Rule # 5 Help each other win and take pride in each other's victories. "You can have anything you want in life, if you will just help enough other people get what they want."-Zig Ziglar

We learned all aspects of the Leader Dog Program; from persons who host "Mom" Dogs in their home prior to delivery; from puppy raisers, who raise a dog from the age of 7 weeks to 12 months of age; from the actual trainers of these magnificent dogs and finally, from persons whose lives were changed forever, due to receiving a Leader Dog and training at no cost to them.

We also were fortunate to observe a group of "students", who just received their Leader Dogs four days before our visit. The group included blind and visually impaired persons of all ages, from all walks of life.

It was certainly gratifying to watch these "students" begin using life-changing mobility skills, knowing that donations from our Club, our District, and from us as individuals have helped make these miracles happen. We did find our individual "Bricks", purchased several years ago, and we were reminded that the "Buy a Brick" program does continue. I will let our District Leader Dog Chairpersons, Lion Shirley, and 2nd VDG Joan explain this donation option in their presentations.

Another highlight was the opportunity for Lion Jean and myself to each "test drive" a Leader Dog. We were blindfolded and I took hold of the harness of "Maverick", a strong, dark-haired German Shepherd, who helped me maneuver a short course, stopping me abruptly, before I would have stepped off a curb, and kept me walking straight on a sidewalk. Jean's Leader Dog "Dillon", a Golden Retriever, was equally skilled and moved her along the course without incident also.

Although we were deprived of our vision for only a few minutes, it drove home several things. First, the remarkable degree of training these dogs have received. Second, the total trust that a visually impaired person must have in his or her dog. And third, how grateful it is to be a part of Leader Dogs, a



Eye of the Lion

It has been the custom of the "Eye" columnist to take a brief sabbatical in July of each year. However, Lions never seem to take vacations, sabbaticals or respites, so I am breaking from my "customary" ways and focus this column on a very important Lions project.

PROJECT NEW HOPE

The mission of Project New Hope is to provide all combat veterans and their families the education, training and skills, at a retreat in a relaxed rural setting, that elevates their ability to manage life experiences. Project New Hope is free to soldiers and their families. No one is turned away. The camp locations are rural, pristine and private for a relaxed environment. Sessions are based on the veterans need and pace. Child care is provided so couples can focus on session time. Licensed professional counselors are 100% volunteer and available 24/7.

Why do Lions feel a need for this project?

- -50% of the more than 1.6 million troops deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan have been deployed twice or
- -2 out of 3 veterans that require some form of help are not getting or seeking help.
- -Suicide rates for veterans age 20-24 are 400% greater than their civilian counterparts.
- -Recent military study shows that 75% of all suicides are the result of a failed relationship once the soldier returns home.
- -Veterans that have died by suicide now out number the number of combat veterans killed in action in Iraq and Afghanistan combined.
- -Statistics say every 40 minutes a soldier tries to commit suicide. Every 80 minutes a soldier does commit suicide.
- -Many veterans may be in denial or not recognize issues resulting from their time of service. Family members can be encouraging and support in seeking help for themselves and their soldier. They come home to "normal" life....that is often a "new normal".

Although, many of these statistics are based on Iraq and Afghanistan soldiers, this program is available for all veterans; including Korean and Vietnam veterans.

Please share this information with family members, clergy, medical providers, counselors, American Legion, VFW, DAV, etc. and help Lions spread the word to our veterans who may be suffering. For more information on Project New Hope go to:

Lions Youth Exchange to Norway

We stayed with Lions Stefan and Helle Soos at their cabin near Töcksfors, Sweden with four students from Italy before the camp. Their cabin was larger than our typical home with six bedrooms. We had the pleasure of watching a construction crew from Denmark work on an addition to the cabin with enough space to sleep 54 people. The family runs four kindergartens (we call them nursery schools); one of the requirements for the students is to participate in an overnight outing before beginning school. This addition will assist them with fulfilling that requirement.

The Lions of District 104 hosted the Innovation and Environment Camp. We stayed at a school in Vestby, about 35 minutes south of Oslo. Eight clubs from the Zone planned an activity and outing, usually to visit something within their community. Representatives from that club would accompany us for the day. This provided opportunities to learn about some of their fundraisers and projects. There were 8 boys and 19 girls from Belgium, Denmark, England, Estonia, Finland, France, Georgia, Germany, India, Israel, Italy, Netherlands, Poland, Slovakia, Slovenia, Switzerland, Turkey, Ukraine and of course the US. The camp language was English although several youth had more difficulty and relied on others from their county to translate for them,

We visited many sites that taught us about the history and legends of Norway. Our prayers and thoughts go out to those that were affected by the bombing at the government center and shootings at the Labor Party Youth Camp. We were very fortunate to have visited the area around the government center just 24 hours before the bombing. We heard it was being reported that it happened at a "youth camp." This prompted us to have all the students contact their parents to reassure them it didn't involve us. Some of the activities that were planned for us were canceled as a result. It definitely changed the mood of the country and the students immediately wanted to know what they could do wanting to donate blood and/or help clean-up the streets; truly demonstrating the Lions motto "We Serve."

