- Improvements/Increases in water patrols

Aquatic Plant Management (APM) -Bill McCormick-

Started harvesting on May 16, 2022, however had equipment issues during the first two weeks of harvesting.

Herbicide treatments to navigation lanes in Buena, parts of the river and lake Tichigan took place June 7th, 2022.

Negotiated with DNR to cut in water less than 3 feet

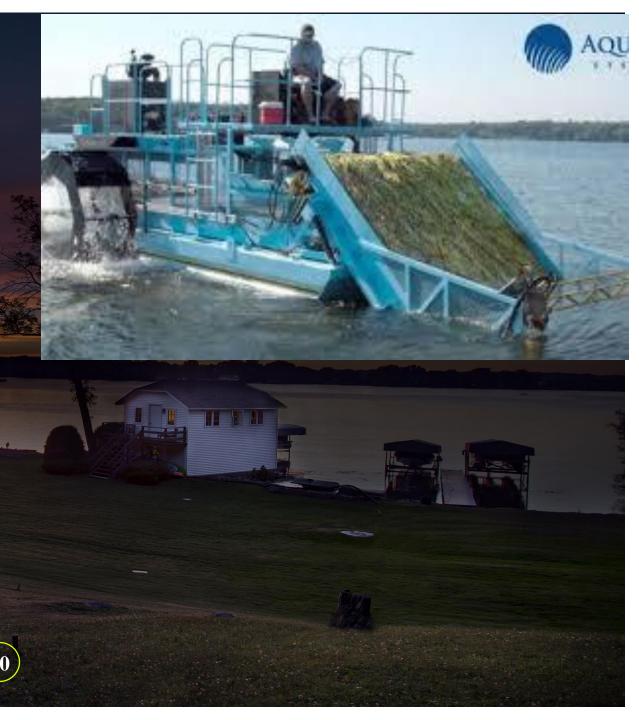
Secured a DNR grant for \$143,000 to off-set purchase of new weed harvester. 9'X6'12,500 lbs. Aquarius Harvester.

Sold Eco-Harvester backto manufacturer, used proceeds to purchase an additional Inland Lakes weed harvester. Estimated arrival June of 2023.

Weeds are definitely down from 2021 season. ProcellaCOR, herbicide after harvesting method and reduction in zebra mussels.

Harvesting team removed roughly 1,130,000 lbs. (113 trailer loads) of weeds. Down from 252 loads in 2021.

Our harvesting operations are extremely inefficient due to great distances to public and private launches for weed off loading!

Plan for 2023:

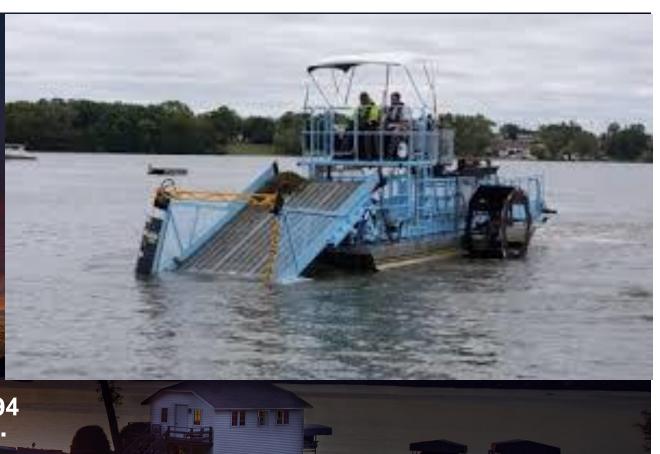
Seek a DNR grant for help with our ProcellaCOR treatment for Lake Tichigan. 94 acres will be largest area ever treated in WI.

Look at constructing a new boat launch site to be used for weed harvest off-loading.

Continue with no-cost lease of the weed harvester from Aquarius.

Harvesting operations scheduled to start May 15, 2023.



