Helen Keller's Speech

Helen Keller addressed the 1925 International Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio on June 30th:

Dear Lions and Ladies:

I suppose you have heard the legend that represents opportunity as a capricious lady, who knocks at every door but once, and if the door isn't opened quickly, she passes on, never to return. And that is as it should be. Lovely, desirable ladies won't wait. You have to go out and grab'em.

I am your opportunity. I am knocking at your door. I want to be adopted. The legend doesn't say what you are to do when several beautiful opportunities present themselves at the same door. I guess you have to choose the one you love best.

I hope you will adopt me. I am the youngest here, and what I offer you is full of splendid opportunities for service.

Will you not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness; no little deaf, blind child untaught; no blind man or woman unaided? I appeal to you Lions, you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind. Will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in the crusade against darkness?

You can see the reenactment of this speech on YouTube, just search Helen Keller speech video. For me it gives me "Yes! This is why I am a LION!!" feeling.

Welcome to February there some things happening this month. Have you registered for the Mid-Winter yet? If not your time to do so is slowly approaching. Have you submitted a Zone Lion of the year yet? If not, remember its due to me by no later than February 18th. Please see the

newsletter for the nomination form.

Do you have a desire or passion to work with others and are good at communication? Have you ever thought about being a Zone Chair?

What is a Zone Chair? The zone chairperson, subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor, shall be there chief administrative officer of their zone. The zone chairperson is a member of the district's Global Action Team.

Some of the responsibilities of being a zone chair: Visit a regular meeting of each club in their zone once or more during their term of office and send a report to the District Governor. Represent each club in their zone in any problems with district, multiple district council chairperson or LCI. Report on the progress of the clubs at district cabinet meetings. Supervise the progress of district, multiple and LCI projects in their zone. Promote representation at international and district conventions by at least the full quota of delegates to which each club in their zone are entitled. Aspire to have every club within their zone operating un-

der a duly adopted club constitution and by-laws. In coordination with Global Action Team (which includes: Global Membership; Global Leadership and Global Service) the zone chair plays an active role in organizing new clubs and keeping informed of the activities and well-being of the clubs; in supporting leadership initiatives by information Lions within their zone about leadership opportunities; they information Lions about service opportunities at the zone, district and multiple level.

On the LCI website there are resources for Zone chairs such as how to run a zone meeting; how to submit a report; how to understand the club health assessment; and how to install new officers.

Being a zone chair was one of my favorite roles as a Lion, it gave the opportunity to visit other clubs in my zone and to learn more about the different activities and fundraisers each club does. I was able to interact with new and seasoned Lions. As a zone chair, I was in the know of what was happening at the club, district, multiple and international level and was able to communication this information back to the clubs.

If you are interested in learning more about being a Zone chair please reach out to me, as this was only an overview of this position. I will be needing to fill some spots for my district cabinet.



District 5M-2 PARADE OF GREEN

Parade of Green is an integral part of the 5M-2 Mid-Winter Convention. The purpose of the Parade of Green is to give District 5M-2 Lions Clubs the opportunity to provide monetary donations to foundations/programs our District supports. The donations received are most of the funding for each of these foundations/programs. Please review the list below to see the current participants, there is a new addition of the TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation. As your club evaluates your Parade of Green donations, consider donating at least a small amount to each one.

The list includes if they are a 501 (c)(3) and their tax identification number. If the foundation/program is 501 (c)(3) donations can come from either gambling or project funds. If not, funding may only come from project funds. Our ask is for each club within the District to donate even a small amount to each foundation.

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF): (501 (c)(3)/23-7030455) LCIF is the main humanitarian arm of the Lions around the world. Donated funds are recorded as a Melvin Jones donation. For every \$1,000 donated, your Club may present a Melvin Jones Fellow Award. Records for donations are kept by LCIF.

Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation: (501 (c)(3)/41-6026488) The Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation has been working to help the blind and visually impaired since 1960. Through their support of Lions Gift of Sight (formerly Minnesota Lions Eye Bank), their collaboration with the University of Minnesota's Department of Ophthalmology, and their work collecting and distributing used eyeglasses, the Foundation helps countless people every day. Donated funds are recorded as a Helen Keller donation. For every \$1,000 donated, your Club may present a Helen Keller Award in honor of those who have distinguished themselves on behalf of sight. Records for donations are kept by the Vision Foundation.

