barber of Seville without conjuring images of the Lone Ranger, or of Bugs Bunny massaging Elmer Fudd's head. In this little march, you are invited to conjure up your own images, perhaps of a mounted Sultan galloping toward an adversary, scimitar waving madly in the wind.

Color Bost Assessment

Colors was written in 1998 for the Belgian trombonist, Ben Haemhouts. It takes both the solo trombonist and the band on a virtuoso romp through impressions suggested by four colors. Yellow is broad, grand, melodic and sunny in disposition. In an extended exercise in changing and asymmetrical meters, Red is fast, bright, cheerful, optimistic and more than a little challenging for the band. Blue, as the title suggests, is slow and reflective. In Red, the composer pulls out all of the stops. It is fast, rhythmic, tuneful, and charges ahead at full tilt, ending with the Yellow theme.

When Charlie Vernon agreed to come to Brevard to perform with the community band, I asked him what he wanted to play. I suggested some things on which we have collaborated before. He dismissed all of those titles and said he wanted to play a piece called *Colors* because it was pretty. I asked if it

was difficult, because this was a community band, not the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. Were there any asymmetrical or changing meters? Charlie said, "No, it's easy; there may be a bar or two in seven-eight, but it sounds like Star Wars." Charlie was only partially correct. The piece is beautiful, but it is difficult and has more asymmetrical meter changes than there are kudzu vines in South Carolina.

Prelude to Act III of Kunihild, Cyrill Kistler

Cyrill Kistler was a German composer of music drama, born in a village near Augsburg. As a boy, he was encouraged in music by his grandfather and studied the flute. He enrolled in the Munich Conservatory and became interested in the art of composition. Kistler was a great admirer of Wagner and in 1883 produced his first opera, *Kunihild*, which was thoroughly Wagnerian, even to the use of leitmotivs. Kistler wrote several later operas, all in the style of Wagner, and he produced several music theory texts based on the harmonic principles of Wagner.

The arranger, Robert M Barr, was a mentor of mine. He gave me my first conducting and tuba lessons, and he ushered me through the first doors I encountered on my way to a musical career. I first encountered his arrangement of *Kunihild* back in the Stone Age, as a young member of a district high school band which Mr. Barr was conducting.

British Eighth, Alonzo (Zo) Elliot

An American, Zo Elliot wrote his march *The British Eighth* in 1943. It was dedicated to General Bernard Montgomery and the British Eighth Army after a triumphant sweep across North Africa in 1942. The march quickly became popular with British military bands, then found its way across the Atlantic to the United States. It has maintained popularity among band masters because it conveys an air of dignified pageantry. We chose this march at the request of a community band member.

Variations on Barnacle Bill, the Sailor, Steven Frank-Jamie Hafner

Some years ago, back in the '7o's, Charlie Vernon happened upon a copy of a copy of a copy of a bass trombone solo with piano accompaniment of *Barnacle Bill the Sailor*. It had been arranged by Steven Frank, and Charlie had been using it as an encore when he gave solo recitals. One day in 1983, Charlie asked me to make a band arrangement of the piano score. I agreed to do this on the assumption that the band version would be heard only once at the Brevard Music Center.

Steven Frank's piano version was pretty clever, so I took his cue and decided on a fun arrangement. I had a good time sitting at the kitchen table, writing things that would be interesting for the band to play and would keep the audience from fidgeting in their seats. I even harmonized one variation in the

polytonal style of Charle Ives, thinking, "That'll make their teeth itch."


We had a successful performance, the audience applauded, and all went well. The band arrangement has found its way into publication and is receiving occasional performances.


Requiem, Giuseppe Verdi-Emil Mollenhauer


The Requiem by Verdi is a very large dramatic work for full orchestra, vocal soloists and chorus. It was written in memory of the Italian writer and humanist, Alessandro Manzoni, who died in 1873. Verdi had met Manzoni in 1868 and became an admirer and artistic colleague. After Manzoni's death, Verdi was inspired to compose this mass, complete with Latin text. It received the first performance in Milan in May of 1874, on the first anniversary

The band arrangement by Emil Mollenhauer excerpts portions of the original, but without voices. In this version, the vocal solos are given to solo euphonium, trumpet ensemble, and solo trombone. In rehearsals, the entire band has been guided by the knowledge that there are words to most of what they play. We are playing this selection at the request of a community band member.




