## Happy Birthday!

**Maya Lin**, born in 1959, is an American architect and artist. At age 21, when she was still an undergraduate student at Yale University, her design was chosen for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. The structure,



which was completed in 1982, is heralded as one of the most important memorials of the period. Her inspiration for the memorial was the idea of cutting the earth with a knife and letting that wound heal to symbolize the loss of the fallen soldiers. Lin describes the central focus of her work as finding “balance and tension between the man-made and the natural.”
