

# What is your legacy?

Recently, I attended a presentation on what your dash is. If you are not familiar with this topic, it is what does the dash between the date of your birth and the date of your death represent? The biggest takeaway is not how long we lived but how did we live? After I attended the presentation, I left wondering what I want my legacy to be.

For each person, legacy might mean something different. It could represent the assets you leave behind, or your faith and core values, it might be your reputation and the life you lived. The only thought I had given to legacy was who we would leave our assets to. In the absence of having children, was it important to us to have anything left to pass on, or during our retirement should we just have a lot of fun spending what we have saved?

After pondering the question of what legacy meant to me, I concluded it is not the assets we have, but how Glenn and I live our lives. The most important thing we want to instill in our families, especially our nieces and nephews, is our willingness to serve others. To accomplish this, I had to think about how we will teach them to give back to others and to try and lead by example. There are traditions we have started, such as taking them



to Fort Snelling during the Memorial Day holiday and placing flags on family member's graves. Glenn finds joy in sharing stories about the graves we place flags on. There are graves of family friends who no longer live in the area, they are appreciative when we include them during our rounds. It takes so little time, and it allows us to pass on family history and to set an example with our nieces and nephews.



As a Lion, we can leave a legacy with our family members in many ways. As I visit clubs, I enjoy hearing stories from members who became a Lion because their parents or grandparents brought them to meetings, service projects, or fundraising events when they were young. For others, it is because a family member received services from a Lion. In our local club, members will bring their children to our events, and we have also partnered with local Girl Scout and Boy Scout Troops to work with us. We have consistently received positive feedback from their experiences serving alongside our club members.

Community members attending our events express their happiness in seeing children participating. What kind of legacy do you want to leave? If you feel like I do, what can we do as Lions to foster this? Do you bring your children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, and friends to activities? Sometimes people like to receive an invite to participate; they might say no but they may say yes. If you don't get a yes the first time, ask again. When others see your actions and the satisfaction you receive from serving, it may instill in them a desire to participate the next time they are asked.

I realized as I re-read this, there were more questions than answers. I do hope it provides you with something to consider, what type of legacy do you want to leave?

# **World Sight Day and White Cane Safety Day**

One can feel a hint of fall in the air the past few days and you know the transition from the heat of summer to the coolness of autumn is beginning. I love autumn with the chilly starts to the mornings, the warmth of the afternoon sunshine, the bursts of color from the fall foliage and wearing my favorite sweatshirt. It's a time of transition for Lions clubs also as they resume club meetings, install new officers, recognize the service of fellow Lions, and return to old and new service projects.

The President/Secretary meetings for all the Zones have been held and DG Christy is starting her visits to the clubs in 5M-2. Has your club signed up for a visit? If you have not, please contact her soon so your club can be added to her calendar.

Did you know that two special days are observed in the month of October, and both were started by Lions Club International. World Sight Day, observed annually on the second Thursday of October, is a global event meant to draw attention to blindness and vision impairment. It was introduced by the SightFirstCampaign of LCIF in 2000 and has been widely observed across the world over the last 22 years. The theme this year is "Love Your Eyes at Work", focusing on eye health in the workplace.

To honor the many achievements of blind and visually impaired Americans and to recognize the white cane's significance in advancing independence, we observe October 15 as White Cane Safety Day. Today, the white cane works both, as a tool for the blind as well as a symbol, but this has not always been the case. In 1921, James Biggs of Bristol painted his walking stick white to make himself more visible to motorists. In 1930 a Lion's Club member watched a blind man attempted to make his way across a busy street using a black cane. With the realization that the black cane was barely visible, the Lion's Club decided to paint the cane white. In 1931 the Lion's Club International began a national program promoting the use of white canes. Many cities passed ordinance and bills giving the carrier of the White Cane protection while traveling on public streets. On October 6, 1964, a joint resolution of Congress voted to authorize the President to proclaim October 15 of each year as "White Cane Safety Day." Today, all 50 states have passed laws protecting the rights of a totally blind or partially blind pedestrian who is carrying a white cane or using a guide dog, the right-of-way on any public street. Do you observe White Cane Day in your community? In Faribault, the students who attend MSAB will be walking from their campus to a downtown park to share with the community the importance of the White Cane. The Faribault Lion's Club hands out cards that explain the white cane law while doing a fundraiser at a local grocery store. These funds have been used to purchase canes, tips or eyeglasses for students and others in the community.



We have started off our year, with our July training at the University of Minnesota /Department of

Otolaryngology. We met in their conference room and were able to visit the old temporal bone lab and also walk through where the new one will be. We are supporting the renovations with a three year donation as well as applying for an LCIF grant. The Hearing Foundation built the original lab over 25 years ago and are excited to be included in this new project, which will make it one of the top labs of its kind in the nation.

Our training was very exciting as we welcomed a few new trustees to our board. Everyone participated in the work-shops this year, just not the newest members. We all felt that a review of our history, the outreach we have and the policies helped us all.

Many of us are participating in the state fair booth, which combines 3 foundations: Hearing, Vision and Diabetes. There is a plinko board with prizes from all three, plus we all have materials to give out with information about our outreach. The Hearing handout includes ear plugs plus a bookmark with a scale on hearing loss related to various activities. Our plinko prizes include a sticky note pad and the coloring books put together last year by the attendees of IP Brian's first board meeting in October.

Our plans for this year include continued outreach to clubs to let them know about our foundation as well as working on a project that includes research and funding into portable hearing screening devices that would work with people of all ages, discovering possible hearing loss and referring them to audiologists for further examination. Thanks for all you do to help us in our mission of research, education and promotion of helping those with hearing needs.

# **Lafayette Lions Have Been Busy**

The Lafayette Area Lions served 350 adults and 36 kids for a total of 386 at their annual Hog & Corn Roast Saturday, August 26. They didn't do it alone, as they got help from the West Newton 4-H Club, the Lafayette Boy Scouts, the Nicollet County Pork Producers, Nicollet Pork Ambassador Grace Mages, and other volunteers. Many hands made the work easier and faster. Thanks, too, to the musicians who provided entertainment and the Lafayette Fire Department for working with the Lions on the joint end-of-the-summer event.

The club held another successful cash raffle, this one for the family of local resident Sandy Donnay. With 250 tickets sold at \$20 each, the raffle brought in \$5,000—with \$3,000 of that going to the Donnay family to help with expenses incurred before and at the time of Sandy's untimely passing due to cancer. Three \$500 cash prizes and two \$250 prizes were awarded in the drawing.

The Lions will hold another raffle in November, this one to help the family of little Marshyl Wenninger, who will undergo another heart surgery.

The Lafayette Lions are currently working with the City of Lafayette to undertake a massive updating of the Lions Kiddie Park in the city park. The Lions are bonding through the city to secure funding for the \$100,000 project, with bond payments to be made over several years. Charitable gambling proceeds, as well as donations from community businesses, families, and individuals will go toward the project. The target date for completion is the city's 125th Anniversary in July 2025.

On September 30, the Lafayette Lions will join forces with the New Ulm Lions Club to sponsor the 9th Annual New Ulm Diabetes Walk. The family-friendly event will raise funds to help find a cure for diabetes. This year's event is in a new location, Flandrau State Park in New Ulm.

It's an early morning on the day of the roast. The Lions pick a load of corn for the roast, then take it back to Lafayette where it's prepared for the meal.