We also had the opportunity to spend a few days at the home of Lion Christer Hedenskog from the Skiptvet Lions and his wife Birgit. Their son, Nicholai, participated in the Lions Youth Exchange Camp in Italy. While there, we visited with the District Governor, Roar Eng, who is there neighbor. Both Christer and Roar raise honeybees.

Part of the experience is participating in everyday activities with the host family. One of the activities we did with both host families several times was "plunking kanterell" an edible mushroom that grows in the deciduous and coniferous forest. They have a characteristic appearance, smell and taste. I also had the opportunity to go into the rain swamp and pick moltebeere (English translation is cloudberry), a very rare berry in Central Europe. We also picked rips (redcurrents) and made juice and jelly from them. We tried many new and different foods some we enjoyed and some not so much. Learning they throw away over ripe bananas prompted our making banana bread. We ended up making four batches, two at each home. They enjoyed the taste and thought of it more as a cake and the eight loaves went very quickly; thus the recipe was shared with everyone.

Our Lions family has grown and we will treasure this experience of a lifetime.

Jordaness Lions

We ended our year end with a performance of the Jordaness Church Basement Ladies at the multiple convention and scholarship donations. The club is on task and running smoothly under the leadership of President Amy Piotrowski and the new board. Committee positions for the new year's projects are filling up. The idea for 3 new fundraising ideas are being researched. (No telling yet...). The summer months are a bit quite for us. We worked the concession stands at the high school baseball tournament held in Jordan, made a donation (bought a brick!) to the Helen Keller Memorial/Knights of the Blind Walk, and had a newspaper article on Project New Hope published in the Jordan Independent the week of July 4.

The club was mulling over hosting a fall garage sale (we sponsor a city wide in the spring). This has been tabled until fall of 2012 and we may do a boutique like sale (high end garage sale stuff...but VERY valuable junk!).

The Jordan Car Cruise will be held on Sept 9, the Jordaness will be selling the freshest, crispiest French fries in the area and on Sept 10th, at Heimatfest, our menu changes to corn dogs, cheese stick and reuben balls! The activities of this weekend are great community fun.

In October, the Jordaness Lions Social Cats and board members will be hosting a Lions 101 event for new members and for any seasoned members wanting a Lions refresher course. The evening includes a light supper, info on Lions history and our activities, member and board responsibilities and a chance to relax and get to know each other.

Our annual Holiday Show is scheduled for November 19th. The event is held at the OK Corral in Jordan. The committee once again, is being very creative for the theme of this year's event...but it is top secret. There are door prizes, raffle items, a great lunch, creative fashion and entertainment. Could the Jordaness Green Day/Lions Church Ladies make an appearance once again??? Don't miss this event! More info to follow on ticket sales and prices.

The 19th Jordan ornament will be going to production soon. The design is under wraps and premier sale of the ornament is at the Holiday Show on the 19th of November. Like many other service □ organizations, the Lafayette Area Lions Club has helped many young people □ finance their college educations.

The club is proud to have awarded □ a total of \$89,800 to 182 graduating high school seniors over the last 16 □ years. Individual scholarships have usually been \$500, but occasionally have been less, depending on funds available. The 12 recipients of this year's Lafayette ☐ Area Lions \$500 Scholarships are Megan Nutting, Adam Portner, Bradley Portner, □ and Michelle Youngblom of New Ulm High School; Meghan Gleisner of New Ulm Cathedral; Cameron Grommersch and Samantha Scheurer of Nicollet; and Brittany Dummer, Courtney Guenther, Kendra Lange, Jacob Sjostrom, and Emily Steiner of GFW High School. The number of awards is based on funds available, as well as the number of qualifying applicants. As many as 28 applications have been received in a year, with the club only able to present scholarships to half. Other years, every applicant received a scholarship.

When there are more qualifying applicants \(\) than funds available, applicants are ranked on volunteer experience and service \(\) in the community, school, and/or church; grade point average/academic \(\) achievements; work experience, sports and other extra curricular activities; \(\) and an essay on future plans. In \(\) addition, students must live in close proximity to Lafayette, as illustrated on \(\) a map attached to scholarships applications. \(\)

The Lafayette "scholarship area" is larger than most other organizations, and □membership in the Lions club is not a requirement nor does it improve an □applicant's score in the ranking process. □Scholarship recipients and their parents are encouraged to attend the □Lions club's scholarship banquet, to be held Tuesday, July 12 this year. The Lions scholarship committee encourages □input from the community and the club is always open to new membership. Growth □of the local Lions organization is good for the community and members benefit □in return.
