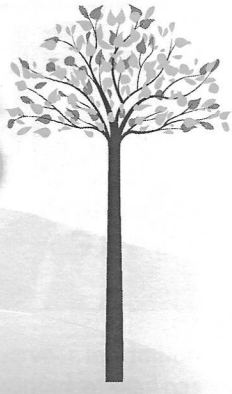

For my last newsletter article as your 2nd Vice District Governor, I would like to encourage you to **"Strengthen The Pride"** by accepting one more challenge in the coming Lions year. In addition to the Centennial Service Challenge, Lions Clubs International has initiated a Centennial Membership Program. My challenge to you is to embrace this new program by becoming a Centennial Sponsor.

Any Lion who sponsors a new member between April 1, 2015 and June 30, 2018, will be immediately recognized as a Centennial Sponsor. The Sponsoring Lion will receive a limited edition sponsor pin and certificate honoring them for helping to grow their club. The new Lion will receive a limited edition Centennial Lions Membership Pin and Certificate. In addition, if the new Lion remains a member of the club for one year and a day, the member and sponsor will be recognized as Silver Centennial Lions. If the new Lion remains a member of the club for two years and a day, they will be recognized as Gold Centennial Lions, and after three years and a day of active membership, they will be recognized as Diamond Centennial Lions.

You can also help earn recognition for your club. Any club that inducts three new members during any fiscal year, who remain active for at least two years and a day, will be recognized as a Premier Centennial Club, and if the club inducts three or more members in each of the three years of the campaign, they will be recognized as a World Class Centennial Lions Club.

I believe these recognitions being offered by Lions Clubs International can be of great value to our clubs in a number of ways. First, I think being a Centennial Member would be a pretty cool thing. I will admit that part of my decision to run for District Governor when I did was that I thought it would be pretty cool to be a Centennial Governor. The special recognition given to the new member may be a factor in their joining. They will be joining our organization at a very special time in our history. What an honor!

Secondly, being a Centennial Sponsor would be a pretty cool thing as well. It is your opportunity to be recognized for shaping a successful future for your club and Lions International. Perhaps it is the little extra motivation you need to step out of your comfort zone a bit and ask someone to join.

And thirdly, the presentation of these recognitions can provide a great public relations opportunity for your club. A new member induction is a great photo-op, and a Centennial Member Induction is even better! Your club may be able to use that event to get additional media coverage and as an opportunity to let your community know about our great 100 year history of service and our great ambition for the next 100 years.

There are many reasons to take advantage of the Centennial Membership Program, but certainly the best reason is that it's the right thing to do. Our clubs need new members to insure their success in the future. In the meantime, here is a powerful story about a recent graduate, Sandy McKie, who was recently partnered with a Can Do Canines Hearing Assist Dog named Alea. And, thank you for your continued support of our organization!

A Little Bit of Comfort

Sandy McKie & Hearing Assist Dog Alea

One of Sandy McKie's favorite quotes is from Neale Donald Walsh, who states ... "life begins at the end of your comfort zone." Little did Sandy know that being diagnosed with degenerative adult onset hearing loss in both ears would make her live out of her comfort zone 24/7.

In the beginning, her life didn't change drastically. The hearing aids, amplified phone, and audio assistance devices she bought helped. She told family and friends, but not co-workers, about her condition and life went on.

However, through the years, each check-up revealed increased hearing loss, and everyday life became more difficult. Sandy, who works at a junior high school in Scandia, Minn., found herself relying on co-workers more and more to alert her to the bells, alarms, and announcements she could no longer hear.

"And at home, I wasn't doing much better." Sandy says. "I burned meals, had an oven fire—due to not hearing the timer—and was late for work because I couldn't hear the alarm."

After expressing her frustrations, her audiologist suggested applying for a Hearing Assist Dog with Can Do Canines. Almost a year later, Sandy met Alea, a terrier-mix, adopted from the Animal Humane Society and trained by Can Do Canines. Sandy says that Alea has transformed her life in so many ways by alerting her to sounds both at work and at home.

"At home, Alea is able to alert me to alarms, timers and, because I live in a rural area, deer, crows and other critters," Sandy says "At work, she alerts me to bells, announcements and drills. I am confident that if any emergency situation should arise she will alert me to that as well."

When she's not working, Alea is like any other dog who loves to run outside, play and fetch. Sandy has begun having Alea pick up items such as keys when she drops them, because she can't hear the sound. As a result, Alea has begun to pick up everything

for a reward. Sandy is hoping that housekeeping will be next!

Sandy says she is eternally grateful to Can Do Canines for this gift of an assistance dog. She no longer feels sad or anxious about her hearing loss.

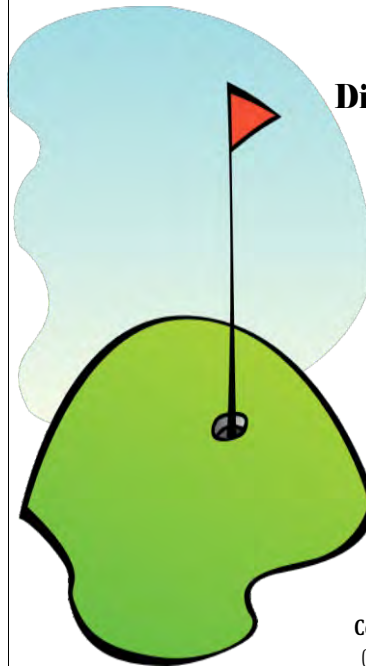
"Yes, my life will continue to change as everyone's does," Sandy says. "But with Alea's help, she will push me past my comfort zone with confidence."
