Greetings:

Spring has arrived and it is time for new beginnings. We need to continue to grow our clubs so we can continue to do all of the good things that Lions like to do.

"5M2 receives the Lions International Award for Membership Growth! Membership is the number one priority in 5M2. Every member of this District has asked someone to become a new member and they have all accepted the invitation!" Now, I need to wake up from the dream and tell you the reality of the situation.

Membership NEEDS to be one of the priorities of a club. Each member does need to ask someone to join. Membership numbers showing positive growth would be wonderful to realize. Another area that I would like to touch on in this column is the difference between Administrative Accounts and Activities Accounts (some call it

General Account). Financing the activities of a Lions Club requires careful planning. A Lions Club has two major accounts. One for projects and one for administrative expenses. The Administrative Account is financed by the club members. The Activities Account is financed by fundraising projects with a broad base of community support. 100% of the net income from public fundraisers must be allocated for community service projects.

Public support is sought, and given, with the mutual understanding that funds raised from the public must be used for public benefit and for the specific purpose for which the public was asked to contribute if it was so advertised.

While it is permissible to transfer funds from the Administrative Account to the Activities Account, it is NOT permissible to transfer funds (or any percentage) from the Activities Account to the Administrative Account.

Nearly all clubs in the District are following the two fund rules. If your club has not set up this type of account system, it would be in the best interest of the club to get started on it. If any help is needed on this, please give me a call.

There are many lunches, brunches and other activities coming up in the next few months. Why not get out and patronize your fellow Lions and enjoy all of the good food that is out there. It is always fun to visit other club activities and other Lions. I know they appreciate it!

The Bird's The Word,

Retirement has been great; it affords me time for long walks in the sunshine and cold wind and observation of nature's promising signs of spring, the return of the Canadian geese being one.

So why is it geese and other large migratory birds fly in a V formation......because it is too hard to fly in an S position..... just kidding. Scientists who have studied V formation flight have shown the birds fly this way for two reasons.

First, it conserves their energy by allowing the birds to glide more often. Each bird flies slightly above the bird in front of him, resulting in a reduction of wind resistance and heart rate, compared to birds flying alone. The reduced air resistance of the V shape formation allows the geese to fly 71% further than if they flying alone.

The second benefit to the V formation is that it is easy to keep track of every bird in the group because of the unobstructed field of vision, allowing the flock members to see each other and communicate while in flight. The birds function more efficiently in a group working together.

The bird at the head of the V is working the hardest by being the first to break through the air resistance to flight, thus the bird leaves slightly smoother air behind for the other birds. The geese share the lead, as one tires, it drops back in the formation and another takes its place.

What can we learn from the geese? Humans, like geese were created to work together and to support one another. When we encourage each other and support our leaders we can accomplish amazing things. "Alone we can do so little: together we can do so much" Helen Keller.

How is the V formation working in your Lions Club? The most strenuous position in the V is the point. Are you willing to take your turn at accepting the leadership positions in your club? It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks; we do not want to "burn out" any Lion member. The geese share a common destination, which is understood by each. When a fresh goose rotates up to the leadership position, no time or energy is lost traveling in the wrong direction. July 1 new officers will take the point position in your club. We should respect and protect each other's set of skills, capabilities, talents and resources. Geese flying in formation "HONK" to encourage those in front to keep us the speed. As Lions, we need to

Sprint Point Project

Spring Point Project is producing a sufficient supply of pigs to serve as islet donors for diabetic patients ultimately leading to a cure for diabetes.

Founded in Minnesota in 2004, Spring Point Project was born out of a grassroots effort to help make porcine islet transplantation a viable solution for diabetes patients in particular, the tens of thousands of people with difficult to manage diabetes. Its nonprofit status brings stability and control over all aspects of the project, and fits with the goal of bringing unprecedented research data toward a clinical application in a speedy and cost-effective manner.


Pigs on the Move

Spring Point and the Lions are working together to prepare a Lions Club International Foundation grant to fund a dedicated Spring Point Project animal transport vehicle. In the past, we've contracted out their animal transport service. However, now that they are fully populated and working with the University of Minnesota to supply all of their ongoing studies (including the final preclinical study). The time has come to bring this capacity in-house. They are working with the Lions to fund a vehicle to safely and humanely transport their animals. The vehicle must be inspected and approved by an Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee. It must be able to be completely cleaned and disinfected. It must be temperature and humidity controlled with an air filtration system dedicated to animal transport. They are hoping to fund this addition in a timely manner and, at the same time, provide the Lions with recognition for our on going support.
