It is hard to believe that a few short months ago the grass was brown, and our yard was full of bare spots from the drought the past two summers. Now, we are mowing twice a week and constantly weeding especially in my landscape rock garden. Tonight was a perfect night to be out weeding the Creeping

Charlie until I unearthed a colony of biting ants, and they let me know I was not welcome near their home. Are our Lions clubs like the ants: unwelcoming, no fun, not open to new ideas, etc. or like the Creeping Charlie: adaptable, vibrant, and able to spread joy everywhere. (Well at least my lawn had some green in it last year!) Do we share the message that "We Serve" in our communities while having fun, being inclusive, listening, and open to everyone's ideas and suggestions?

I had the privilege of attending the Mission 1.5 Summit in Chicago the first weekend in August with 5M-2 Global Extension Team member (GET) PDG Rick Wagener and CA1 Global Action Team member PDG Anna Wickenhauser. You ask "What is the purpose of the GET? The GET is an offshoot of the Global Membership Team that is focused on starting new clubs within our district.

DG Lisa's goal is to start at least one new club this year-that would add twenty new Lions to the Pride. During one of the small group discussions Lion Rick and I were charged with identifying ten towns/cities within the district that we thought would be prime to organize a Lions club. Not an easy task with over thirty towns on our initial list. Our criteria included: population, previous Lions club, other service organizations and any prior consideration/interest about Lions. One of the ten has recently shown an interest and we have an informational meeting set with them at the end of August. Hurray!!! Others towns will be contacted as we go forward and hopefully they too will have an interest in starting a new Lions Club.

For the past forty years, the US has not seen a positive growth in memberships as other nations. For the month of July, the US had a net gain of one, while the Orient and Southern Asia combined saw a gain of 13,187 members. Mission 1.5 was put in place to reverse this trend and to increase the membership to 1.5 million by 2027. DG Lisa's goal set by LCI for the 2024-25 fiscal year is to increase membership by 205 new Lions. We are seeing positive growth with 44 new members including 4 re-instated Lions. Our drops were twenty-eight with a net gain of sixteen. Way to go Lions of 5M-2!! Keep up the GREAT Work!!

What is a Zone chair?

A Zone chair is the link between the clubs and the district. In order to be a Zone chair, you should have completed a term as the club president. The Zone chair serves a two-year term.

As a Zone chair we are asked to share information about programs and projects and conventions organized by the District, Multiple District and Lions International. We schedule a meeting for club presidents, secretaries and any officers of the club to meet fellow club members and discus topics led by the Zone chair(s) and District Governor Team. This meeting is usually held in October and involves multiple zones coming together.

As a Zone chair we also schedule a fall zone meeting and a spring zone meeting. We work with the District Governor Team and Global Action Team. This provides an opportunity for club leaders to share and interact. Provide learning opportunities for the club leadership and cele-

brates club success. The spring meeting includes awarding the Zone Lion of the Year.

As a Zone chair we encourage clubs to report service activities.

Take notes of any trouble or issues that a club may have and find the answers for them. Communication is the key to being successful.

As a Zone chair we are the eyes and ears of the District Governor to help make all clubs stronger. If your Zone chair can be of assistance to you, do not hesitate to contact them. We would welcome the opportunity to visit your club.




5M-2 Disaster Relief

Lions Clubs International – Word-of-Mouth matters!

Lions can use one of the easiest forms of marketing to make a big impact in promoting their Lions club and the things it does in their community. This type of marketing is word of mouth. You may already be using this kind of marketing, and you may not realize it.



You've probably told a friend about a favorite restaurant, emailed a work colleague about your latest shortcut to the office, or shared something on Facebook about a great new product you've discovered. These casual chats are what makes word-of-mouth marketing a potent opportunity for your Lions club.







Here are just a few ways that word-of-mouth marketing can be utilized by you and your fellow Lions:

- Wear something everyday to identify you as a Lion. When you meet someone and they ask about your pin or apparel, it allows you to have a conversation about the Lions.
- Mention your upcoming Lions club event or project with people you meet in your daily travels. Shop keepers, physicians, hair stylists, and other places you patronize might be interested in supporting your activity after hearing your story.
- Post something about your Lions club and its activities on your social media site, in your annual family
 holiday letters, or when you are catching up with family and friends. Speaking about the Lions to people
 you are comfortable with will help you become more comfortable in sharing your story with new people
 you meet.

