November brings on a familiar and popular tradition in my club... The Jordaness Fashion Show! For the last 32 years, the Jordaness Lions club has been kicking off the holiday season in style -- literally! The club's annual Fashion Show, one of its biggest fundraisers, has become a tradition that is looked forward to by members of the Jordan community, and by friends, family members and Lions from neighboring counties and clubs.

The show was the brainchild of Lion Colleen Eischens, a charter member of the club, who has continued to play an active role in the fundraiser since its inception. The original event included a luncheon, followed by a fashion show that featured local women and children modeling outfits from Betty Lu's and Kids R Us. Money was raised from ticket sales, and from the sale of a commemorative Christmas ornament, which was designed by a local artist. The sale of the glass ornament was such a hit that it became an annual tradition for 25 years. Each year a new ornament was designed, featuring an artist-rendered drawing of a landmark in Jordan. The ornaments became collector's

items, and many are currently on display at the Jordan Public Library.

Over the years, the fashion show changed venues as it gained more and more popularity. For the past nine years, it has been held at the Ridges at Sand Creek in Jordan. The event, which typically takes place the Saturday before Thanksgiving, still includes a luncheon and fashion show, but is now enhanced with amusing entertainment provided by the Jordaness ladies. The entertainment varies each year, but has included dancing, singing, skits, and other pursuits designed to generate laughter and buoy up the spirits of the audience members.

To encourage Jordan residents to shop locally, the fashion show committee currently works with local boutiques to provide fashions. Outfits are still modeled by local residents, and each year the reigning "Miss Jordan," joins the list of models after she is crowned at Jordan's Heimatfest celebration. The inclusion of local "celebrities" as models is always a crowd-pleaser, and this year the local celebrity model will be none other than PDG Lion Anna!

Through the years, additional fundraising opportunities were added to the event, including a silent auction, raffles, and a wall-of-wine sale. Due to the generosity of the community, club members, and patrons of the event, profits reached an all-time high of over \$10,000 in 2019. Unfortunately, Covid-19 threw a wrench in the works for the 2020 committee, but they persevered and offered a virtual fashion show on Facebook, and an online silent auction, which was quite successful.

Each year, event proceeds are divided between community needs and Lions projects. This year, proceeds from the show will benefit the Jordan Area Food Shelf, the Jordan Holiday Food Basket project, the Lions Gift of Sight, and Project New Hope.

If you're looking for a way to jumpstart your holidays, consider attending this fun and charitable event. The theme this year is: It's a Minnesota Sweater-Weather Get-Together! Patrons are invited to join in the fun by wearing a favorite sweater, holiday sweater, ugly holiday sweater...you get the idea! The show takes place on Saturday, November 20th, at the Ridges at Sand Creek in Jordan. Social hour begins at 11:00, with a luncheon at noon. Tickets are limited to 200 this year and can be purchased for \$25 by contacting a Jordaness Lions member, or by calling Lion Donna Will at 952-492-2993. Come and join the tradition -- you won't regret it!


### **Happy Holidays Fellow Lions!**

I haven't heard any Christmas music yet or seen a decorated tree in a store, but I know it's time to think about gifts for our families and friends. I come from a long line of early shoppers and gift mailers. My brother lives in New Zealand and a slow boat used to be the way packages got to him. Airlines have taken over international mail now so it's (usually) pretty fast. You've likely heard or read that the Post Office will be slowing down delivery service and maybe you have even experienced delays in receiving mail or knowing someone has gotten a letter or package you mailed. Delivery issues are happening locally as well as internationally. I mailed my brother a birthday gift, on July 1, for his July 29 birthday. HE HAS NOT GOTTEN IT YET!

As he and I talked about this we decided to not mail Christmas gifts to each other. Instead, we will be making donations, in each other's names to non-profit organizations. And you can probably guess, my donation will be going to LCIF. I then began to wonder if my fellow Lions would be interested in doing the same. You can make a donation to LCIF as a gift to anyone you choose. Start by clicking the "Donate" button on the LCI website, and follow the prompts. When you get to question #4, "Is recognition requested for this donation?" choose "Yes, for a special occasion" in the dropdown menu. You then type in the recipient's name and an optional donation message. LCIF will send a card if you furnish the recipient's address. If you donate \$50 or more, you also qualify for a "Lions Share Supporter' pin for yourself.

LCI is still experiencing COVID related delays making processing and recognition delivery times unpredictable. So, you can also access a document on the 5M2 website to send your recipient letting them know of your donation to LCIF.

Remember 100% of your gift will be used to magnify the service of Lions close to home and around the world. I think that expresses the spirit of any holiday.



**FANTASTIC NEWS** – 1VP Brian Sheehan will be inducted as Lions International President at the International Convention in Montreal in June of 2022.

