

Then there was another Plenary Session at which LCIF was featured with all the grants and aid given out in the World. A short Memorial Service and then nominations for Second Vice President and International Directors.

At the plenary Sessions there was some exciting, energetic entertainment. Real talent. There were seminars and shows one could attend. We attended some seminars.


The last day was the voting and installation of International President, District Governors and some entertainment. We missed most of this last day because of our flight connections.

The Lions of 5M2 engage our youth in many ways. The Albert Lea Lakeview Lions guided elementary students from the YMCA though the County Museum. The Courtland Lions helped provide backpacks and school supplies to 475 kids in Nicollet County. The NYA Lions donated money for a yearly citizenship award at Central Schools. And I know many of our clubs will be donating dictionaries to third graders in the next few months.

But remember, the challenge isn't to be a strong pride, it's to "Strengthen The Pride". There are youth in all of our communities who have needs that aren't being met. If we find even more of those youth, and meet even more of those needs in August (and the months to come) we will truly "Strengthen The Pride"!

The American Diabetes Association, Minnesota Area is currently planning our two largest programs of the year: Camp Needlepoint/Daypoint and our Diabetes Expo. I personally want to invite the members of your club to visit one or both of these programs this year.

Camp Needlepoint sessions are Sunday, August 10 to Saturday, August 16 and Sunday, August 17 to Saturday, August 23. Since registration and camper pick-up are the Sundays and Saturdays, we ask that you schedule a day during the week. The time at camp will include a tour of the camp facility, lunch with the campers and an opportunity to meet the medical staff, counselors and campers. Camp is located just south of Hudson, Wisconsin. Contact Chris Schaefer at 1-888-342-2383, ext. 6592 or by email at cschaefer@diabetes.org to schedule your visit. We ask that you not show up without first contacting us as we need to know who is on-site for the safety of the campers and staff.

Our Diabetes Expo will be held on Saturday, October 11th from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM at the Minneapolis Convention Center, Hall E. It is billed as "everything you need to know about diabetes under one roof" including workshops, cooking demonstrations, fitness activities, free health screenings, an "Ask the Expert" area, and vendors offering the latest diabetes products and services. Last year nearly 8,300 people attended; we're expecting more this year. As a Lion, you and/or your club can get involved in several ways:
