We had a good crop of tomatoes, and I spent several days canning (yes some of us still do that) When Lion Bill brought in two more 5 gallon pails of tomatoes the day before we were leaving for a week, my attitude of gratitude went I did apologize and we found good homes for his tomatoes (he is so devoted, he thinks of them as his kids)

There are so many good reasons to be grateful, but mostly because it feels so good. "You've never met an ungrateful person who was happy, nor have you ever met a grateful person who was unhappy" Zig Zigler

According to research at the University of Miami, gratitude positively affects every area of life. The study found people that keep gratitude journals had more energy, were more optimistic, were more likely to reach personal goals, had higher life satisfaction, and were more generous to name just a few.

What is a gratitude journal; simply daily writing three things you are grateful for, the catch however, everyday you need three new gratitude's, no repeats. The process keeps us in the present, making the most of our now, rather that worrying about the past or being apprehensive about the future. Let me share my today's entry with you: I am grateful to wake up without having to hear the alarm; but grateful to be able to hear; I am grateful for the car pool to Mahnomen; I am grateful for our productive garden.

So what does all this have to do with Lions? When is the last time you recognized a lion member for the good work they do for your club? Recognition for good work is an important element in retention of our membership. Members, who receive regular appreciation and praise, feel like they belong and are willing to work with increased vigor on projects and fundraisers. We all want to feel appreciated: make gratitude a habit, let your fellow members how much they mean to you.

Prison Goes to the Dogs!



One of the best kept secrets about Leader Dogs for the Blind was shared by the Lions in 5M1 recently with Lion Kevin and me. We were invited by 5M1 to join them October 2nd to visit a minimum security prison in Rockwell City, IA to view the Leader Dogs program for puppy training at the North Central Correctional Facility. Not knowing what to expect, I was blown away by the remarkable life changing program Leader Dog has put in place for the last 10 years at this prison. A dog is man's best friend, but who knew that through this program a Leader Dog has the ability to change the lives of two people coming from very different walks of life?

When Duane Brant faces his parole board next year, he hopes they see in him what he sees in the mirror every day a changed man. "Working with these dogs gives you a sense of responsibility and worth, "Brandt said. "It's one of the best programs the DOC (Dept of Corrections) ever had. It's definitely a way to give something in return for a lot of misery I caused when I was young." At 19, he drove the getaway car for a robbery gone bad. A man was killed. He received life in prison. He sentence has been changed, and now, after 35 years later, he is eligible for parole.

Inmate James Nott spoke before us, a crowd of around 100 Lions and civilians, and said, "It's hard to put into words the effect these dogs have on the whole institution. The chance to know we're giving eyes back to a blind person." It was very emotional and personal when James told us that his dog, Tiny, was returning back to Michigan to Leader Dog. James tried to keep his composure as he told us how special Tiny was to him, but we could all feel his impending loss.

Leader Dogs are at the prison in large part due to the generosity of Lions Clubs, where the mission has always been to help the blind. We make our donations to this organization, not realizing the scope this program reaches. This is why we support such organizations!

Fact: The rate of recidivism (relapsing into criminal behavior) for inmate puppy trainers is ZERO! And yes, they did let me out of the prison!

ROCHESTER, Minn., Aug. 22, 2011 /PRNewswire/ -- How do we make our communities better? It happens block-by-block, neighborhood-by-neighborhood: people, community groups and businesses working together and working hard to foster healthy choices and improved lives. And, while Olmsted County consistently ranks high nationwide in health and livability rankings, the individual efforts that foster these rankings go unnoticed, their good deeds unheralded.

"Healthy communities promote a culture of health and active living," said Kari Etrheim, Health Education Manager at <u>Olmsted County Public Health</u>. "Everyone can contribute to ensuring members of our community have access to fresh foods and opportunities to be active where we live, learn, work and play."

Making it Better seeks to bring people together to discover, celebrate and share stories of Olmsted County residents and neighbors who are working to make their communities healthier through smart food and physical activity choices. Several community members are already taking steps to make their schools, neighborhoods and workplaces healthier and are featured in local advertisements and online at www.makingitbettermn.org:

- 11 childcare centers in Olmsted County that are working to focus on physical activity for kids in both structured and unstructured settings all as part of a new initiative that integrates movement into early learning. The expectation is that skills and attitudes kids learn now can carry over in other settings and foster healthy living in later years.
- Members of Rochester Fire Department Station 3 decided to supplement their station wellness efforts with an increased focus on nutrition after learning that nationwide 50 percent of firefighter deaths off duty in the past 10 years have been cardiovascular related. The result: a beautiful vegetable garden less than 100 feet from the kitchen table for all three shifts to enjoy.
- <u>Dover-Eyota Public Schools</u>, which in 2011 marked its third year of its farm-to-school program, offering fresh meats, fruits and vegetables in its school lunches that have been sourced from local farms. In addition to promoting healthier nutritional choices among students, children learn how food is grown and produced. Students also gain a better understanding of how eating locally sourced foods directly supports area farmers, some of which are relatives or friends of the students attending the schools.

Throughout the campaign, Olmsted County residents are invited to share their ideas for making it better where they live, learn, work and play. During the month of October, those that are making changes in their community, schools and worksites are asked to submit their story of how they are making it better for a chance to win prizes and potentially be featured in a new Making it Better advertisement that will debut in January 2012. Communities Putting Prevention to Work in Olmsted County

Making it Better is made possible by the <u>U.S. Department of Health and Human Services</u> as part of <u>Communities Putting Prevention to Work</u> (CPPW), a federally-funded initiative that supports policy, systems and environmental changes to reduce obesity, a primary cause of chronic disease. Effectively addressing some of the key behaviors that contribute to obesity lack of physical activity and poor nutrition can have a significant impact on the health of a community.

Olmsted County is one of 50 communities nationwide selected to participate in the national CPPW initiative, which is being led locally by Olmsted County Public Health with guidance from the Minnesota Department of Health. The Making it Better campaign is being launched concurrently in Olmsted County and Minneapolis.


At Project New Hope, we are driven by our mission: To provide veterans and their families the education, training and skills necessary to manage their lives after wartime service.