Minnesota Lions Hearing Foundation: (501(c)(3)/41-6172730) The Foundation was founded in 1973 to fully promote the advance of research and programs concerned with hearing health and communication disorders. Further, it was founded to help with the organization and administration of these activities throughout the Lions Multiple District 5M, which encompasses Minnesota, Manitoba, and Northwestern Ontario. For every \$1,000 donated your Club may present a Hearing Research Fellowship. A second donation in the same named individual will receive a Progressive Fellowship.

Diabetes: Clubs can donate to either or both.

MN Lions Diabetes Foundation: (501 (c)(3)/26-3238179) Foundation is dedicated to improving the quality of life for people with diabetes by funding research to cure diabetes, providing education and sponsoring preventive health activities. Donated funds are recorded as a Dream Catcher donation. For every \$1,000 donated, your Club may present a Dream Catcher Award. Records for donations are kept by your own Club.

5M-2 Diabetes: Funds stay in District 5M-2.

MN Lions Childhood Cancer Foundation: (501 (c)(3)/83-2970348) A charity of the Lions Clubs of Minnesota to support efforts to end childhood cancer. A relatively new

initiative by the Foundation involves partnering with local Lions Clubs to help local families dealing with childhood cancer. Thus far, we have approved matches \$500 to three local Lions Clubs who had fundraisers for local families. The Believe Award has been established to recognize Clubs and individuals who have

donated \$1,000 to the Foundation to further our mission to assist patients and families dealing with childhood cancer.

MD5M KidSight Foundation: (501 (c)(3)/81-3338106) KidSight is a program to screen the vision of children, primarily between the ages of 6 months and 6 years. About 7 to 15% of children screened will be referred for follow-up professional exams. For every \$1,000 donated your club may present a "Sight Saver" award.

Can Do Canines: (501 (c)(3)/41-1594165) Can do Canines raises and trains Mobility Assist, Diabetes Assist, Autism Assist, Hearing Assist, Seizure Assist and other Service Dogs. The dogs are provided at no charge to the recipient. For every \$1,000 donated your Club may present a "Top Dog" award. Donation records are kept by Can do Canines.

Project New Hope Lions Foundation of Minnesota: (501 (c) (3)/27-2749699) Provides family retreats for veterans and their families with educational skills to manage their lives after wartime service. The organization provides these activities totally free to the veterans and their families.

Leader Dogs for the Blind: (501 (c)(3)/38-1366931) People who are blind or visually impaired endure hardships most of us can barely imagine. Things that were once routine and taken for granted may gradually or suddenly become insurmountable hurdles. Leader Dogs for the Blind provide white cane training to matching people with a Leader Dog, they provide the tools and training to reintroduce people to a life of independence, confidence, and companionship. It's a way of living that leads to a new perspective on life.

Youth Exchange: Clubs can donate to either or both.


MD5M Youth Exchange: (501 (c)(3)/46-4182698) The Lions Youth Exchange Program was launched to provide today's youth, our leaders of tomorrow, an opportunity to learn about people and cultures other than their own to promote world peace. Young people are given the opportunity of living with a family or families in a foreign country for a few weeks to experience first-hand a new culture, history, and a different way of life. The goal is to have each participant upon returning home share his or her experiences in promoting international understanding.

5M-2 Youth Exchange: Funds stay in 5M-2.

5M-2 Youth Outreach: The Youth Outreach program is a part of the Lions Organization encompassing Leos, Peace Poster, Essay Contest, Liberty Day & Write-Off.

TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation: (501 (c)(3)) The TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation was formed to provide matching funds for MD5M Club projects which are too large for the Club to do itself, but too small for a LCIF grant. The Foundation hopes to be able to begin awarding matching fund grants in the 2023-24 Lion year.

TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation: New Parade of Green Charity



I write on behalf of the TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation as I am District 5M-2's member of the Board of Directors. The TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation was incorporated in February 2022 and was granted 501c3 status by the IRS in June 2022.

For those of you who have attended an International Convention in the past, you've seen how Multiple Districts, which have been the home of an outgoing International President, have presented them with a gift as a "Thank You" for their Year of Service; some of which have been quite extravagant.

Lions Brian and Lori have insisted that they do not want a gift, but rather a way to help individual Lions Clubs in MD5M do more. Their solution was the TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation.

The TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation was formed to provide matching funds for local Club projects which are too large for the Club to do for itself, but too small for an LCIF grant. This includes all clubs in the MD5M Multiple. The Foundation hopes to be able to begin awarding matching fund grants following Lion Brian's year as LCIF Chair, the 2023-24 Lions Year.

To accomplish this, the Foundation hopes to raise its initial funding over the next 2 years. Since the IRS regulations under the Foundation's 501c3 status require we limit fundraising to \$50,000 per year for these 2 years, we hope that your club will consider a donation of \$75 -\$100 US during these years.

As our district representative to the TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation, I would be honored to visit your club

and answer any questions you may have. We'd also appreciate any donation, however small, your club could make to the Foundation during its Parade of Green. At the last 5M-2 Cabinet meeting in November, the Cabinet unanimously voted to add this Foundation to the Parade of Green. In the future, we plan to make a Foundation support pin available for individuals making a \$100 donation.

Thank you and your club so much for your time and consideration and for showing your support to IP Brian and Lion Lori.

What are your clubs doing for Service? Get Me the NEWS!!





Newborn hearing screening: Hearing helps a baby to talk. If hearing loss is discovered early, babies have the best chance of learning to speak and doing well in school.



In 1999, only 8% of babies born in Minnesota were screened for hearing loss. Together with their partners, the Department of Otolaryngology at the University of Minnesota, the 5M Hearing Foundation established the Lions Newborn Hearing Screening Program. Within five years, every baby born in Minnesota could be screened for hearing loss –that's about 70,000 children every year! In 2007, newborn hearing screening was mandated and the Lions Newborn Screening Program was handed over to the Department of Health.

If your baby does not pass the first hearing screen, it does not mean he/she has a hearing loss. Some common reasons are:

- birth debris in the ear canal
- fussy baby
- too much noise in the room
- middle ear fluid

Nonetheless, it's important to schedule a follow-up screen.

Speech and Hearing Milestones to watch for:

- around 0-3 months
 - o startles at loud noises
 - o reacts to a familiar person
- makes "coo" or "aah" sounds
 - around 3-6 months
 - o stops playing when sound is heard
 - o reacts to his/her name
 - o babbles
 - o laughs when happy
 - around 6-9 months
 - o turns head to source of sound
 - o responds to "no" and facial expressions
 - o says "mama" and "dada"



Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation Update

Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation (MLDF) has a dream – *Life without Diabetes*. We are, with your support, providing funding devoted to finding a cure for diabetes. The research is also leading to treatments for diabetes – improving the quality of life for people who live with diabetes.

Improving Health

There are steps each of us can take to improve our health and possibly prevent Type 2 diabetes.

- Maintain an A1C blood (a blood test that measures average blood sugar levels during past 3 months) level of 5.7 % or below for a normal range.
- Be aware of what we are eating and drinking. Read Nutrition Fact Labels on packaging of foods and drinks
 for information about calories, carbohydrates, added sugars, vitamins, etc. Eating and drinking in moderation
 is key.
- Maintain a healthy weight.
- Be physically active (a minimum of 150 minutes a week\/averaging 22 minutes a day of moderate intensity activity).
- Get good amount of sleep (7 to 9 hours per night).

Diabetes Service Project



Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation trustees are working with Lions Clubs to distribute 2,000 diabetes emergency hypoglycemia (low-blood sugar) kits to schools and other community locations throughout Minnesota. Created with the help of Lions International Directors' Partners-In-Service, the kits provide guidance and glucose gel and crackers for use in low-blood sugar situations. Your club's assistance to distributing within your community is appreciated! Contact us for more information and kits.

Diabetes Research

MLDF is committed to supporting research for treatments and a cure for diabetes. Recently the Foundation provided additional funding to the University of Minnesota for Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes.

In Type 1 diabetes is when the body's immune system mistakenly attacks and destroys insulin-producing cells. The body needs insulin to help blood sugars convert to energy. Without insulin, the human body cannot survive. To combat the destruction of these cells, and cure Type 1 diabetes, U of M researchers are creating "firefighters" which will be introduced to the body and protect the insulin-producing cells.

Researchers at the U of M have also identified a molecule that reduces the amount of glucose in mice, a discovery which may lead to better treatments for obesity-linked Type 2 diabetes. The goal is to determine if this molecule, if used in a drug, can prevent the development of Type 2 diabetes, or reverse the condition in current patients. Support from MLDF may allow scientists to translate this research from animal models to humans to develop the next generation of a drug to fight Type 2 diabetes.


