**Maya Angelou** (1928–2014) was a renowned American author, poet, playwright, and civil rights activist. Angelou’s fame rose with her autobiographical book *I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings*. She worked with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Malcolm X, as well as Presidents



Ford, Carter, and Obama. Angelou’s beloved poems include “Still I Rise,” “Phenomenal Woman,” and “On the Pulse of Morning,” the inaugural poem she wrote and recited for President Bill Clinton. Interestingly, before her writing career, she was San Francisco’s first female and first African American cable car conductor.
