This article I want to talk about the Lions Mentoring Program. I feel that once a club has new members, mentoring is the best way to keep your new members happy and to teach them about Lionism. 5M-2 has a mentoring program that works very well. I have personally used it a couple of times and it has helped me to get to know my fellow Lions and develop a more personal relationship with them and to make them happy to remain a Lion. You can find the 5M-2 mentoring program brochure on the 5M-2 website under Forms & Docs. Please let me know how it works for you.

The objective is to help every member achieve the goal of better serving his or her community through a program of personal development that helps members realize the potential that their unique skills and knowledge offer. It prepares them for leadership in clubs, association and in the personal lives as well.

The Lions Mentoring Program is completed in two levels:

#### **Basic Mentoring Program**

Level One, The Responsibility of Being a Lion: The first level of the Basic Mentoring Program is devoted to developing an understanding of who Lions are, their vision of humanitarian service, the traditions, the organizational structured and the responsibility of being a Lions club member. It should be a goal of every club that all new Lions complete the Level one in their first three months of membership.

Level Two, Relationships: The second level of the Basic Mentoring Program is for developing relationships and organizational skills in preparation for leadership at the club level. Level two should be completed in the new Lion's first six months of membership.

#### **Advanced Mentoring**

The goals of the Lions Advanced Mentoring Program are to see results and to provide replication.

As a 1VDG you are invited to attend Leader Dog for the Blind in Michigan. I flew out on Friday September 23rd and met up with most of my 1VDG group and other Lions from

Wisconsin, Texas, and Pennsylvania. The hotel hosts a manager reception every night and Leader Dog provided us with a food voucher for that night for dinner. It was great to visit and meet new Lions that will be in our DG group come July 2023.

On Saturday September 24th we took the 1-hour long bus ride to the Leader Dog facility. Once we arrived there we were greeted by the staff and volunteers who were very friendly and excited to have us here as they just started the tours again a few months earlier. Our training /tour starting at 9am that morning and went until 4 p.m. at the facility. We had a presentation about Leader Dog and their facility, we also had guest speakers who have been clients of the program, their stories were amazing in how this program has changed their life, the common theme was: I was able to regain my life back! The stories of their success were very inspiring!

Yes, they served us their famous Chili and donuts. They were both very good! A little history about the chili and donuts: summer tours have been a tradition at Leader Dog since 1960. There are many stories of how the chili and donuts have come to be served together. It may harken back to the days when the Lions would arrive on campus early morning to mid-day. The staff had donuts ready to greet the early arrivals and chili for lunch. Still served to this day is the chili and homemade donuts, some people

put the chili on the donut. Lions from across the country ask for this special combo when they visit the site!


After lunch we were broken into groups to tour the facility. My group was the first to be blindfolded. They added something new this year and not only were we blindfolded with a Leader Dog, but we also were blindfolded to use a white cane. Reason behind that is not all blind or visually impaired people use a Leader Dog nor do they want to. So, they thought it would be a great experience for us to know what it is like to use a white cane. My experience with the white cane was very scary and hard. You need to learn to trust yourself and pay attention to what is around you. My experience with the Leader Dog (Lily) was the same except I found it very hard to put all my trust in my dog companion, I was afraid I was going to run into something. Which is why they have this great facility and training because they spend lots of time training the clients who receive their Leader Dog.

We learned that Leader Dog has some corporate sponsors, Purina donates all the dog food, but Lions donate a lot of time, talent, and money for this great cause! When we visited, they had 19 puppies that would soon be sent to their puppy raisers. They were all so cute and of course I would have loved to take one home! One of the speakers we had was Lion BJ from Wisconsin, he came as he was meeting a new Leader Dog for himself as the current one, he had was retired. He took Jackson out for a spin and when he came back, he demonstrated how Jackson follows he command and how Jackson led him to the door. Keep in mind BJ and Jackson had only 20 minutes of working together and it was very impressive what this Leader Dog would already do for him. It was awesome to see. Lion BJ will come back in a few weeks to pick Jackson up and bring him home. I was in awe of this, I heard may stories about Leader Dog over the years, but I want to say being at the facility and seeing it first hand it a totally different experience and makes me proud to be a Lion!!!

Completion of this level provides a stepping-stone for accepting a leadership role within the club.

Level Two, Replication: This level concentrates on the mentee's role in developing others for leadership in the association and for humanitarian service. It ensures long-range growth and can serve as a basis for leadership within the district structure. This phase can be augmented with additional training at district level and at area forums.

## Gary Sinise Foundation Provides \$350,000 Grant to Leader Dogs for the Blind to Benefit America's Veterans and First Responders

On National Assistance Dog Day, the Gary Sinise Foundation announced a \$350,000 grant to Leader Dogs for the Blind to support our service of veterans, defenders and first responders who are blind or visually impaired with highly skilled guide dogs.

"The Gary Sinise Foundation is proud to expand our efforts of support to our nation's veterans, defenders and first responders, specifically those experiencing blindness or vision loss," said Mike Thirtle, CEO of the Gary Sinise Foundation. "Through our partnership with Leader Dogs for the Blind, several Leader Dogs will be raised and trained to assist those we serve, helping them to regain their freedom and independence. And for all they have sacrificed for our country and communities, as our Founder Gary Sinise would say, 'we can always do a little more.'"

"The support of the Gary Sinise Foundation will directly help veterans and first responders who are blind, visually impaired or Deafblind," said Susan Daniels, CEO of Leader Dogs for the Blind. "The impact of working with a guide dog reaches beyond the recipient to their family, friends and community. As each recipients' self-confidence and travel skills grow, so does their family's comfort knowing their loved one is safe and traveling independently with their Leader Dog by their side."

As part of the grant, the Gary Sinise Foundation is sponsoring seven Future Leader Dogs. The first two puppies are Labrador retriever siblings who will be raised by the Fisher family and Linda and Tony Gimble. The Fishers are very experienced, having raised 10 Leader Dog puppies in the past. "When we heard that the Gary Sinise Foundation was sponsoring puppies, we immediately wanted to be a part of the partnership," said Laura Fisher. "My husband, Paul, is an Army veteran and I work for Leader Dog. It's like raising one of these special puppies in our home was meant to be."






Chanhassen Lions celebrated Octoberfest.


