2019 has been a busy and impactful year for LCIF. Providing immediate and ongoing relief after natural disasters, supporting humanitarian projects in our main service areas, and of course approving a grant for Camp Sweet Life requested by 5M2. LCIF is empowering Lions next door and around the world to meet the needs of neighbors near and far.

At this giving time of the year, if you would like to make a personal donation to LCIF, you have several options. You may donate online by credit card either as a one-time gift, or as an automatically recurring gift. Currently, there is no option to have money automatically taken from a bank account. Due to PCI (Payment Card Industry) Data Security Standard Compliance, credit card donations cannot be taken over the phone or in writing. Here are the step-by-step directions for making a credit card donation:

- 1. Go to the Lions Clubs International Website (<u>www.lionsclubs.org</u>).
- 2. Click on the "Donate" button on the upper right of the screen.
- 3. Click on "Give to Empowering Service Fund" or "Give to Disaster Relief Fund"
- 4. Choose the amount you would like to donate.
- 5. Choose from "One-Time-Gift" or one of the recurring gift options.
- 6. Choose the type of donor (Member, Non-Member, Club or District, or Business).
- 7. Fill in the edit fields with the appropriate information.
- 8. Choose whether you would like the "Lions Share" pin or not.
- 9. Indicate whether or not your gift is to be anonymous
- 10. Select the form of Recognition you want, if any. If so:
  - a. Fill in the edit fields with the relevant information
  - b. Fill in the Shipping Address
- 11. Indicate your payment preference (currently only Credit Card) and fill in the Name and Card Number.
- 12. Click "Submit"
- 13. Receive the gratitude of LCIF and the people "We Serve"!





## **Tech Tips**

This is the third of a series of articles for the 5M2 Newsletter that I have written about cybersecurity. To refresh your memory, the first was primarily about phishing and how to avoid being a victim. The second touched on password managers and alerts most banks credit card companies make available to their customers. For this article, I hope to offer further suggestions to make your online life more resistant to hacking and identity theft

### No Really, Who Are You?

Beyond using secure passwords, more and more websites that allow access to financial or other sensitive information offer their users the option of employing "two-factor identification". There is no charge for this service, but the user must enroll in the two factor identification option on the website and provide an email address or cell number. Once two factor identification is engaged, no one can log into your account on that website without providing proof positive that you are the legitimate owner of the account. Here's how it works:

- 1. You log into the website with your username and password.
- 2. The website sends a code (usually six numbers) via text to your cell phone or via email.
- 3. You must enter the code provided into the website much like an additional password.

The codes are typically good for only 10 minutes and are different every time you log in. An alternate method requires you to enter a code from an authenticator app on your phone that changes every 30 seconds. Either method provides near certainty that you are who you say you are.

While two factor identification results in an additional burden on the user, it is minor indeed when compared to the extra assurance that no one else will be able to access your online account. I strongly recommend that you sign up for and use two factor identification wherever it is available.

### Lock It Up!

It seems like we hear a lot about data breaches these days. We all remember the big Equifax data breach, but companies large and small have their computer systems hacked and have personally identifiable information about their customers compromised. The danger is that armed with your name and social security number, a nefarious individual could potentially file taxes, open a credit card account or take out a loan using your identity. Even if you have all your existing accounts secured (or even if you have no online accounts) you could end up being a victim. There are several precautions you can take to mitigate your risk of loss through identity theft:

- 1. Monitor your credit rating and obtain the free credit reports to which you are entitled. Your credit report will reveal any new credit or loan applications made in your name. You can get one free credit report each year through <a href="www.annualcreditreport.com">www.annualcreditreport.com</a> or by calling 877-322-8228. Beware of other "free" credit reporting sites or services. They usually come with strings attached or may even be fraudulent sites that will steal your data.
- 2. Put a freeze on your credit. You can do this by going to the three credit reporting sites (TransUnion, Equifax, and Experian) and filing a request to freeze your credit. Once done, no one (including yourself) will be able to open any new credit account or take out a loan. You will still be able to use your existing credit cards, but you have to file a similar request to "unfreeze" your credit should you want to open any new account. There is a small charge for the service.
- 3. Engage a credit monitoring service such as LifeLock or IdentityForce. These services charge a fee from about \$10 to \$30 per month. Engaging such a service does not actually make you less susceptible to identity theft, but they do provide credit monitoring, insurance against financial loss, and help restoring your credit rating and identity should you become a victim.

