"We can't help everyone but, everyone can help someone."





Tour a recycling and waste management facility with your club.

ACT // BEGINNER

- Plant trees. Consult your local environment authorities to determine the type and number of trees needed, as well as the location for planting.
- Meet on a monthly basis and clean up a beach, community space, or roadside area as a club.
- Hold an environment themed photo contest at a local school. Reward the winner with a tree planted in their honor or another green form of recognition.
- Challenge all Lions in your club or district to add at least one green habit to their daily lives. Inspire others by sharing your actions on social media. Habits might include:
 - Using a reusable water bottle or coffee mug rather than disposable products.
 - Changing to energy-saving lightbulbs.
 - Setting a time limit for your shower to reduce water consumption.
- Develop a Green Living Tip Sheet and share it electronically with members of your community or network.
- Recognize a local organization or community leader for their efforts in environmental conservation.
- Calculate your carbon footprint with an online calculator. If your footprint is bigger than you would like, purchase carbon credits that are Gold Standard Certified and brainstorm ways you can lower your carbon input.
- Volunteer with your local park service to maintain trails. You will help more people access and enjoy nature!
- Commit to "Meatless Mondays", or not eating meat one day each week.
- Collect used cellphones and donate them to individuals in need.

ACT // INTERMEDIATE

- Lead an after school nature walk for young students. Encourage them to make observations and ask questions, then have them draw a picture of their experience afterwards.
- Host a community viewing of an environmental film or documentary.
- Save water by surveying your homes and community for leaks in sinks, communal spigots or water fountains. Contact relevant officials if repairs are needed.
- Work with city officials to paint "no dumping" signs near road drainage areas.
- Identify where to recycle toxic items and share/advertise its schedule of collection campaigns.
- Organize an environmental mural competition. Paint the winner's artwork in an appropriate area to beautify your community and promote environmental awareness.
- Implement a community recycling drive where people donate gently used items to charity organizations.
- Share a meal with students at your school. Afterwards, teach them how to sort their recyclables and trash.

ACT // ADVANCED

- Develop a demonstration garden or landscaping plot using native plant species to encourage restoration of the local natural habitat and water conservation.
- Sponsor a training program for small farmers on how to make and use organic fertilizers and pesticides.
- Produce a monthly nature program on the local public radio station. Feature environmental topics of local interest, interview environmental activists in your community and promote Lions environmental projects.
- Host a public debate on controversial environmental issues in your community. Share the results with government officials.
- Partner with a local carpenter (or use a DIY tutorial) to build a rain barrel. Then, hold a training with community members to promote using barrels for watering and irrigation.
- Organize an alternative transportation incentive program in your community to encourage walking, biking, public transportation and carpooling.
- Work with local schools to establish organic school gardens and a composting program to improve the quality of school meals and reduce waste.



DO I NEED TO CHARGE SALES TAX ON MY FUNDRAISING SALES?

First, sales tax on purchases made by Lions Clubs in Minnesota is payable by the Lions Club at the time of purchase. However, many Lions Clubs make donations to their community and/or school for purchases that are then made by the school; those purchases are exempt from paying sales tax since they are purchased by the tax-exempt city or school, not your Lions Club.

Second, it has recently been brought to the attention of the club treasurers in District 5M2 that an auditor with the MN Department of Revenue has indicated that Lions Clubs should be submitting regular sales tax reports and payment to the Department of Revenue since "beverages and meals at regular Lions meetings are taxable, also any sales of tickets at fund raisers such as Pancake Breakfast, Fish Fries, etc. are all taxable", that is not how the information on the MN Department of Revenue website explains it. When you go to www.revenue.state.mn.us and search Nonprofit Organization Industry Guides, you will find a link to Sales and Use Tax, "Sales", which states "Any nonprofit organization that makes taxable sales must collect and remit sales tax unless one of the following apply:

 The state's fundraising exemption applies (see Fundraising Sales)

The Sales and Use Tax, "Fundraising Sales" link states "Minnesota has two different exemptions that may apply to fundraising sales.

