Welcome to the second century of Lionism! The 2017 Lions Clubs International Centennial Convention is now a piece of history and a new century of working together to improve the world is in process.

You are receiving this newsletter later than normal since I asked Lion Cindy to hold on completing the July newsletter until the completion of the convention in order to share with you not only photos of convention attendees and happenings, but also an update on the changes happening as we begin a new century. But before I update you on information from the convention, I need to apologize for an omission last month.

In the June newsletter, I thanked those Lions who assisted with Officer Training during the month of May. Any time you publicly thank more than a couple people, you run the risk of forgetting someone. Well - I forgot two very important Lions who helped make the Officer training a success. First, thank you to Lion Kevin Blank for assisting PDG Joan with a "mini" orientation to kick off Officer training. My second thank you goes out to Lion Charlette Abbas who assisted with a portion of the Zone chair training. As a Zone chair for 2016-2017, Lion Charlette took the challenge presented by Governor Steve and held a meeting of only the Presidents and Secretaries in Zone 4. The meeting was a huge success among the Zone 4 presidents and secretaries and I asked Lion Charlette to share information on the format for the Zone meeting with the incoming Zone Charis!

Which leads me to a major change I am instituting for the 2017 – 2018 Lions year. THERE WILL BE <u>NO</u> REGION MEETINGS DURING SEPTEMBER! Instead, I have asked the Zone chairs to hold a meeting with the Presidents and Secretaries only to discuss issues within their clubs or zone or the district in general. The goal is to build better communication between clubs, which may lead to more partnering on service projects. Watch for additional information in future editions of the newsletter.

During the convention, we heard about the new global service framework for LCI forward! Vision has been our focus since Helen Keller challenged the Lions to be Knights of the Blind in 1925. Vision will continue to be a focus in the global service framework but will now be one of five areas. The new areas will include diabetes, environment, hunger relief and pediatric cancer. Many of our clubs already do so much in the first three categories, which will make it easy to adapt to LCI's global service framework. The initial focus will be on Diabetes, a worldwide epidemic.

You are probably thinking two of the additional three areas look very much like the Centennial Service Challenge areas and you are correct. Environment and hunger relief will continue in the global service framework going forward. During the convention, two main speakers, former Vice President, Al Gore and former United Nations Secretary General, Ban Ki Moon, spoke on the importance of climate change and how Lion working together can make a difference. The Centennial Service Challenge also included a category of engaging our youth. While this will not continue as a global service framework, LCI is encouraging all Lions to involve youth at all aspects of our projects. Youth are our future and what better way and time than now to get them involved with us!

Another exciting new release at the convention was the MyLion digital application for your iPhone. The USA is one of the test areas for this new technology and convention goers were given the opportunity to download the app and receive instructions on using it. Additional information will be available at lionsclubs.org very shortly.

New and exciting things are happening at LCI as we move forward into the new century! Watch for additional updates in future newsletters!

#### A BLAST FROM THE (IMMEDIATE) PAST!

Lion Steve Wasserman Immediate Past District Governor It has truly been my honor to have served as your District Governor last year. It was a wonderful experience visiting your clubs, making

new friends, and most of all, learning about all the great projects our clubs are doing. I especially want to thank everyone for their understanding as I dealt with my health issues over the course of the year. I had my LAST chemo treatment on June 14, and am very much looking forward to feeling better on a more consistent basis.

They say the job isn't done until the paper work is in. As a District Governor, there is paperwork to do every month. Of course, there are newsletter articles due by the 15th of the month (I think I was on time one month). Expense Reports and Club Visitation Reports are due to Lions Clubs International by the 20th of the following month.

Perhaps your club has paperwork to finish up on as well:

• **Club Excellence Award:** As of June 27, 19 clubs in our district have had a net gain in membership, and would likely be eligible to receive a Club Excellence Award. So far, I have received 9

applications. I have until August 25 to submit your applications to LCI, but it would be nice to have everyone's in by August 1 at the latest.

- **100% Club Secretary Application:** So far, I have 11 applications for 100% Secretary. I know the deadline was June 15, but I will continue to accept applications for these until August 1 as well.
- Centennial Service Challenge: So far, 38 clubs have submitted reports on projects in all four areas of the challenge. LCI will allow club secretaries to file activity reports for the 2016-2017 Lions' year until July 15. As I write this there are 30 clubs who have not submitted June membership reports, so I assume there are as many who have not yet filed their activity reports. We had 45 clubs earn 4-Di-amond Patches last year, so it's still possible we can exceed that total this year. Remember, one LCIF donation can count in any category of your choosing, so if you are just short one area, use your LCIF donation to complete your four areas.