### **Hearing Foundation News**



What do the Minnesota Hearing Foundation Trustees do? Their appointed term is for three years with a maximum of six years served. Their year starts in July with Foundation Board training held at the U of M cam-

pus. This is where new trustees are introduced and join a committee. There is a guest speaker from the U of M, goal settings and plans for the coming year. That evening a banquet is held with the Vision Foundation and Diabetes Foundation. The next day a Foundation Board meeting is held. After business is conducted the committees meet.

The second Board meeting is held in St. Cloud in early October. At this meeting funding requests are made by the U of M Department of Otolaryngology, Lions Children's Hearing Clinic and Hearing Research.

The third meeting is held in St. Cloud in late January. At this meeting Parade of Green and D Feet Walk are discussed and planned for. The fourth meeting is also in St. Cloud in early April. The D Feet Walk is the main topic, as we want to have all the plans ready for June 6, 2020 D Feet Walk at the Arboretum. This will be the Ninth Annual Walk and we want to make it better than ever.

Your Trustees will have a table at the Mid Winter convention with information about Hearing Foundation. We are also asking clubs to donate to the Parade of Green. Remember the new name: Minnesota Lions Hearing Foundation. 100% of the clubs donating would be great. All amounts are appreciated. The money raised will help with adding another Hearing Testing sound proof room at the Lions Children's Hearing Center. They presently see about 5000 patients a year, 60% birth to 5 years, 40% K to 18 years. This room addition will allow for 5 full time audiologists, meaning they can see more patients. So your clubs donations do count. Thank you for what your clubs can do!!

Your Trustees also track your clubs donated dollars so your club can give Hearing Foundation Awards for each \$1000 donated.

Your Trustees are available to come to your club to tell about our Hearing Foundation story. Also on the Hearing Foundation Board from 5M2 are Lions Mike and Sue Vos as Foundation Treasurers.

First, I would like to thank all who voted for Leader Dog Lady for "Hero Dog of the Year". Lady did not win, but both Leader Dog for the Blind and the Lion's won for the recognition both encountered during this nomination and voting process. The Lion's would like to congratulate "Alice "who won the top honor. I will tell you how "Alice" won and the story of whom she serves.

Alice, a German Shepherd, is from Guardian Angels Medical Service Dogs of Florida. First, I need to tell you about Antonio the boy whose life she changed.

In 2015, Antonio was traveling in his parent's SUV on the way to a family event. Antonio was 9 years old, loved soccer and had many friends. On the way to the family event a life changing event occurred. A man fired 3 – 5 bullets into their vehicle and shot Antonio into the head. Antonio was in for a battle for his life, spent 18 days in a coma and endured 5 brain surgeries.

Nearly 4 years later, an artificial skull covers one half of Antonio brain because of seizures at the time could be fatal.

Antonio not only battles seizures, but also has migraines, balance concerns, and more. In October 2016, Antonio received Alice. Alice is a true hero in Antonio mother's eyes. Alice has allowed Antonio to do simple things many of us take for granted.

Before Alice arrived, Antonio was not able to go to school, the store or just take a walk outside. Never once has Alice failed to warn Antonio of an oncoming seizure event and provided his assistance with balance issues. Alice has provided Antonio a new normal life. Alice is loyal to Antonio and is his everyday hero. Alice has prevented numerous falls which could have been fatal. What a life changing story, and all service dogs are hero's in someone's eyes.

I have been visiting Zone Meetings and promoting Leader Dog for the Blind through offering Club visits to promote Leader Dog. I show a video on Puppy raising in Fort Dodge Iowa, we follow a couple of dogs to their eventual owners and life changing stores for both the visually impair and the Fort Dodge prison. It is a great inspiring video.

Leader Dog will be celebrating their 80th birthday celebration soon. Leader Dog would not exist if it was not for three Detroit Lions who saw a need. As Lions do the need was met and has grown ever since. Leader Dog is in all 50 states and 18 foreign countries. Leader Dog has 47 dogs in active service in Minnesota. Leader Dog has placed well over 12, 350 dogs since its humble beginnings. Truly a great response to Helen Keller's request to be "knights to the blind". 

### There's No Politics in Lions!

But Lions have been, and should be, involved in politics. Imagine the world without newborn hearing screenings. It was the MD5M Lions who were responsible for getting legislation requiring those hearing screenings enacted.