- Youth and senior citizen groups up to \$20,000
- o All nonprofit organizations up to 24 days

The Fundraising information goes on to explain that "Nonprofit organizations that have 24 days or less of fundraising events in a year qualify for this exemption. If your nonprofit organization qualifies for this exemption, you may sell taxable goods or admissions at fundraising events without charging sales tax". The document goes on to describe a qualified event as well as how to count the 24 days (calendar days January - December, not fiscal July - June) and the requirements to qualify for the exemption. Refer to the flow sheet included in this newsletter to walk you through the exemption process or go to the MN Department of Revenue site/Fundraising Sales "Do I need to charge sales tax on my fundraising sales? link.

Further research was done on this issue by several Lions in the district as well as Lion Sue Vos, District 5M2 treasurer. Lion Sue spoke with a representative at the MN Department of Revenue, who confirmed that the above information does apply to Lions Clubs. However, the representative Lion Sue spoke with noted that each Lions Club is unique since some of our clubs have gambling, some do not have gambling, some may sell raffle tickets over a period of weeks, and some may have one-time bingo events, etc. The representative informed Lion Sue that each club can call the Department of Revenue and run through your individual event scenarios. You do not need to identify your club to obtain the information. Some clubs also have accountants or auditing practices that should be consulted for advice.



5M-2 HALL OF FAME

Please consider placing into nomination an outstanding club member for the 2019 District 5M-2 Hall of Fame.

As presented at the recent fall zone meetings, the purpose of the award is to honor those Lions and Lioness members of character and substance who have demonstrated the highest level of commitment and dedication to the efforts of their club, district and multiple district and the motto of our association "We Serve".

Criteria for the award -

- May be a Lion or Lioness
- ❖ Must have been a member in good standing for at least 15 years
- ❖ Must be at least 2 years removed from the Council of Governors, if a PDG
- Have qualifications above and beyond the call of duty including social and human endeavors
- Should be of good moral character and
- Should have a good reputation in good standing in his/her community
- ❖ If deceased, must have been a member in good standing of a MD5M Lions or Lioness club at the time of his/her death.

Process

- ❖ Nomination fee of \$150.00 for each candidate nominated must accompany the nomination to the District Governor. This fee is returned to you if your candidate is not the chosen recipient during the Mid-Winter convention voting.
- ❖ All nominations must be received by District Governor Diana no later than 30 days, prior to our Mid-Winter Convention. January 09, 2019 will be the deadline.
- ❖ An election for the recipient from 5M-2 will be held during the annual meeting at the Mid-Winter convention on February 09, 2019. The winner of that election will be inducted into the Hall of Fame at the 2019 Multiple District Convention in Mahnomen, April 27, 2019.
- ❖ Information, as well as the nomination form, is available online at www.5m2lions.org. : Forms and Award Applications, MD5M Hall of Fame nomination form.

Each of your clubs has a Lion who fits the criteria needed for a nomination to the Hall of Fame. While only one 5M-2 Lion will be awarded the honor in 2019, every Lion nominated will be featured at the Mid-Winter convention when their bios are presented to the membership. Honor these deserving Lions with a nomination.

Nominations must be received by the respective District Governor at least 30 days prior to the District's annual Mid Winter Convention. A nomination fee of \$150.00 must accompany this form. Only this official form will be accepted and the nomination will only be accepted if accompanied by the nomination fee.



Kidsight is going well. There have been some changes since the summer. At the first quarterly meeting of the Kidsight Foundation an update was entered in the cameras. It changed the look of the opening scene on the camera. We were not told anything about how this would change the look of the camera, so when we passed it on to the first club to use it they were shocked. But they did figure it out. We had a battery cover disappear off one of the cameras. In talking to the person at Plus Optics we received a new cover. Also, we spoke with the young lady and she told us about the changes this update would affect the opening scene and how we should operate the cameras with the update. She walked us through it and Lion Loretta wrote it down the directions. We put together a guideline explaining the new procedure for the camera use. A copy of the guidelines is with each camera. We are explaining to everyone to please return the guidelines sheet into the camera bag each time they are finished. Included with the new guide lines is directions to obtain PDF Referrals to obtain your indicator of the child's referral for your report. Also, it is noted on the back of the camera not to remove the battery cover.