A couple of tips regarding your use of word-of-mouth marketing:

- Prepare an 'Elevator Speech' for when someone asks you about Lions. This speech should be no
 longer than 15 to 30 seconds in length. Have it hit the highlights about who the Lions are and what they
 do. You should have your Lions club work together on this 'Elevator Speech' and everyone in your club
 should have it at the ready. You just never know when the opportunity will arise to talk to someone
 about your service to your community as a Lion.
- Make sure to keep your social media channels full of current photos and stories about your latest Lions
 events. Showing people how much fun you are having may encourage your site visitors to ask you for
 more information about what you are doing, and maybe ask you on how they can become a part of the
 next activity.







Make sure to incorporate word-of-mouth marketing into your Lions clubs' marketing strategy. You may find it surprisingly effective in getting your message across to your family, friends, and people you meet each day!

"Lions Clubs coming together for Service in our Communities"

The Jordan, Belle Plaine, and Green Isle communities are hosting the 2024 State Amateur Baseball tournament for 3 consistent weekends, August 16 - September 2nd. The Jordan, Jordaness, Belle Plaine, and Green Isle Lions clubs are all involved in various volunteer activities throughout the tournament. The 4 clubs also came together on an Ad in the tournament book.







Leader Dog is busy adjusting their programs to best serve their clients. Such as in the dining facilities adding Braille and large print to identify items on a shelf. Storing items in uniform packaging of same shape to identify product such as identifying similar products such as cereals that is stored in same shape containers, but then placing a tactile gem on container such as a square to indicate Special K, a star to indicate Raisin Bran. By using a PEN friend, a visually impaired person can identify the item by a voice recording. Also, for the Deaf Clients having the availability of alarm clock that connects to a mattress and box spring to initiate a vibration system that would indicate an alarm such as someone at the door. The device has a small section that removes from the device and the deaf client can clip to one's clothing to alert the client when he or she is not in bed. A deaf client can also have a video relay system to alert them of a phone call. A communication assistant who is a qualified American Sign language interpreter can allows the client to receive phone calls that are quicker than email or text messaging. This allows communication between two individuals whom may be deaf or hard of hearing. Medical technology is also addressing these visually or hearing-impaired clients with Blood Pressure monitors that speak or present bold results, Blood Glucose monitors that do the similar. Technology is recognizing the importance of producing products to assist all even the ones with a disability.

Suppose you have just gotten a new puppy. One of the most important commands you can teach that puppy is how to stay. The command to stay is so important in many situations, such as getting out of a vehicle, through a doorway or gate. Stationing the puppy out of the kitchen during meal preparation or to keep the dog safe from a spill or broken item such as glass. Always be consistent, with commands. Begin in low-distraction areas. Please consider training your puppy or dog this important safety command. If you need additional tips on how to teach a dog to stay, reach out to a trainer or veterinarian for assistance or information.

HOW I BECAME A LION

On July 5, 2016 I was honored to be sworn into the Lions Clubs International as a member of the Hutchinson Lions Club. There starts my Lions Journey..... But did it?

In Feb of 2009 my life changed forever as my little 4 year old daughter was diagnosed with type one diabetes. As a young father that knew absolutely nothing about this autoimmune disease, my first thought was that of buying her a chocolate milk and that I had broke my child. After months and months of reading and learning I found that was NOT the case. As we were preparing not only our daughter but our selves for her big kindergarten appearance, we were told that we need two Glucagon shots, one for at home and one for at school. So off to the local pharmacy, upon arrival I received one of the biggest sticker shocks I remember. How could it cost THAT much to simply keep my child alive?

As we were living paycheck to paycheck, I explained that I would have to return at a later date to pick up these items. My wife and I were heart broke and frustrated as were talked about things to sell, who we could borrow from etc. About an hour later we received a call from the pharmacy that an anonymous donation was made that covered most of the bill. With tears in our eyes we returned to the pharmacy and begged for them to tell us the who and how, but the were steadfast in there silence. My wife and I never forgot that random act of kindness. So the Line of when I was sworn in and the exact moment that I BECAME a lion may be blurred a little but all I know for sure is I AM A LION!




Lions', Leos' Clubs News and Activities Hutchinson Lions