It is with great pride that a Lion from our own Multiple MD5M and a Minnesota Lion from Bird Island, MN has risen to the call to become the International President for 2022-2023. This journey has been exciting and challenging for both Lion Brian and Lion Lori and has required extreme dedication and perseverance and expense on their part due to the pandemic pushing Lion Brian's position as IP back a whole year. However, wheels are now in fast motion for this to happen next year and as Lions, we should be thrilled

to have Lions Brian and Lori leading the world's largest service organization.

Back in 2017 we asked if the clubs in 5M2 would support the Sheehan Campaign by making a onetime \$100 donation. Over half of the clubs in 5M2 stepped up to the challenge and 1VP Brian was extremely appreciative for this support. # 100 Ideas to Recruit New Lions

- Ask someone. Ask One!
- 2. Bring a guest to meetings
- 3. Advertise in newspapers & cable TV
- 4. Have a clear club goal & a strategic plan
- 5. Letters or personal contact with local businesses
- 6. Contact with Chamber of Commerce
- 7. Place customized bookmarks in library books
- 8. Have public meetings at malls, outdoors, etc.
- 9. Have a booth at malls, fairs, festivals etc.
- 10. Place pamphlets in doctors' offices, hospitals, cafeterias, libraries, etc.
- 11. Create videos of your events and promote your Club on YouTube
- 12. Host an Open House
- 13. Hold a club assembly only on membership
- 14. Ask former Leos, Effective Speaking Contestants, Lions Quest grads, Vision Screening school contact, etc.
- 15. Make the membership chair an active Club Officer that reports at each meeting
- 16. Put together guest information packets (see <u>Family recruitment Brochure</u> / <u>Campus Club recruitment brochure</u> / <u>Standard recruitment brochure</u> / <u>Club recruitment brochure template</u>)
- 17. Service projects that serve a need in the community
- 18. Invite family members to join
- 19. Send letters to people in the news with an invitation to visit the club
- 20. Print club business cards with club meeting location and time
- 21. Distribute extra copies of LION magazine and attached information about your club in waiting rooms, etc.
- 22. Hold high-profile meetings (all candidates meetings, special guests, etc.)
- 23. Hold wine and cheese receptions for prospective members
- 24. Ask for help from your Region Chairperson/Zone Chairperson/GMT Coordinator/DG Team
- 25. Have a special guest day
- 26. Send club members to a district membership seminar
- 27. Make prospective members feel important
- 28. Honour outstanding community members with awards like Melvin Jones, Awards by Club (certificates), etc.
- 29. Don't take age into consideration
- 30. Make some meetings social events
- 31. Build a club web site and a social media presence
- 32. Use email contacts to promote your club
- 33. Put posters in public areas (see "<u>We are Lions</u>" club recruitment poster / look at posters other Lions created <u>Pinterest page of posters</u> / or be inspired by <u>Our Global Causes</u>)
- 34. Ask corporations and employers to sponsor or subsidize membership
- 35. Have a reward/recognition program for those who bring in new members at Club level
- 36. Create more fun
- 37. Give a money-back guarantee—if after 3 months a new member does not want to stay, return their fees
- 38. Invite the media to cover well-known speakers
- 39. Use word of mouth
- 40. Network with coworkers, friends, and family
- 41. Follow up with guests
- 42. Place a coloured dot on the watch of every member to remind them to bring a guest
- 43. Lead by example—how many members have you recruited?
- 44. Have members give talks at other organizations
- 45. Provide guests with free meals
- 46. Update your club's satisfaction surveys. Your Club Your Way / Know your Ratings / CQI
- 47. Look for members in ethnic groups not represented in your club
- 48. Provide brochures for new employee packets in local companies with approval from HR/owner

- 51. Hold joint meetings with other groups
- 52. Share your club experience with others
- 53. Participate in community events
- 54. Write letters to the newspaper about the campaigns your club is working on
- 55. If a prospect can't join because of your meeting day & time, suggest other nearby clubs
- 56. Publicize club successes, elections, events, in local newspapers
- 57. Circulate the club newsletter widely
- 58. Design a club brochure Club recruitment brochure template
- 59. Hold recruiting events with two or more clubs
- 60. Form/join a speakers' bureau or organize a pool of speakers to be available for presentations outside Club
- 61. Wear your Lions pin at ALL times
- 62. Mention your club at meetings of other organizations during announcements
- 63. Send newsletter to guests
- 64. When asked about your leadership skills or career success, tell them about your club
- 65. Ask the DG, VDGs, or GMT to attend a board meeting to talk about membership
- 66. Ask every member to submit 3 prospects to the membership chair
- 67. Always make it FUN
- 68. Give every member a club decal or bumper stickers for their car
- 69. Give testimonials about your club while guests are at the meeting
- 70. Repeatedly invite prospective members
- 71. Practice selling your club at Club meetings—have a one minute elevator speech ready
- 72. Conduct a Membership Satisfaction Survey see How Are Your Ratings and the Member Satisfaction Guide
- 73. The club president asks three club members as a personal favour to each recruit one new member
- 74. Bring your boss to a club meeting
- 75. Make contact with women's business associations
- 76. Bring your co-workers to a club meeting
- 77. Bring your subordinates to a club meeting
- 78. Have new member kits available at every meeting
- 79. Use books, brochures, videos, posters and other resources from LCI
- 80. Hand out invitation cards for a "free" lunch (breakfast, dinner)
- 81. Have members constantly promote and rave about your club
- 82. Meet at a good location
- 83. Assign members to five-person recruitment teams—each team brings in a new member every six months
- 84. Develop a strategic membership plan as a year-round priority growth needs to be planned

