Volunteer Spotlight: Stecia Lansdell and Sophie



This quarter the

Volunteer Spotlight is on Stecia Lansdell and her dog, Sophie. Stecia and her family moved to the USA from England 11 years ago for her husband's work.

He works as an accountant for an energy company. The family intended to stay only three or four years but they are still here. Two of Stecia's children were born in England (Matthew, now 15, and Rachel, now 12), and one was born here in the States —Johnny, who is now 9 years old.

Stecia teaches prekindergarten four mornings a week and visits Iliff once a week, usually on Thursday afternoons with Sophie, the family's beagle mix, who is about 9 years old. The family adopted her from Fairfax Animal Shelter in January 2007.

Sophie loves people, more than she does other dogs. She gets frightened of dogs she is not familiar with, so the volunteer team tries to schedule their visit when they know

other dogs are not around!

Sophie's love of people is the reason Stecia decided to

Stecia has a couple of special ladies that she loves to spend a good part of her time visiting, but the team also pops into other residents' rooms and often stops in the hallways so Sophie can be petted.

FPOW is a wonderful organization as the residents' faces truly light up when they see a friendly

dog. Before Johnny started school, he too would accompany Sophie and his mom; a child and a friendly dog are a wonderful tonic for a lot of the residents.

We were amazed at how lovely the facility was and at how welcoming the staff were. Each time we encountered the Activities Director, she thanked us

Perspective by a New Recruit

I was 16 years old when I first learned about Pets on Wheels. I was a receptionist working in a nursing home. I loved to see the volunteers come in each week and especially to see how they connected with the residents in such a unique way through their dogs. I promised myself that one day I, too, would be a Pets on Wheels volunteer.

I'm 41 years old now and have a daughter, Mika, who is 11. In sixth grade, the students are obligated to do a service learning project where they donate five hours of time to the community. As soon as I heard about it, I suggested Fairfax Pets on



profusely for coming and volunteering our time.

Mika has two friends who are doing her service learning project with her. We wander the halls once a week, knocking on doors and asking if the residents would like visitors. We've found several who are our favorites. One couple invites us in each time, asking the girls about their interests and sharing theirs. The husband is a Civil War buff and has shared artifacts he found while metal detecting in the wilderness. He also studied physics. I asked him once if he'd like me to bring him some books on physics. He replied, "Honey, I wrote the book on physics!" and proceeded to share his text with me. He

wasn't kidding—he really did write the book on physics! His wife and I compare stories about parenting and admire my daughter and her friends together. She raised four children herself and has lots of tales to tell.

One of the most heartwarming moments was after we had left their apartment and were wandering, knocking on doors, looking for more residents to visit. Our knocks went unanswered and we passed by their door on our way out. We could hear them through the door, exclaiming, "Wasn't that a nice surprise? Oh, they were so lovely! It was so nice of them to come by ... that made getting up this morning really worth it!"

Another of our favorite residents relayed stories of her evacuation from France at the start of World War II. She had been living in France at a boarding school while her mother stayed behind in New York. At the start of the war, she was loaded on a ship and sailed unaccompanied across the ocean. She explained how the crew were moved out of their quarters and made to sleep in the bottom of emptied-

out pools to make room for more children. I was never interested in history much in school, but the girls and I were amazed and totally captivated by her stories.

The last of our favorite residents has traveled the country three times with her husband and her two Westies in an RV. She regales us with tales of her times in each state, shares family pictures and "talks dog" with us. The last time we visited, she said, "I was just thinking about you and hoping you would visit me soon."

It's so lovely to pass the hours, sitting and listening to the

residents' stories. It wouldn't be possible to visit like that if it weren't for Diego, our ambassador. He lets us gain entry to these peoples' lives, to their memories, their stories, their knowledge and their passions. We are so honored to be able to spend time with the residents.

If you are considering becoming a Fairfax Pets on Wheels volunteer, all I can say is, DO IT!

Sit/Stay! Heat Wave!

As I write this, the trees are budding, the birds are chirping, the grass is growing—and it's getting warmer.

Time to grab the dog and get outside! It's also time to refresh your memory about dogs and heat. Dogs don't do heat the same way people do.

Most obviously, dogs are always wearing their winter coats. Dogs also don't regulate their body temperatures as efficiently as people do. Dogs release heat primarily by panting. They do perspire, but only through their foot pads.

Dogs with flat faces (pugs, for example) can't pant as effectively as other breeds and have a harder time cooling off. So it's very important to pay close attention to the temperature outside as you plan your dog-related activities to minimize the chances of heat-related illnesses, which can be fatal. With a little planning and fore-

thought, you and your dog will have a safe, fun summer.

First, know the symptoms of heat stroke: rapid breathing, heavy panting, salivation, fatigue, and possibly muscle tremors and staggering.

If your dog shows any of these symptoms, move it to a cool, shady place. Apply cool (not cold) wet towels to cool its body down, offer (but don't force) cool (not cold) water and call your vet. Better yet—manage your dog's day to avoid heat illnesses:

- Exercise your dog early in the morning or later in the evening—avoid the hottest part of the day. And don't overexercise your dog.
- Always have a source of cool, fresh water available for your dog.
- If your dog is outside, make sure it has a cool, shady place to go.
- Do NOT (not!) ever leave your dog in a parked car in hot weather. Not even for a couple of minutes. Even with windows rolled down, a parked car can become a furnace in a matter of minutes. So ignore the pleading eyes ("Please take me with you!") and leave your dog home when you are running errands on hot days.
- Walking on hot pavement can burn your dog's pads. If the pavement is too hot for you to walk on barefoot, it's too hot for your dog too.
- Dogs can get sunburn. Pay attention when they are in the direct sunlight.

And a few final thoughts about summer fun. Dogs love to party, but you need to keep a few things in mind.


Pool safety—don't assume your dog knows how to swim! Be careful around the pool.
