Did You Know?

Hi Lions. The holidays are fast approaching and will look a lot different this year. We're still heading out to Gaylord and Clara City to see our families, but the crowds will be smaller than usual. It feels good to see family, but it's sometimes hard to load up, get back into the car and

tell everyone it's time to leave.

Hi! I'm your new Lion and I'm leaving! Have you ever heard this at your club? Along with welcoming your new members, it's important to make sure they begin participating in club activities right away. We don't want new members going out the back door as fast as they are coming in the front door. We worked hard to get them here, let's work to keep them. If our club members feel welcome, comfortable and are involved in community service, they will remain part of the club for a long time. Recruiting new members is important for ensuring the health of a Lions club. However, identifying prospects, inviting them to join and inducting them into a club are only the beginning. For the long-term vitality of a club, Lions must also focus on retaining members. Statistics show that **50% of** new members drop out of Lions within the first three years.

Why do members leave clubs? Research indicates members leave for the following reasons:

- 1. Lengthy/boring meetings
- 2. Club politics/cliques
- 3. Lack of involvement
- 4. Lack of cooperation and not working together

Did you know that one way to make a member feel involved is if we ask their opinion? Seems like a Duh Moment, but we sometimes take our members for granted.

Ask your members: Why is our club here? Do our activities demonstrate this? If a non-Lion looked at one year of our activities, what would they think was important to our club?

When we have a club member leave the organization do we say Good Riddance and move on with our lives? Or do we talk to them and find out the reasons they left? Sometimes asking a Zone Chair or cabinet member to reach out to them helps keep emotions out of the equation. Without finding out why members are leaving the club, we have no way of improving. Please consider giving this a try.

When we all have skin in the game, we are more likely to feel part of the club and want to contribute to its successes. When our clubs have the same folks involved with the same events year after year, things have a chance to go stale. Bring your new members into committees right away. They don't need to be in charge of the event, but get them involved. If everyone is involved, they are less likely to leave the club.

LCI has a lot of information on its website to help our clubs and 5M2 with member retention.

We are looking for Lions from your district to attend the 2021 MD5M Regional Lions Leadership Institute!

Lions that are selected as participants in the Institute must be in good standing in a Lions Club and may not be a 1st Vice District Governor, District Governor, Past District Governor, International Director, or Past International Director.

The \$150 fee for the Leadership Institute includes the cost of materials, facility, staff, and four (4) meals. Room costs and additional meals are not included.

However, a \$75 rebate from MD5M, through a grant from LCI, will be given to each participant that completes the program.

Participants MUST be available to attend ALL sessions beginning on Thursday evening and ending Sunday afternoon.

Each district has the opportunity to send six (6) participants; however, if other districts do not meet their allotment, your district may send additional Lions. The Institute will have a maximum of 72 participants.

Applications are available from your District Governor or on the MD5M Website and are due (without fees) by December 1, 2020.

Your District Governor will then make the final participant selection.

Institute graduates will tell you that the Regional Lions Leadership Institute is beneficial for you in every facet of your life and not just in your role as a Lion.

Purpose

To honor those Lion and Lioness members of character and substance who have demonstrated the highest level of commitment and dedication to the efforts of their club, district or multiple district and the motto of our association, "We Serve."

Award

There shall be a maximum of one (1) recipient of the MD5M Hall of Fame Award per district, inducted into the MD5M Hall of Fame each year. The award may be presented posthumously.

The MD5M Hall of Fame award recipients are to be inducted into the Hall of Fame at the annual MD5M Multiple District Convention during the Saturday noon luncheon.

MD5M Hall of Fame recipients shall receive a MD5M Hall of Fame award plaque and a Hall of Fame lapel pin in recognition of their induction in the MD5M Hall of Fame. In addition, a complete listing of all MD5M Hall of Fame recipients shall appear in the annual MD5M directory and a perpetual plaque, with the names of all inductees and the year of their induction inscribed thereon, shall be kept in a prominent place in the MD5M office, when available.

The presentation of the MD5M Hall of Fame inductees shall be the responsibility of the current International Director from MD5M, if there is one and he/she is in attendance at the MD5M Multiple District Convention. If not, then the most recent Past International Director having served from MD5M in attendance at the MD5M Multiple District Convention.

Criteria

A candidate may be a Lion or Lioness, must have been a member in good standing for at least 15 years, be at least two (2) years removed from the Council of Governors if a PDG, should have qualifications above and beyond the call of duty including social and human endeavors, and he/she should be of good moral character and have a good reputation in his/her community. A nominee must be a member in good standing of a Lions or Lioness Club, or must have been a member in good standing of a Lions or Lioness Club at the time of their death.

Process

A candidate may be sponsored by any Lion, Lioness, Lions Club, Lioness Club, Zone, or District.

There shall be a nomination fee of \$150.00 per each candidate nominated. The nomination fee shall be returned to those sponsors whose candidates are not elected for induction into the MD5M Hall of Fame. The nomination fee for those selected for induction shall be sent to MD5M and shall be used to offset the cost of the award process, plaques and pin.

Nominations, including the nomination fee, must be received by the District Governor at least 30 days prior to the District's Midwinter Convention.

Each individual District shall annually hold an election at their Midwinter Convention to determine the candidate(s), if any, to be inducted into the Hall of Fame for that Lion Year. Each sponsor shall have an opportunity to give a brief presentation on the merits and biographical information of their nominee prior to the election. Those elected to be inducted into the MD5M Hall of Fame shall not be publicly announced until their induction at the MD5M Multiple District Convention.

All nominations shall use the standard form, no others shall be accepted. The nomination fee must be received at the time the application is received, otherwise the nomination shall not be considered.

All successful candidates shall be inducted into the MD5M Hall of Fame at the next MD5M Multiple District Convention. The sponsor(s) and the respective District Governor shall ensure that the honoree or a suitable representative shall be in attendance at the MD5M Multiple District Convention Saturday Luncheon when the honorees are inducted.

A brief biography of each inductee shall be announced to those in attendance during the induction ceremony at the annual MD5M Multiple District Convention.


Gibbon Lions

Arlington Lions Community Bench Project

Is your club looking for a new, limited-contact project to conduct during the pandemic? Have you often wished that you could recycle those plastic store bags or bread bags or that case wrap on the water you purchased? Would you like to receive a free, limited maintenance bench for your community also? Think no more! Go to trex.com/recycling and find out how your community, by collecting 500# of plastic film in a 6-month period of time, can earn a bench for your community, save additional plastic from the landfills, and impact a Lions International focus area - Environment.

On November 22, 2020, the Arlington Lions Club, in partnership with the Arlington Chamber of Commerce, embarked on a 6-month project to collect 500# of plastic film and bags. Collectible items include grocery bags, bread bags, case overwrap, dry cleaning bags, newspaper sleeves, ice bags, wood pellet bags, ziplock & other resealable bags, produce bags, bubble wrap, salt bags, and cereal bags. Members need to collect the plastics dropped off at the collection sites several times a week, sort and make sure the saved plastics are appropriate, clean and free of food residue, weigh the bags, and finally drop the collection bags at the local grocery store for eventual transport to Trex via the grocery distributor. Haggenmiller Lumber of Arlington has graciously offered us storage space for our collected plastics and enough social distancing space in one of their buildings to safely sort and weigh the plastic.




