



Can Do Canines invites you to attend an open house on Saturday, March 4, from Noon to 2 p.m., at its Can Do Canines campus (9440 Science Center Drive, New Hope, Minnesota.). Potential clients, volunteers, or anyone who might be interested in supporting the organization are invited to attend to learn how an assistance dog changes the life of a person with a disability.



Through a self-guided tour, attendees will be able to watch a trainer working with an assistance dog, hear from a volunteer puppy raiser, talk with volunteer staff members, pose questions to client services coordinators about the application process, and meet graduate teams from each of the five types of areas Can Do Canines trains dogs: hearing, mobility, seizure, diabetes and childhood autism. The assistance dog demonstrations will be held at 12:30, 1:00, and 1:30, and the puppy raiser will speak at 12:15, 12:45, and 1:15.

The 2023 Mid Winter Convention is over. It was good to see many Lions friends in person. The convention was at a new venue and in one building with a lot less walking to get to the

convention area. The convention committee did a good job on planning this event.

One of the presenters at the convention was Dr. Meredith Adams, an Associate Professor in the Otolaryngology Head and Neck Surgery department at the U of M. She gave an outstanding presentation on the use of and where the temporal bone lab is located. She also explained the many parts of the ear. She explained the treatment and surgeries that can be done to correct a patients hearing. The room was full for both of her presentations. The MN Hearing Foundation has pledged \$250,000 for equipment for the new Temporal Bone Lab.

Lion Wanda and myself will meet to update club rosters with new donations received. We will have each clubs donation ready for clubs when they want to give a Fellowship award. We will also sort the hearing aids collected at the convention. We still get a lot of boxes and cases

that we do not need. Also, batteries need to be removed from the hearing aids. The good packages of batteries are donated to nursing homes. The hearing aids are taken to the Starkey Company where 5M2 gets credit. The credit money can be used to purchase hearing aids in the Affordable hearing Aid Program. Traits of a Compassionate Leader

have to go over obstacles like how much sun a plant might need or water to keep it healthy, and they might have to keep certain wildlife away too.

Compassionate leaders are important because they set a good example of kindness, and kindness is contagious. lust like a compassionate leader a gardener Shows kindness by taking care of the plants and making sure it has all of its needs so it can blossom.





Assisting and Engaging the Blind

These tips will assist all of us to avoid awkwardness

People whom are blind or legally impaired run into many situations. Below are some ideas when you confront someone who is visually impaired.

- 1. If you wish to speak to a visually impaired person, please introduce yourself first. I am not able to know if you are speaking to me or to another person. For example, Hi Juan, this gives me an idea where you are so I can look at you. Please tell me also when you are leaving the conversation.
- 2. If you wish to help, that's wonderful. Please ask me first, and tell me what you may want to assist me with. Sometimes a blind person does need help, we get loss. Thank You for offering if I am not in need. That include people with a white can or guide dog, please do not assume we need help.
- 3. Don't just grab me, visually impaired people are always on high alert when in public. Don't try to place my hand on an object. Our first tendency is to pull away, which could contribute to a fall or other injury. It is safer to ask please, and then advise me such as too the right. We want to be safe.
- 4. I do not mind questions on my blindness or how it occurred or my service dog. Not all people will be receptive to this question, so one may ask, and apologize if the person is not open to speaking about there condition.

5. DON'T pet my guide dog. If his or her harness is on, they are working. Ask prior to petting him. My guide dog is working not only for his safety but also for mine. If people pet my guide dog when he is working, he may learn to seek attention while working, which is a distraction for both of us.

Added note. Humans are visual creatures. A high percentage of the brain cortex is devoted to processing images which assists us with reality and learning. For people who lose their sight, many cues sighted people perceive are no longer perceived at all, or only indirectly by using other senses. That makes travel and interaction challenging. There are currently 6 to 7 million Americans whom are visually impaired. Please feel free to say "hello" or if you sense they need assistance might be useful ask "if you can help?"
