- Use Lions Club International videos that compliment your club's activities.
- Identify a speaker from the community who has benefited from one of your club's service projects.
- Secure either a senior or junior member of your club or district as your keynote speaker to talk for 10 to 15 minutes. You need someone who can energize and engage an audience with their service journey as a Lion.
- The club president (or designee) highlights club's accomplishments, meeting times, dues and extends an invitation to join.

- 5M2 has two Public Relations Displays available for events to highlight what Lions Clubs are all about. This can go a long way in selling Lions' impact!
- Make perspective members feel important. What are they passionate about?
- Someone should be at the door to collect membership applications and fees.

Our club held a successful event last year in conjunction with our 30th Anniversary, we had a great time and were able to recruit seven new Lions to our club. Don't think of it as a Membership Drive, it can be a lot of unnecessary pressure on club members. Remember, more members = more service. A well planned Membership Growth Event might be your club's key to finding those great folks in your community who want to get involved!

There's No Politics in Lions!

But Lions have been, and should be, involved in politics. Imagine the world without newborn hearing screenings. It was the MD5M Lions who were responsible for getting legislation requiring those hearing screenings enacted.

Occasionally, such as now, there occurs an issue that requires Lions to take action. Outside organizations are attempting to put Lions Gift of Sight, formerly known as the Minnesota Lions Eye Bank, out of business. This means that eyes donated in Minnesota will be shipped to the west coast and the valuable eye research done at the University of Minnesota in fields such as Macular Degeneration will be without valuable tissue.

The Council of Governors has added an Advocacy Coordinator position to help coordinate Lions efforts when needed throughout the Multiple. All directors in all supported foundations, from the Vision Foundation, Diabetes Foundation, Hearing Foundation, KidSight Foundation, Special Olympics and Canadian foundations need to be ready to be advocates for their respective activities to their legislative bodies.

But more than that, MD5M needs Lions who are willing to write their legislators, follow up and perhaps even attend hearings to show their support for issues affecting Lions and their programs. It would be wonderful if 30 or more Lions would volunteer to be Advocates besides those who are Foundation directors. Sample letters, talking points and prompt notice of hearings will all be provided.

If you can help, please email your name and email address to the address listed below so I may get in touch with you when needed. This doesn't occur often, but when it does, we need to be ready.



Tech Tips

Who Are You?

Protecting one's identity in the digital age can certainly be a challenge. Identity theft seems so pervasive and its consequences so tragic that we might be tempted to retreat to a safer time before all this online shopping, banking and whatever it is those millennials do these days. The truth is though, that unless you pick up your paper check at your employer, walk directly to the bank to cash it, then make all your purchases and payments in cash and in person, you are susceptible to loss. Oh wait, even then, you might have your pocket picked or lose your wallet on the way to the grocery store.

Understanding that we all like the conveniences afforded by using checks, credit cards (and Apple or Google Pay, Venmo, etc.?), and that we hate to write checks, lick envelopes, spend money on postage, etc. I would suggest that online shopping and banking can be just as safe (and probably a whole lot safer) than handing your credit card to the person at a store. Of course, if we want to support local business, like to hold merchandise in our hand before purchasing, or just like the social aspects of shopping, that's perfectly fine. I think we all live somewhere on that continuum from a real person to an online persona. Regardless, there are some simple precautions we all can take to minimize our risk of identity theft and resultant loss.

A word about Passwords:

