

### HALL OF FAME AWARD

On Saturday, February 13, 2016 during 5M-2's annual Mid-Winter business meeting, one 5M-2 Lion will be elected to the MD5M Hall of Fame. The winner of this election will be inducted into the Hall of Fame at the 2016 Multiple District Convention Saturday luncheon, also in Mankato, on April 23, 2016. Has your club selected that person and sent the required information to District Governor Mary?

As noted by Second Vice District Governor Nancy Mathwig during the recently completed Fall Zone meetings, the purpose of the award is to honor a Lion or Lioness of character and substance who has demonstrated the highest level of commitment and dedication to the efforts of their club, district and multiple district and to the motto of our association, "We Serve".

### Criteria for the award -

- o May be a Lion or Lioness
- Must have been a member in good standing for at least 15 years
- Must be at least 2 years removed from the Council of Governors, if a PDG
- Have qualifications above and beyond the call of duty including social and human endeavors
- Should be of good moral character and
- Should have a good reputation in good standing in his/her community

 If deceased, must have been a member in good standing of a MD5M Lions or Lioness club at the time of his/her death.

### **Process**

- Nomination fee of \$150.00 for each candidate nominated must accompany the nomination to the District Governor. If your nominee is not elected during the Mid-Winter election, the \$150.00 is returned to the club.
- All nominations must be received by District Governor Marv no later than 30 days, prior to our Mid-Winter Convention or no later than January 12, 2016.

While only one 5M-2 Lion will be awarded the honor in 2016, every Lion nominated will be featured at the Mid-Winter convention when their bios are presented to the membership. Honor these deserving Lions with a nomination!


### Here's the latest:

Lions of the world have now provided service to more than **63 Million** people in the four Centennial Service Challenge Areas!

Here in 5M2, the **Service** is continuing to heat up as the temperatures cool off. So far 42 clubs have reported on projects serving 91,823 people!

Special congratulations to the:

- Jordan Lions
- Veseli Lions



They have joined the **Chaska Lions, Ellendale Lions,** and **Wells Lions** in reporting on projects in all four areas of the challenge, and will be receiving a four diamond patch for the 2015-2016 Lions year. Last year 56 clubs in 5M2 earned a banner patch, including 35 who earned the four diamond patch. Our goal for this year is to have all 64 clubs earn the four diamond patch! If your club needs help with project ideas or help in figuring out how to report the projects on MyLCI, I would be more than happy to work with your club.

### MD5M Centennial Celebration:

The planning committee for the **June 3, 2017** celebration at the **Mall of America** is being expanded and is looking for ideas. I will be participating on that committee, so if you have any suggestions please let me know, and I will pass them along.

### **Centennial Legacy Project:**

One of the Centennial Legacy Projects that will take place in the Multiple District will be Project KidSight. It is my hope that we will adopt that project as a District 5M2 Centennial Project as well. The MD5M KidSight Committee is working with the Minnesota Child Care Association and Project Head Start to identify sites where we can do vision screenings with an optical screener. They are beginning the project with New Horizon Child Care Centers. They have 60 centers throughout the state, including four sites in 5M2 where we hope to have Lions doing vision screening. The MD5M Committee will be looking for endorsement and participation from all of the affected districts, so we will have a great opportunity to be a part of this new project. More information about this will be coming soon.

### PREMIER CENTENNIAL LIONS CLUB



Any club that adds three new members in any fiscal year (July 1 – June 30) is eligible to qualify as a Premiere Centennial Lions Club, and will be recognized as such providing the members remain active for at least 2 years and a day. We have a little extra time to qualify for the recognition this year, as the program actually started on April 1, 2015, so the dates for the 2015-2016 year are April 1 – June 30. We are now up to 15 clubs in 5M2 that have brought in three or more new members so far this fiscal year.

They have joined the Albert Lea, Carver, Cologne, Le Center, Le Sueur, Lonsdale, NEW, Prior Lake, Shakopee, Waconia, and Winsted Lions as District 5M2 clubs having inducted three or more new members. There is still ample time for your club to join this group. If we believe (and want the public to believe) in our Centennial Motto "Where There's a Need, There's a Lion", we need to make sure there really are Lions there to meet those needs!

Now, if you've been reading my columns, you probably know that whenever I talk about membership, I also try to give you some reasons why we need new members. This is a basic personality flaw of mine. If you ask my parents, they will tell you that the first word out of my mouth was "Why?"; and I've been asking that question ever since. I have also spent quite a lot of time and energy trying to answer that question; and get others to ask and/or answer it (it's why I became a science teacher). If you look back to my November & December columns, you will find six reasons we need new members. Let's try for three more:

- New members can ease the workload on existing members. Many hands make for light work.
- 2. **New members make us feel better about our club.** A better turnout for meetings helps us feel better about inviting speakers to come to make presentations.
- 3. **New members keep our dues low.** This may be one you haven't thought about, but there are many fixed costs of operating the district, our multiple district and Lions International. More members allow those costs to be spread among a wider base.

