DG MARVIN'S WOOD CUTS

My choice for the 2015-16 bird pin is a Pileated Woodpecker. Every club should have pins

available for them. This bird visits our yard during the winter, coming to our three large suet feeders. We enjoy hearing them come to the feeders, as their call is loud and you can hear them come in. The Pileated Woodpecker is the largest woodpecker in North America. They are about 16 ½ inches long about like a large wild duck. They are mostly black with a white streak on the neck and upper body. The male has a large red cap with a small red spot on the cheek. The female has less red cap and no red on the cheek. They are a shy bird, easily spooked. They are found in wood lots, park lands and forest. A fun bird to watch as they appear a little clumsy and their flight is swooping up and down as they move about.

PENULTIMATE POINTS

With Thanksgiving nearly upon us, I would like to take a moment to express some thoughts on gratitude. When you Google the word "gratitude", this definition comes up: "the "quality of being thankful; readiness to show appreci-

ation for and to return kindness". When stated that way, it is easy to correlate "gratitude" with our motto "We Serve!" Gratitude becomes a reason for us, as Lions, to serve our community and the world.

It's not a straight, two lane highway between gratitude and service. We don't just return kindness to those who are kind to us. Rather, it's a kind of "Pay it forward" sort of arrangement. When we provide service to those in need, we aren't necessarily expressing gratitude for anything they have done. Rather, we are grateful for all that we have, and we express that gratitude through our service to others.

We don't need to have more, or have it better than anyone else, in order to be grateful. Everyone has much reason to be grateful. Everyone can show appreciation and return kindness. Everyone can serve!

When we serve out of gratitude, some profound things can happen. The "poor and unfortunate" become "people in need". Those "suffering with blindness" become "people who are blind or visually impaired". A "disabled person" becomes a "person with a disability". These are not just semantic distinctions. They reflect a recognition of the value of the person over the hardship or need. They recognize what a person does have and can do before recognizing what they don't have or can't do. When we look at those we serve in that way, they become people as capable of being grateful, showing appreciation, and returning kindness as we are. Instead of being somehow below us, they become people who might serve alongside us. What better description of "Dignity, Harmony, and Humanity".

with a wealth of information shared by the District chairs! I was very impressed with each of the brief but educational reports given by our District chairs. The first two Zone meetings supported the reason District 5M2 is such a great district – many, many service projects were described by club presidents for each of the clubs present with so many people served! one of their longer term members – the MD5M Hall of Fame award. As I noted in the previous newsletter, the purpose of the Hall of Fame award is to honor those Lions and Lioness members of character and substance who have demonstrated the highest level of commitment and dedication to the efforts of their club, district and multiple district and the motto of our association "We Serve".

Our clubs also have the opportunity to honor a member with various awards from our foundations such as a Melvin Jones Fellow from Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF), a Hearing Research Fellow for the MD5M Hearing Foundation, a Helen Keller Sight Award from the MN Vision Foundation and a Dream Catcher Award from the MN Lions Diabetes Foundation. Did you know that Leader Dogs for the Blind has a Founders Tribute that allows clubs to honor a club member? Or how about the Top Dog Award from Can Do Canines? Or a Lion of the Year award available from LCI? Let's all take time in our clubs to honor those members who have given of their time and talents to serve others.

Good News!

Lions of the world have now provided service to **50 Million** people in the four Centennial Service Challenge Areas. We are halfway to our goal of serving 100 million people by June 30, 2018!

Here in 5M2, 27 clubs have reported on projects so far this year. No one has qualified for the four diamond patch yet, but 4 clubs have reported on projects in three of the CSC areas, and 6 others have reported completing projects in two of the areas. As I write this article, we have reported serving a total of 20,999 people. It is truly amazing to stop and think about all of the people in need that we have helped! That's **why** we serve, and why we have a Centennial Service Challenge.

GLT HOST 'TRAIN THE TRAINER' INSTITUTE

On September 11-13, 2015 at the Airport Marriott in Bloomington, MN the MD5M GLT hosted a new learning opportunity for Lions. It was the first time that a 'Train the Trainer' Institute had been offered. The experienced Faculty, Lions Bob Jechorek, Deb Harms, and Cheryl McKitrick complimented the weekend with their leadership, humor and great presentation styles.

Seventeen Lions from nine Districts in MD5M spent an amazing weekend with the faculty. The intensive training was designed with materials from the LCI Faculty Development Institute (FDI) and concluded with each participate giving a 20 minute training session they had to prepare on a specific Lions topic using all the skills they had learned. These programs are dedicated to developing and expanding the pool of skilled Lions faculty.

It all started in 2014 at one of the MD5M Global Leadership Team (GLT) meetings, Coordinator Bruce Beck posed a question to Team members, Lions Bob Jechorek, Deb Harms, Cheryl McKitrick, Earl Orvik, and Exec. Sec. Bob Harms. Did they believe that MD5M had enough 'trained' presenters/trainers in our Multiple? Very few MD5M Lions had attended LCI's FDI. They were all in agreement that there was a need for more 'trained', trainers for our Membership. The previous two years, LCI had not offered the FDI in LCI Constitutional Areas 1 & 2 which include the USA, Affiliates, Bermuda and the Bahamas

and Canada!

With the decision made, Lion Bob Jechorek Chaired the Train the Trainer Committee and they moved forward. Dates, location, and presentations were set and it all came together that weekend in September. The GLT Chairs look forward to having these new Lion Trainers assisting with Training in their Districts. They also anticipate the graduates will be presenters at MD5M's Leadership Forum next November 11-13, 2016 at the Shooting Star Resort & Casino in Mahnomen, MN.

5M2 had two participants receive Certificates of Achievement for completing the program, Lion Laura Maki of the Arlington Lions Club and Lion Christy Trutnau of the Iordaness Lions. Both Laura & Christy are also Regional Leadership Institute graduates. PCC Lion Bruce said of all seventeen graduates, "They worked hard, learned new skills, and delivered a training presentation for their final project! They are ready to help make your District stronger and assist with all your training needs! "







MANKATO LIONS CELEBRATE 90 YEARS

Mankato Lions History - Monday, October 5, 1925. Twenty five men gathered at the Saulpaugh Hotel in Mankato. This was the "final organization meeting to the Lions Club of Mankato." Lions organizer, E. H. Wade presented a Dispensation signed by International President Harry E. Newman and International Secretary Melvin Jones, which granted the new club "all the powers and privileges" of Lionism pending issuance of a formal charter.

In attendance were Lions representatives from Minneapolis, St. Paul, Owatonna, and Faribault clubs.