We all know we should use strong passwords, have a different password for each website we use, and change them frequently. Really? How many of us actually do that? And how do we remember them? We know we're not supposed to write them down. The solution is to use a **Password Manager**. There are several very good ones available, some free, and some with charges for advanced features. Basically, a password manager is a web service that stores all your passwords and automatically fills them in on web pages you go to. You basically have to trust one website and remember one password, and the manager does the rest. I have used **LastPass** for many years. I use it to generate and remember complex passwords (such as h&Ejsc\$ziJhzUrc3o0kqLbXkrNZI2AvZyQ3#JSI3*HyrST!HEqf6Ro) for websites I use. I have one master password (it's 22 characters including numbers, capital and lower case letters and a special symbol. It's based on my first driver's license number and a simpler, shorter password that I use when I'm not so concerned with security, so it's easy for me to remember) that provides access to 180 passwords such as the one above. Now, even LastPass can be (and has been) the victim of a data breach, but I can change my master password then use it to change my other passwords, and it certainly minimizes my risks. Did you know that the robot only actually said that once in the three seasons of *Lost in Space*? Am I showing my age that I even use that phrase? (Maybe I just caught it on Netflix). These days, however, most credit card and banking sites will provide you with **Alerts. You have to sign up for Alerts. Do it!** I now receive an email any time any money is deducted from my checking account. I get a text message (most of the time before I leave the checkout line) any time any of my credit cards are used. **Discover has called me** to ask if I had just made a purchase in Rome, Italy (I had, and forgot to tell them I was travelling). I also get an email every month from **Discover** informing me that no dark web use has been made of my personal information. I have had fraudulent purchases made on my **Discover** and **Best Buy** cards and been alerted to them. Both companies immediately cancelled the charge, cancelled my account number, and sent me a new card. I got the **Discover** one the next day by **FedEx** (I must be a good customer). **Sign up for alerts from your bank and all your credit card companies!** (to be continued...)

Honestly, we suffered a bit of gloom and doom during the past eighteen months when SightLife and CorneaGen entered the Minnesota eyebanking market. Per Gift of Sight (our Lions Eye Bank) and the staff at the U of M Department of Ophthalmology and Neurosciences, we now smile a lot more. Working super diligently, Gift of Sight has been able to expand tissue collecting efforts into parts of North Dakota and Galveston, TX. We are now close to expansion into parts of Montana. We have much to be thankful for! Of course, we know that the nonprofit status of Gift of Sight and our 60-year relationship with them is everything to the best of individual eye care and expanded research.

This places us closer to our long term goal of establishing Lions Eye Institute in the Upper Midwest. Of course, the Surgery Center portion of this is already in place and our financial goal is being met. In 2016,

100 service cases were done at the Surgery Center; in 2018, 2,000 were done. Growth on campus! Another positive step is the inroads made with our Minnesota Legislature. Hopefully this will be the year when law is past limiting eye tissue donations so that they can never become part of a for-profit entity.

Meat of the matter. If not already, clubs will soon receive a letter signed by Lion Lyle Goff, Board Chair of MLVF. We hope all clubs are seriously planning donations at Parade of Green and even any other time. We have a 60 year legacy of pride and ownership in our eye bank and ownership in all aspects of the foundation. Maybe a bit extra green as an anniversary gift? All adding to your Helen Keller Tribute accounts.

Lions Christy and Mary are anxious to visit your clubs and share the passion of Lions' original mission. Plus we hope to see many of you at our fall zone meetings. Hearing Foundation News



The trustees for your Minnesota lions hearing Foundation have been busy with Zone meetings and Club visits. I have done 1 Zone meeting and one more is scheduled, 1 club meeting and 2 more club meetings

are scheduled.

Fall Foundation Board meeting was held on October 5 in St. Cloud, MN. At that meeting we approved \$107,000 for research projects at the University of Minnesota.

The Foundation has recently furnished hearing aids for an individual who could not afford them but really needed them. Money for these was in the form of credits from the Starkey Company for hearing aids the Lions collect and turn over to Starkey. The Starkey Company refurbishes these hearing aids and then distributes them to people in other countries, much like the eye glasses that are distributed. The hearing aids the gentleman got were brand new ones.

Lions, keep collecting those hearing aids. They change the lives of many people all over the world.

It is time for clubs to be thinking about the Mid Winter Convention in February. Your trustees to the MN Lions Hearing Foundation would like to challenge all of the Lions Clubs of 5M2 to participate in the Parade of Green. We would like 100% of the Clubs to donate. The money raised goes to help the U of M with Hearing research, new equipment and to improve facilities. Last year we were very close, as only a couple clubs did not donate.





Courtland Lions Club