There are many good reasons for bringing new members into our clubs. Lions Clubs International is offering us recognition. The Centennial of Lionism offers us a great opportunity. It's up to us to make it happen!

The Club Excellence Award provides clubs with guidance and goals that expand their service and strengthen the effectiveness of club management. It is more than an award...it helps our association build stronger clubs and stronger communities! Qualifying clubs will receive a Club Excellence Award pin for the club president and a banner patch.

### **ELEMENTS OF EXCELLENCE**

### 1. Service - Complete three service projects

Humanitarian service, whether in your local community or globally, is what Lions are all about. Your club may have existing projects that have become a tradition, or perhaps you are ready to try something new, either way, when your club has completed three service projects, your club has fulfilled the service requirement for the Club Excellence Award!

Remember the Centennial Service Challenge areas of youth, vision, hunger and the environment.

### 2. Donation to LCIF - Expand your club's humanitarian reach!

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) provides Lions clubs with an opportunity to make a global impact. Grants support both local and global humanitarian initiatives that are too large for individual clubs or districts to undertake themselves. A donation, large or small, fulfills the donation requirement for the Excellence Award.

District Governor Marvin is asking every club to make a donation to LCIF during the Parade of Green at the upcoming MidWinter Convention.

### 3. Membership Development - Have a net increase of one member!

Of course members are needed to support projects and events. To qualify for the Excellence Award, your club needs a net increase of only one member or to sponsor a new Lions club. Consider setting a membership goal and then making and carrying out your plan.

Be sure to induct your new members! The District has an updated Orientation program, (good for new and long serving Lions) that we are happy to share with your club. There are many Lions in the District who are willing to help you with membership recruiting ideas. We can build on the success of others.

### 4. Communication - Complete any of the following!

Keeping both your members and the public aware of your activities increases participation and visibility. There are many tools available to assist your club. Take advantage of any of these ideas, or develop your own strategies, to fulfill the requirement for the Excellence Award.

Establish a social media presence (Facebook, website, etc.). Download or develop brochures, business cards, club specific placemats or posters

### 5. Leadership Development - Proper elections, attend officer training and attend zone meetings!

To qualify for the award, all officer positions must be filled by qualified Lions in accordance with the constitution and by-laws. The club must also be represented during zone meetings and a majority of the club officers must have participated in a leadership training program. The training could include training offered at a zone, district, multiple district or International event, courses offered online from the Lions Learning Center, participation in a Club Quality Initiative Workshop or completion of the Certified Guiding Lion course.

Lions Learning Center – The online resource offers vital information for developing personal leadership skills. Topics include managing others, achieving results, and excellence in communication. These courses can be applied to the Leadership Development requirement for the Club Excellence Award. Officer training –The date for club officer training will be confirmed soon. Online officer training counts toward the award too!

Zone Meetings – Spring meeting dates are being set right now. Watch the newsletter and district website for more information.

Conventions – With the MidWinter and Multiple District both being held in Mankato, we have a great opportunity to attend. Conventions bring a new perspective from a broader range of Lions and add to the fun and fellowship that are natural to Lions.

### 6. Club Activity – The club must meet regularly and submit the membership report, service activity report, and club officer report for the incoming year.

Submitting these reports are easy thanks to the advancement of MyLCI. Utilize this advanced membership system to complete officer reports, membership reports and club activity reports.

### MD5M SECRETARY BOB HARMS TO RETIRE

Long time MD5M Executive Secretary Bob Harms has announced his retirement as of the end of the 2016-17 Lions year. Lion Bob joined the Kingston Lions Club in October of 1990 and has been an active member ever since.

He became initially involved as a secretary when he served as co-secretary (with PCC Deborah Harms) of the Minnesota Lions Eye Bank, Inc. which has since been renamed to the Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation.

Lion Bob became the Executive Secretary of MD5M in 2003 and has held that position ever since. He has set an example for others to follow. In addition to his mandated Secretary duties, he has gone above and beyond in serving Lions, willing to teach classes at the DGE training session and being a representative on the Board of Trustees of the Lion MD5M Hearing Foundation, Inc.

Always willing to give, in 2012 Lion Bob undertook an unparalleled fundraiser for the Hearing Foundation by riding a lawn mower the entire length of Minnesota, from the Canadian border to Iowa. As a recipient of a BAHA (Bone Anchored Hearing Aid) Lion Bob was generous in giving of his time to tell any Lion who asked how it worked and let them try it for themselves.

In reviewing the accomplishments of MD5M Lions, it is my sincere hope that Lion Bob enters the MD5M Hall of Fame due to his unrelenting service to Lions in general and MD5M in particular. I can think of no one more worthy.