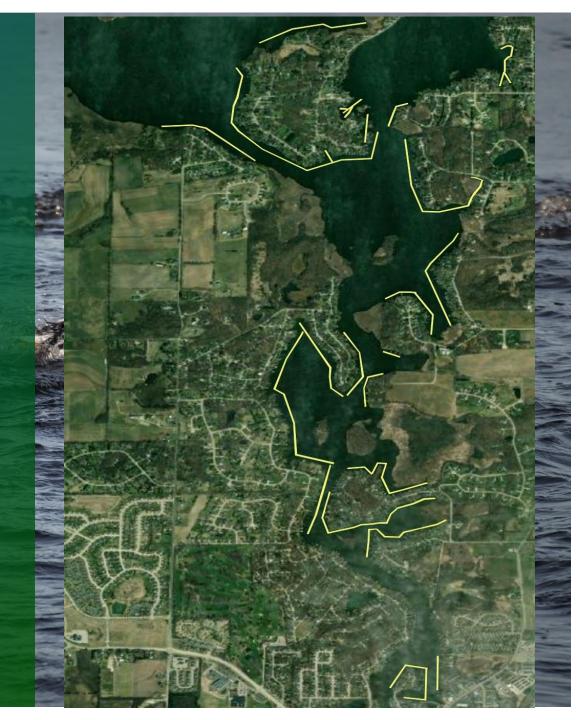

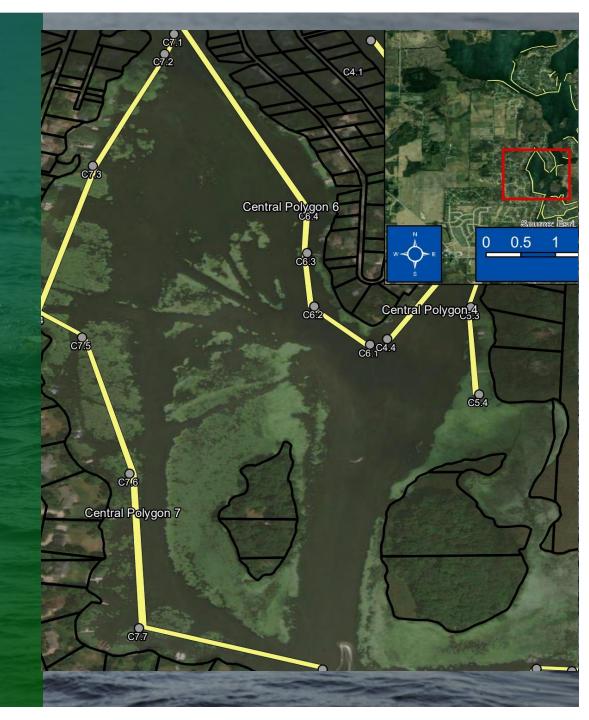
- Developed New Dredging Plan That Includes Access Channels
- RFP for Engineering of Project Manual / Dredging Bidding Documents
- Selected and Approved Engineer K & A
- Project Manual for Dredging Completed
- RFP for Dredging Issued No Bids Received
- Significant New Disposal and Sediment Spreading Sites and Temporary Storage Areas Secured – Greatly Reducing Cost
- Initial DNR Permit Process for Small Scale Dredging Applied For
- \$50,000 Grant Secured for 2022

Not Your Father's Dredging!

- This is not the dredging you have heard about for the last 15 years
- This is not limited to dredging around piers, docks, and boat lifts in the bays that you heard about last year
- Nearly 8 miles of channels 25' wide and up to 5' deep will be dredged in our waterway.
- No owner will be forced to participate or pay additional costs above and beyond their current annual fee
- Anyone in the project areas can opt-out and MUST opt out in order to not pay additional costs
- Removing 145,000 cubic yards of sediment

How Does This Affect Me?

- If you are an owner on Lake Tichigan or the Fox River and are not in the project area....... you will benefit by being able to travel to additional areas of the waterway that were previously inaccessible by most boats at no additional cost above and beyond your current fee
- If you are in any of the project areas and do not opt out of the project, you will benefit both from the channels as well as a 30' wide dredging path to your pier or shoreline, up to 5' deep
- If you opt out, you will not benefit from the dredging to your pier or shoreline
- If there are not enough participants in your area, your channel may be eliminated from the project

Who Will Pay for This?

- From the initial RFP process, we received feedback from bidders that \$8,000,000 would likely have been the total cost prior to our re-bid efforts
- New clarifications, changes to bid requirements, access point contracts, disposal site contracts, reduction of travel on town roads are expected to reduce costs
- 595 properties lie in the project areas
- Directly affected property owners shouldering majority of cost
- A portion of the annual fee currently paid by all riparian owners will be allocated towards the total cost of the project as a part of the WWMD annual budget

Why Should I Pay For This?