- 87. Select a missing career or other classification in the membership and work on filling it

The article below is from the Leader Dog for the Blind newsletter. It relates to today's stories of changes within our healthcare personnel with stories of Covid burnout. Leader Dog for the Blind has impacted her life with adjustments she had to make in her life due to her progression of her Diabetes. ### Getting Back to the Top of Her Game

Working as a critical care nurse in a Level 1 trauma center is mentally, physically, and emotionally taxing. It takes a strong person to do this work. Now, add on a few additional responsibilities— volunteering as a medic with the fire department and working as a flight nurse—and you get a life that not many people could handle. But Kim Busboom did, and she loved it. Diabetic since age 11, the disease caught up to Kim in the form of diabetic retinopathy that slowly reduced her vision. After moving from hands-on nursing to a desk job, Kim realized that the glare of a computer monitor was putting too much stress on her already diminished sight. So, after 30 years of a career she loved, Kim retired. Kim's years of helping others gave way to the need to help herself. She relied heavily on skills she learned when becoming a certified life coach over a decade earlier. As a life coach, Kim helped people get to the top of their game. She now coached herself through the three steps she coached her clients in 1. Tear down. 2. Clean up. 3. Rebuild. She began taking the small steps that would lead to a big change in her life.

### "My life has changed so much.

"A friend of a friend brought Leader Dogs for the Blind into Kim's life. "As soon as I heard about Leader Dog and researched the programs, I couldn't apply quick enough," said Kim. "Being from the healthcare field I didn't know what to expect; the training was above and beyond what I could imagine. "Kim came to Leader Dog's campus in August 2020 for Orientation and Mobility Training. "I'm getting tears in my eyes thinking about that week and how much it meant to me and changed my life," Kim reflected. "My instructor, Tommy, never made me feel like a novice. I think he understood that I had been on the top of my game during my whole career and didn't need to feel like I was at the bottom of the barrel. He gave me a lot of credit for being where I was at with a cane." What sticks in my mind is being at a busy intersection in downtown Rochester. I started to take off and second guessed myself. 'Right there,' Tommy said, 'That driver didn't know how to read you. When you go out in that intersection, you make a big entrance. Make them know you're here.' And that is what I do. "Four months later, Kim spent two weeks in the hospital fighting COVID-19. "I remember thinking that have a dog waiting for me and I have to get over this. It helped me so much."





Since the Opening Eyes Healthy Athlete event at Summer Games was canceled due to COVID in 2020 and 2021 Lions reached out to Special Olympics Minnesota about hosting a modified screening where we could screen athletes with the Spot screeners and then have the optometrists present to talk with them about the results and refer them to their local optometrist if needed.

They also shared handouts on the importance of protecting your vision, the 20-20-20 Rule, and Tips for Preventing Vision Loss. For those athletes already wearing glasses they also offered to clean their glasses. It was felt that this type of screening could be offered at different times and places to reach more Special Olympics Athletes when we can return to more in person tournaments.

This modified version of the Opening Eyes Clinic was held on September 25<sup>th,</sup> during the Bocce and Softball Tournaments held in Woodbury at the Health East Sports Center. We saw a total of 66 athletes, screening 34 with the Spot screeners and all the athletes visited with our two Clinical Directors, Lion Ragna Godtland of the Lakeview Lions in Albert Lea and Megan Sis from Ramsey. Other Lions who assisted with the screening portions were John Hjelmeland, John LeRoy and Ray Moonen – Edina Lions; 5M5 KidSight Chairs Bill & Shari Thurston – St Louis Park Lions and Laura Maki – New Auburn Lions. We are hopeful that we can return to a regular Opening Eyes Screening at the 2022 Summer Games.

With COVID-19 cases on the rise in Minnesota, (state average of over 50 cases per 100,000) Special Olympics Minnesota recently suspended all in-person practices and events which mean that the upcoming Bowling Tournaments scheduled for November have now been changed to virtual events.

### Can Do Canines to Host Open House November 11

Can Do Canines will host an open house on Thursday, November 11, from 6-8 p.m., at its Can Do Canines campus (9440 Science Center Drive, New Hope, Minn.). Potential clients, volunteers, or anyone who might be interested in supporting the organization is invited to attend to learn how an assistance dog changes the life of a person with a disability.

Through a self-guided tour, attendees will be able to watch a trainer working with an assistance dog, talk with a Puppy Program volunteer, and meet graduate teams from each of the five types of areas Can Do Canines trains dogs: hearing, mobility, seizure, diabetes and childhood autism.
