The 96th Lions International Convention

As I write this, Lion Kevin and I have been home less than one week from attending the 96th Lions International Convention in Hamburg, Germany. We had a fantastic time. I had no clue what was in store for the both of us, but here are some adjectives that describe our experience: thrilling, vibrant, exhilarating, informative, inspiring and all out fun.

Our seven-hour non-stop flight to Amsterdam was a breeze and Hamburg was just a quick 45 minute flight from there. Once we arrived at our hotel, we met up with the 11 other District Governor Elects from our multiple district of Minnesota, Manitoba and Northwest Ontario and their spouses. We are fortunate that all the District Governor Elects get along well and we thoroughly enjoy each other's company as we compare notes on what works in each of our districts.

The first four days included training with 30 District Governor Elects from around the world. In my particular group, I had DGE's from Africa, India, England, Wales and the U.S. It is amazing how we all come from such different walks of life but all are working towards the common goal of serving our communities. After our four days of training for 750 plus District Governor Elects, we were treated to a "Celebration Banquet" which was over the top. All DGE's and spouses dressed in formal wear and were treated to a fabulous supper in an old warehouse by the Hamburg harbor that was decorated like a fancy wedding reception, all done in white linens and floral, with superb German waiters and waitress serving us. That night will be a lasting Lion memory.

The next day, 18,000 Lions arrived for the actual International Convention. Rather than write a small book about the Convention, here are some highlights:

Excellent concert given by "Up with People" featuring an international cast performing both original and popular music including fast-moving choreography and colorful costumes.

International Parade that was thrilling to take part in. Everyone along the parade route loved the two Snowman mascots from the MD5M group, who had to stop repeatedly to have their pictures taken. The parade was the highlight of the convention for me.

Keynote speaker as Laura Bush, speaking on behalf of literacy and the right for every child to be able to read.

Another guest speaker was Princess Laurentien of the Netherlands, who also spoke on reading programs and the steps that need to be taken to fight illiteracy.

A surprise guest was Houston Basketball Player "Yao Ming" who towered above everyone on stage at 7'6". Yao was honored for his work with Special Olympics.

Humanitarian Award was presented to Andrea Bocelli, a world famous Italian Tenor who became blind at the age of 12 following a football accident. He has set up his own Foundation whose mission is to empower people and

communities in situations of poverty, illiteracy, distress due to illness and social exclusion by promoting and supporting projects that overcome these barriers.

I was delighted to see these Lions from 5M2 in attendance, PID Debra Wasserman and Lion Steve Wasserman, PID Maynard Rucks and PDG Eunice Rucks, PDG's Tom and Mary Ferleman and IPDG Ron Dahlke and Lion Jean Dahlke.

I could go on and on about the Convention, but in summary, I would encourage anyone to attend the 97th International Convention next year in Toronto, Ontario. You will be amazed!

BEEP BASEBALL

GLENCOE LIONS GET INSPIRED AT MULTIPLE DISTRICT CONVENTION AND MAKE A DREAM A REALITY.

Lions Gary and Emmy Koch attended the Multiple District Convention back in April held in Rochester. While there, they were introduced to some of the players of the "Minnesota Millers", a baseball team for the visually impaired. Lion Gary invited the team to play during Glencoe Days and earn some money for their trip to Georgia for the Beep Ball World Series.

Here are a few excerpts taken from the Glencoe

Koch said the Beep Ball game is something new for the community and Glencoe Days, and added the Lions are always looking for new ideas to help the community and to help others.

Koch said the game ties into the Lions' mission of helping with sight and hearing impairment issues, not only in Minnesota but around the world. "I feel passionate about this." Koch said of the Beep Ball Program. "The Glencoe Lion members were a great help in getting this going."

The first beep baseball game in the history of Glencoe took place before a packed, curious crowd on Saturday, June 22, with many calling the event an eye-opening experience.

A team made up of local "celebs" hosting the Minnesota Millers. Teams are made up of blind and sighted individuals. All batters wear a blindfold; same goes for fielders with the exception of two spotters.

There are two bases – first and third – and the pitcher and catcher are on the same team as the hitters. The ball beeps, and once in play, the defensive players are tasked with possessing the ball before the runner reaches the base, which also gives off sound to alert runners to its location.

If a runner reaches the base before the ball is in the possession of the fielding team, a run is scored.

The first inning went pretty well, for the Millers, scoring

three runs as "oohhs" and "aahhs" escaped onlookers marveling at the Millers' ability to connect with the ball.

The laughs began when the Glencoe team took its turn at bat, and never really ceased until the game was over.

The Millers won 10-0 as the game ended in the fifth inning. Normal beep baseball games go six innings, but Glencoe team members felt they had been 10-runned.

"It was just fun and it was a chance to laugh at yourself," Glencoe team player Randy Wilson said. "They put it on a tee and it was still hard to hit for me. It was an eve opener to see what it's like to be blind."

"We had roughly 250 people there", Lion Gary Koch, who organized the event, said. "We ended up raising \$1,175 that we gave to the Millers."

It was a home run for everyone!

Channels 11, 9, and 4 all had reviews about the program. Channel 5 will feature the day on "Life to the Max" with Mike Max coming this fall.