If enough Lion's express interest in Kidsight training, a session will be scheduled in the spring. Otherwise, we can come to individual clubs as needed to train Lion's in the camera use. It is best if you wish to set up a screening in your area to do one of two things. Set up with the daycare provider a few dates which would work with the facility. Or, contact the Kidsight Co-chairs for dates not available prior to visiting your facility. Getting a facility sold on the idea of doing a screening takes times and education by your club's Kidsight chair. Lion Loretta and I have found that once a facility does the screening in the past year, contact them by e-mail and set the date. They have welcomed us back. Quite easy, it is the initial screening that takes the time and dedication to Kidsight. The last screening, we completed at a facility in Prior Lake, the director was teaching a class and told us Good-Bye and see you next year as we left the building. The new screening procedure is quite quick, we did 47 children in less than an hour with two referrals. We would love to see enough interest in the Kidsight program to express a need to purchase an additional camera for our District. It would be great to have one fourth to one third of the clubs active in this program within the next three years.

So, you ask where can our club provide Kidsight screenings? Some clubs have assisted with vision screenings within there preschool screenings with their local schools. Some clubs have completed screenings at Parochial Schools. Prior Lake is blessed with numerous public daycare centers in our area. We got into approximated 1/3 of them this past year. We are working on adding 3 to 4 new sites this year. Community events are also another opportunity to offer the program. Does your club have a pancake breakfast or dinner, another thought for an event to offer the service? The list can be endless and if you save the vision of one child your time is well worth it for your community and the sight of the child your Lion's Club referred.

Kidsight was present at the Minnesota State Fair in the Health Care 11 Building. During the run of the fair 2444 children were screened with 201 referrals. 5M2 did not take a date at the fair this year, but if enough Lion's express interest in assisting with the Kidsight screening the during the run of the state fair, the Co-Directors will commit to a day of Kidsight screening at the fair. It is a way to put Lion's in the public eye.

And we are just back from our autumn MLVF quarterly meeting. The meeting was so positive. Of course, "positive" is always the service provided by our foundation to the U of M Department of Ophthalmology and Visual Neurosciences. But this year's new competition from another eye bank has made it tough to stay upbeat. Refer back to the July and September newsletters where we explained the issues forcing against Lions Gift of Sight (LGS) and the research department here.

According to the Eye Bank Association of America, LGS is a number one rated operation in our nation, providing eyes for research in Minnesota and beyond to other states and countries. A nonprofit entity. Plus the clinics handle so many patients. The new MN Lions Eye Surgical Center (opened in September, 2016) is on track to do over 1100 cases in 2018. The Eye Surgical Center is currently the beneficiary of our 4 million dollar pledge which is about half completed.

Now the doom and gloom of earlier this year is lifted some. SightLife, the new kid in town, seems to be struggling through some growing pains – the sort of thing our eye bank probably did back in the 1960s. Sometimes the procurement of tissues is slower than required time and this is not good for our researchers. This information is filtering back to the hospitals who know that donating families wish to give the best quality

from loved ones' eyes. Secondly, Lions around the state are roaring! The word is spreading that Lions remain strictly devoted to LGS and the University. We serve!

So, a great thing for each of us to do. As a donor, you now have available to you new plastic donor cards to place in your wallets behind your driver's licenses. Lion Christy and I are catching zone meetings and are ready to visit your clubs. Not only do we have the cards but we are sharing again the message of first quality from Lions Gift of Sight and the Vision Foundation.

A big bump in the road that we are conquering. You may wonder why we talk less about the proposed Lions Eye Institute. Easy to understand that the university staff has spent all time and overtime on the eye banking issue. Our building is still in the realm of possibility, just a delayed time line.

Fellow Lions, we have given, since 1960, millions collectively to Lions Gift of Sight, Children's Eye Clinic, Research Department, MAC Center, Surgery Center, Glasses Recycling Center, Kidsight. Now, more than ever, Lion Christy and I are anxious to visit your clubs sharing the passion of Lions' original mission. As directors, we continue to View Forward. Our legacy is great and our goals will continue to be met. We are your directors ready to serve. Reminding you again that now is time to plan your club visits for the coming year. HEARING FOUNDATION NEWS



On the October 13th Lions Hearing Foundation meeting a new mission and vision statement was presented to the Trustees by the PR committee. A shortened version of the organization name was proposed:

Minnesota Lions Hearing Foundation. This needs to be approved at the Multiple convention board meeting in April 2019.

