#### LCIF: A strong start to a promising year by the numbers and beyond

The disasters never stop—so neither can we. But thanks to the generosity and commitment of Lions around the globe, **LCIF** continues to bring hope and support where it's needed most.

- In the past year, LCIF raised an impressive \$81.5 million worldwide to empower service projects and disaster relief. Here in Multiple District 5M, we raised \$729,838, with District 5M2 contributing \$95,438—that's 139% of our goal. Incredible!
- Even more inspiring? Over 19 million people were served through LCIF Grants. That's impact you can feel.
- Fun fact: Camp Sweet Life—a summer camp in Minnesota designed exclusively for children with Type 1 Diabetes—was showcased during the International Convention Plenary Session! The camp received two \$37,500 grants from LCIF, giving kids a chance to experience summer like every child should. Another fact, LeSueur County CSL Lions Club is our newest club in 5M-2.
- Me can't say it enough: thank you. Your donations fuel this mission. And while the work isn't done, we're moving forward together.
- Special Olympics Celebration in Minneapolis next year. Through a unique pass-through grant, any donations made to LCIF and earmarked "Special Olympics" will:
  - Be credited toward Melvin Jones Fellowship recognition, and
  - Be returned dollar-for-dollar to the Special Olympics in support of their incredible work.

So far, we have collected over \$41,000 for the Special Olympics in Minneapolis.. It's a win-win, and we'll share more details soon!

Together, we serve—and together, we lead with compassion, vision, and heart. Let's keep the momentum going!

There are many opportunities to participate in leadership training. Regional Lions Leadership Institute (RLLI) is coming up September 25-28, 2025. This program offered by Lions Clubs International (LCI) is designed to develop leadership skills for both Lions and Leos. It prepares members for leadership roles at various levels within the organization, including club, zone, district, and multiple district levels. The program provides a core curriculum with elective sessions, allowing for customization to meet local leadership development needs. Look for the additional information in this newsletter.

In addition, LCI has numerous offerings on the website. There is specific training available for club officers and zone chairs. If you are a Lion interested in obtaining your bachelors, master's or doctorate through Lions University you can find information on the website.

Almost immediately upon joining, Trish got involved with the club's playground committee that, over several years, planned and bonded for a \$125,000 upgrade to the Lafayette kiddie park.

An excellent organizer, Gieseke has provided her talents to the pie social, Santa Day, Halloween, Night to Unite meal, and 45th anniversary committees. She chaired the club's August food event in the summer of 2024.

When the club's second vice president position remained open through many months, Trish volunteered to fill it, then moved up to first vice president. She became club president last week—but had already conducted several meetings in the absence of the president.

When the scholarship committee needed another member, Trish volunteered and led the plan to revamp the program. She also headed the silent auction committee for a very successful benefit for a teen who lost her father.