### ALL LIONS OF MINNESOTA,

We have been asked for our help. As you know we now have the Volunteer Protection Act which allows us to help others without fear of a possible lawsuit. This law needs to be taken a little further.

In Ohio a Lions Club was holding a pancake fundraiser in an airport hangar. The owner of the hangar took it upon himself to offer free airplane rides to visually impaired persons, without the approval or endorsement of the club. This was nice, but the plane crashed killing 6 people. A judge has ruled that the club is responsible and must pay. They didn't have those kinds of funds and had to fold. Now LCI is being held responsible.

A bill is being introduced to prevent this from happening. Please contact your House representatives and your US Senators and let them know where we stand. ### 7. Club Maintains Good Standing

To fully participate in Lions activity, your club must be in good standing at the end of the fiscal year. To be in good standing the club cannot be in status quo and all International dues billings and new member entrance fees need to be paid in full. No more than US\$50 in any other expense due to LCI can be outstanding beyond ninety (90) days. To check your club's outstanding balance, go to online statements located on the LCI website. Instructions for making payments can also be found on-line.



### Next Step!

Finish the above steps to excellence and you have reached the goals of the Excellence Award! There of course is a form to fill out, have the District Governor sign and then submit to LCI to be received by August 31, 2016. Forms are available on the LCI website, and paper copies will be distributed at the Spring Zone Meetings.

### LIONS' PROJECT NEW HOPE OFFERS 'NEW HOPE' FOR OUR VETERANS AND FAMILIES

One of the newest projects undertaken by the Lions of District 5M-2 is titled Project New Hope. This project is very aptly named because that is exactly what the Lions are doing--offering New Hope to our veterans and their families by offering weekend retreats for them. Project New Hope is driven by this mission: to provide veterans and their families the education, training and skills necessary to manage their lives after wartime service.

Recent surveys have shown that up to 30% of the homeless people in Minnesota are Veterans! That is a crying shame and our State should not allow it! WE cannot allow it! That is why the Lions of Minnesota have stepped forward and are attempting to correct this situation. That is the mission of our Project New Hope.

Project New Hope was founded in 2007 by caring individuals who understand that for veterans and their families, wartime does not end the day that soldier comes home. The effects of serving our country in the military are often felt throughout a soldier's entire lifetime and can have an impact on each family member as well, often in ways that may be quite subtle or hidden from view.

Personnel (at Project New Hope) realize the process of healing and understanding is a vital component to life success after serving during wartime. Each family member will deal with what has happened in their own way. Returning soldiers face the challenge of transition from war footing to civilian home life. Often, it can seem as though they're in it alone, as though people expect them to pick up where they'd been, as though nothing had changed during their time away. Spouses may struggle with changes in the home, first with their soldier gone, and then to another set of changes after the return home. Children may lack the maturity to independently adjust to the absence of a parent, their subsequent return and the transitions which must take place. The goal of Project New Hope is to assist the veterans and their family members to understand, and to make, these adjustments.

No matter which era (or war) a soldier served in --- World War II, Korea, Vietnam, The Gulf War, Iraq, Afghanistan --- it does not matter at Project New Hope. All U.S. veterans and their families are welcome at Project New Hope. There is no charge associated with project New Hope retreats. Financial concerns will never prevent us from offering our services to soldiers and their families.

If you or someone you know has served our country in times of war, please join Project New Hope for a weekend retreat for the entire family. Come join other veterans and their families as we all continue on the journey. What happened before was beyond our control . . . what happens next is up to you, and Project New Hope is here to help.

Project New Hope is a most deserving project and the Lions of Minnesota ask for your help in supporting our returning combat veterans who have risked their lives on a daily basis for us here at home. Thanks to the support of Lions Clubs across 5M, Can Do Canines continues to train specially trained for people with disabilities and provide them to those in need, free of charge.

One recipient of a Can Do Canines assistance dog is 11

year-old Isaiah Kramer. Isaiah has been diagnosed with Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy, a degenerative muscle disease that affects every muscle in the body—legs, arms, lungs, heart, and more. Isaiah continues to physically decline, so he now depends on his wheelchair all the time.

Mobility Assist Dog Leo helps Isaiah by picking items that he drops, pulling off his socks and pushing buttons to open handicap doors in public. Below is a letter from Isaiah about how Leo has transformed his life.

I am writing to thank you and everyone at Can Do Canines for giving Leo to me. Having Leo has changed everything.

I feel safe at night because Leo is there. I sleep better with him next to me.

If I am sad, I can go to Leo and he looks really concerned for me. I can see it in his eyes. He always cheers me up because I can talk to him and he doesn't argue with me.

I felt so lonely before. Now Leo will snuggle up next to me, play with me and make me happy anytime. I don't feel as lonely anymore.