Dr Bevan Yueh gave an update on U of M updates and research projects. One item of interest was the naming of hospitals, new name is "M Health Fairview".

His request for funding was \$80,625 for research Doctors working on projects like causes of Menieres disease, implications of E-cigarettes on healing, repairs of cleft lip, diagnose concussions. There were nine research requests. The Trustees voted to spend 4100,000 so all nine requests could be honored.

How Does Funding Research Help Lead to Better hearing?

Your funding helps support the creation and management of a database that will allow future researchers

access to vital patient information needed to answer important questions about hearing loss, its causes, and its potential treatments. Lions can help fill the funding gaps for hearing related studies that are too small for support from larger sources, yet can impact our understanding of hearing loss.

In other business, the Cochlear picnic was well attended, even with cold, wet weather. The State Fair Booth went well with discussion on the Health Fair in another building. There is a need for some signage at the booth to let people know of the free testing going on at the Health Fair building.

Mid Winter Convention booths were discussed and some updating of material is needed.

Perception. It's all a matter of perception. When you see a person in a wheelchair in a handicapped parking space you think nothing of it. That's what the space is for, right? Well, what if you see a person like me, a person with a hidden disability?

I have had people yell at me that I don't look handicapped. I have had them leave notes on the car complaining that we are taking up a space for a "legitimately" handicapped person. I have been scolded for using a handicapped restroom. These are just some examples of what happens when you live with a hidden disability.

I have people ask me if I am training my Leader Dog, Tulip. When I explain that she is my guide and we are a team, I am usually told that I don't look blind. Really, what does blind look like? Just for fun, I made myself a tee shirt that says "Wanna see how blind I am, Hand me your car keys."

I have Retinitis Pigmentosa (RP) and Glaucoma. I have approximately 8 degrees of perception. That's about the equivalent of looking through two toilet paper holders. Try it for a minute or two and see if you can maneuver a parking lot. It isn't easy. I was diagnosed with RP about 28 years ago, so I have had a lot of practice using tricks that I have learned to get around.

When I am in a room, I touch a lot of things. I touch chairs, I touch people, I run into doorknobs and I shuffle my feet. I do anything that makes it easier for me to get through the room. Before I got Tulip, when I walked in my neighborhood, I walked the same path. I could tell you where the manhole covers were, where the dips were in the pavement, where the drains were and if there were potholes. These are things that a sighted person never thinks twice about.

When you have something like RP, you do a lot of scanning. My eyes go back and forth and back and

forth getting the largest picture of my surroundings as fast as possible. That works just fine if you are in an open area when your surroundings don't change rapidly. It doesn't work as well in a grocery store, an airport or a football game. I bowl regularly in leagues. A bowling center is a very dangerous place for a visually impaired person. Other bowlers ask me, "How do you bowl if you can't see?" I explain, "Watch the tricks that I use." I put my hand on the chair in front of the scoring console. Then I put my hand on the console itself. Then I shuffle up to the lane until my foot hits the approach. I can see well enough to find my ball, so that's easy. Then I look at the pins. I cannot see the mark on the lane and the pins at the same time, so my next step is to find my mark. You know the saying, Keep your eye on the prize? Well, that's what I do. I concentrate on one mark on the lane and throw the ball. While I am doing this, my beautiful Leader Dog Tulip is lying under the chairs watching me.

Having RP is difficult at best. In October 2015, I went to Leader Dogs for the Blind and met my partner, Tulip. What a tremendous gift! She goes almost everywhere with me. I still use my tricks to get around when she is not at my side. I trust her to get me through when we are together. She finds the curb, our car, the restroom, my grandkids, the door and so much more. She walks me around puddles and obstructions. She has even stopped me from walking in front of a moving car! She knows that I have a hidden disability even if others can't tell.

I wanted to share this beautiful story since she shared some of her life history. What a great gift the Lion's give to individuals like Jackie with there support of Leader Dog for the Blind. 