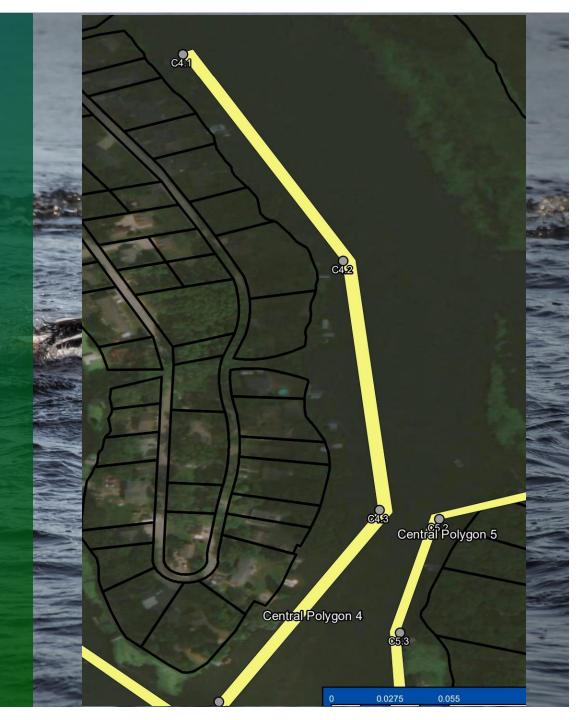
- The project has a positive affect on the entire waterway removing 145,000 cubic yards of sediment that is loaded with nitrates that encourage the growth of invasive aquatic weeds
- Improves key river and channel point access for everyone's navigational opportunities
- If there is not enough participation in your area, your channel may be removed from the project
- Ability to get your boat from your pier out to river and lake in 2023 and for your kids and grandchildren.

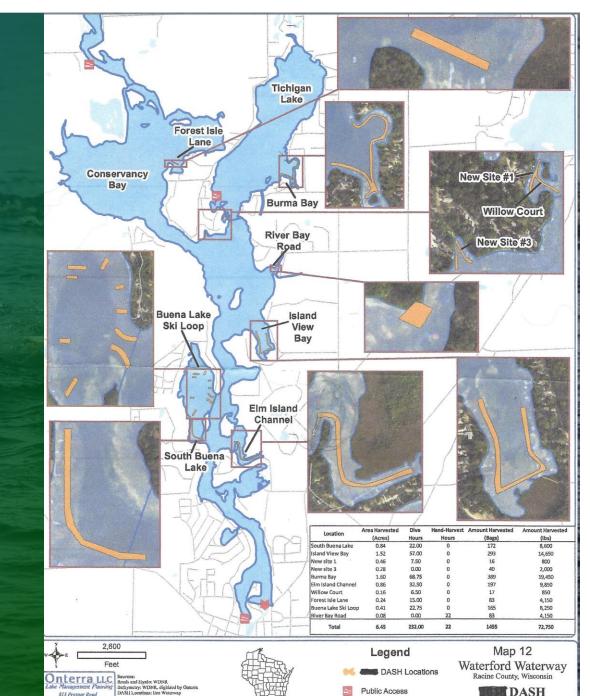
Details of the Project:

- In winter of 2022-2023 we will go out for bid again, this time with contracts for access sites, disposal sites, and sediment storage areas secured and provided to dredging contractors also DPW will have approved town road travel routes prior to bidding process
- Special meeting will be held in winter of 2023 which will require owners to approve project to move forward
- If approved, project will be awarded to a bidder
- Project would start on July 5, 2023 and end in December of 2025 or sooner

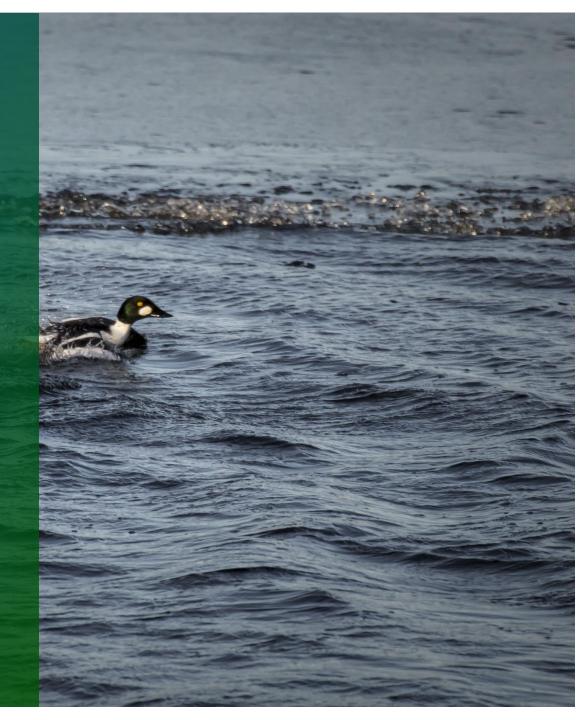
Special Projects -Scott Uhler-