Thank you once again for all you did last year to build, celebrate, and enhance your club's "Legacy of Service". Please join me and "Reach For Your Dream" with District Governor Nancy during this new Lions Year!



#### District 5M-2 Governor's Goals District Governor Nancy Mathwig 2017 -2018

Leadership:

- 50% of the clubs not having a District orientation program during 2016-17 will have the program presented at a club meeting during 2017 - 2018.
- 100% of Presidents and Secretaries only in each Zone will attend the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter Zone meeting to discuss club issues as established by the Presidents and Secretaries present at the meeting.
- 70% of the club presidents and secretaries will attend new officer training by July 1, 2017.
- 90% of the clubs will invite at least three (3) District Program chairs to give presentations at a club meeting by June 30, 2018.

#### Membership:

- New members will add a total of 200 new members by June 30, 2018
- $_{\odot}$  New clubs will start 2 new Lions and/or Leo clubs by June 30, 2018.
- District Women's Membership will increase our women's membership to 28%.
- Retention membership drops will not exceed 180. Methods used to encourage retention: encourage exit surveys for those members leaving in good standing with dues current, club participation in district orientation with 60% of clubs developing an ongoing program of orientation for new members and use of the mentor program.

#### Service:

- Kidsight 90% of all clubs in 5M-2 will participate in Kidsight by either scheduling a Kidsight presentation, hosting a Kidsight screening or having a member become a certified screener.
- Public Relations To promote individual club service projects in our communities and beyond, 100% of the clubs in 5M-2 will utilize expanded PR during 2017-18 i.e. district newsletter, Facebook pages, local newspapers &/or radio stations, displays at community or county events.
- Promote the Power of We into our club members each and everyone. There is no "I" in team. We Serve!

Recognition:

- $\circ$  100% of the clubs in each Zone will nominate a club member for Zone Person of the Year and submit that nomination to 1<sup>st</sup> Vice District Governor Diana Kroells.
- 100% of the clubs will continue their Centennial Service Challenge projects and Legacy Projects through June 30, 2018 and be recognized for completion of them.
- $_{\odot}$   $\,$  80% of club Secretaries and 60% of clubs will receive Excellence Awards at year end.

### Centennial Service Challenge:

Lions worldwide served over 5,000,000 people again this month in our four Centennial Service Challenge Areas. We are now near the 160 million mark, and are on pace make it to almost 225 million by the end of our challenge on June 30, 2018. More than double the original goal!

**61 Clubs (92%)** in District 5M2 have now reported completing a project in at least one area. **38 Clubs (59%)** have now earned their 4-Diamond Centennial Service Banner Patch by reporting on projects in all four areas of the challenge. Last year, a total of 57 clubs earned a banner patch, including 45 clubs that earn a 4-Diamond Patch. Most importantly, we have served a total of **127,609 people this year, and a total of 350,768 in the first three years of the challenge!**

There is still time for your club to earn the recognition it deserves. You can edit this year's activities until July 15.

Remember: One donation to LCIF can be designated toward any area of the Centennial Service challenge each year.



#### West Carver Lions



In the very near future, the Lions will install a new white vinyl fence around the kiddie park — but first the old fence had to go!

Four Lions spent several hours tearing out the chain link fence, posts, rails, and timbers. Lions Joe Maidl and Dale Bjorklund furnished skid-steers to make the work easier and faster. Lion Andy Maidl used an impact wrench to remove many of the brackets and clamps and did the groundwork for pulling the posts. Andrew and fellow Lion Mark Dick did some of the manual lifting. The kiddie park improvement is being done in cooperation with the City of Lafayette as a Lion's Centennial Community Legacy Project. During this, the centennial year of Lions International, Lions clubs all over the world are connecting with their communities by completing Legacy Projects to improve their communities.

The Lafayette Lions have long maintained the Lafayette kiddie park, putting up the fence to keep the kids safe and purchasing and installing park equipment. With the fence needing work, it was decided to replace it as a continued legacy to the community.

In addition to refurbishing the fence, the Lions will also refurbish the Lions sign on the park.

Lafayette Lions Joe Maidl, Dale Bjorklund, Andrew Maidl, and Mark Dick made quick work of taking down the old fence around the kiddie park Monday, June 19. Joe and Dale first cut the wire ties that held the chain link fence to the top rails, then Andrew removed the brackets. Joe and Dale rolled up the old fence, then all four worked together to remove the posts and timbers.

A bench was dedicated to the memory of Harlan Wilkens, one of Plato's charter members.