Occasionally, such as now, there occurs an issue that requires Lions to take action. Outside organizations are attempting to put Lions Gift of Sight, formerly known as the Minnesota Lions Eye Bank, out of business. This means that eyes donated in Minnesota will be shipped to the west coast and the valuable eye research done at the University of Minnesota in fields such as Macular Degeneration will be without valuable tissue.

The Council of Governors has added an Advocacy Coordinator position to help coordinate Lions efforts when needed throughout the Multiple. All directors in all supported foundations, from the Vision Foundation, Diabetes Foundation, Hearing Foundation, KidSight Foundation, Special Olympics and Canadian foundations need to be ready to be advocates for their respective activities to their legislative bodies.

But more than that, MD5M needs Lions who are willing to write their legislators, follow up and perhaps even attend hearings to show their support for issues affecting Lions and their programs. It would be wonderful if 30 or more Lions would volunteer to be Advocates besides those who are Foundation directors. Sample letters, talking points and prompt notice of hearings will all be provided.

### MD5M Hall of Fame (October 2003)

### **Purpose**

To honor those Lion and Lioness members of character and substance who have demonstrated the highest level of commitment and dedication to the efforts of their club, district or multiple district and the motto of our association, "We Serve."

### **Award**

There will be a maximum of one (1) recipient of the MD5M Hall of Fame Award per district, inducted into the MD5M Hall of Fame each year. The award may be presented posthumously.

### Exception:

During the 2003-04, 2004-05 and 2005-06 Lion years, each district will be allowed two (2) Hall of Fame recipients, at least one (1) of which must be honored posthumously. Following the 2005-06 Lion year, beginning in the 2006-07 Lion year, the number of Hall of Fame recipients per district will return to one (1) per district.

The MD5M Hall of Fame award recipients are to be inducted into the Hall of Fame at the annual MD5M Multiple District Convention during the Saturday noon luncheon. The first honorees will be inducted May 21-23, 2004 at the MD5M Multiple Convention.

MD5M Hall of Fame recipients will receive a MD5M Hall of Fame award plaque and a Hall of Fame lapel pin in recognition of their induction in the MD5M Hall of Fame. In addition, a complete listing of all MD5M Hall of Fame recipients will appear in the annual MD5M directory and a perpetual plaque, with the names of all inductees and the year of their induction inscribed thereon, will be kept in a prominent place in the MD5M office, when available.

The presentation of the MD5M Hall of Fame inductees will be the responsibility of the current International Director from MD5M, if there is one and he/she is in attendance at the MD5M Multiple District Convention. If not, then the most recent Past International Director having served from MD5M in attendance at the MD5M Multiple District Convention.

### **Criteria**

A candidate may be a Lion or Lioness, must have been a member in good standing for at least 15 years, be at least two (2) years removed from the Council of Governors if a PDG, should have qualifications above and beyond the call of duty including social and human endeavors, and he/she should be of good moral character and have a good reputation in his/her community. A nominee must be a member in good standing of a Lions or Lioness Club in MD5M, or must have been a member in good standing of a Lions or Lioness Club in MD5M at the time of their death.

#### Process

A candidate may be sponsored by any Lion, Lioness, Lions Club, Lioness Club, Zone, or District. There will be a nomination fee of \$150.00 per each candidate nominated. The nomination fee will be returned to those sponsors whose candidates are not elected for induction into the MD5M Hall of Fame. The nomination fee for those selected for induction will be sent to MD5M and will be used to offset the cost of the award process, plaques and pin.

Nominations, including the nomination fee, must be received by the District Governor at least 30 days prior to the District's Mid Winter Convention.

Each individual District will annually hold an election at their Mid Winter Convention to determine the candidate(s), if any, to be inducted into the Hall of Fame for that Lion Year. Each sponsor will have an opportunity to give a brief presentation on the merits and biographical information of their nominee prior to the election. Those elected to be inducted into the MD5M Hall of Fame will not be announced until their induction at the MD5M Multiple District Convention.

All nominations will use the standard form, no others will be accepted. The nomination fee must be received at the time the application is received, otherwise the nomination will not be considered.

All successful candidates will be inducted into the MD5M Hall of Fame at the next MD5M Multiple District Convention. The sponsor(s) and the respective District Governor will ensure that the honoree or a suitable representative be in attendance at the MD5M Multiple District Convention when the honorees are inducted.

A brief biography of each inductee shall be announced to those in attendance during the induction ceremony at the annual MD5M Multiple District Convention.
