For me, it is thinking about new beginnings and planning for the transition from this Lions year to the next. We have a lot of momentum

going into growing our service. The more hands we have the more service we can do.

This last weekend our multiple came together at the MD5M Convention. It was a time to celebrate what we have accomplished, learning and identifying the work we have yet to do. It was a great honor to have our International President spend the weekend with us. Many of our district goals have been met, but we will still have to make progress in some areas. Growth is always top of mind. Our district has made great strides; however the dreaded June drops are coming. Has your club checked in with members you have not heard from in a while? Many times, our members just want to be asked to participate. The Jordan Jordaness Lions have a "social cat". This is an existing Lion who is assigned to a new member. The social cat helps educate the new Lion on what it means to be a Lion. They invite the new member to club meetings, service projects, zone meetings and check in with them periodically. This is a great way to make your club's new Lion feel welcome.

One of the goals set for us by Lions Club International (LCI) is how many new members to add. We are so close to reaching our goal, we need 13 more new Lions. All it takes is to ask someone to join our cause. We currently have a membership challenge taking place, anyone who sponsors a new Lion this year will be entered into a chance to win a \$100 gift card. The more Lions you sponsor the more chances you have to win.

There is one goal where we are falling short, individual donations to LCIF. Our goal is for 201 individual Lions in our district to donate to LCIF. This is less than 10% of our districts membership. If each Lion in our district donated \$10, this would equate to \$23,000. This is our foundation, and the money does come back to our district. This year

alone, we have had \sim \$200,000 in grants given to clubs in 5M-2. At the zone meetings, there will be raffles to raise money in individual donations to LCIF. You can donate online as well.

The last goal I will mention is starting a new club. Our district is going to start a Join Together Club with Camp Sweet Life. If you know anyone who would like to join this virtual club, please reach out to me. We are hoping to have it chartered no later than the end of May. This is a great opportunity for those who have a passion to fight diabetes to join a Lions club with that mission.

Kidsight: Enhancing Our Impact with New Technology and Club Involvement

As mentioned in our previous article, we are in the process of updating our Kidsight cameras. Our current cameras are eight years old and no longer eligible for warranty coverage. As with all technology, upgrades are necessary to improve efficiency and keep our program running smoothly.


At our last Zoom meeting, we were treated to an excellent demonstration of the new cameras by a representative from Plusoptix. The presenter did a fantastic job and answered all of our questions thoroughly.

Kidsight continues to grow, thanks to the efforts of several clubs successfully coordinating with schools, which has led to an increase in the number of vision screenings. It's important to remember that a screening is not a diagnostic test—it simply identifies potential visual issues and recommends that parents seek further evaluation if needed. Since 80% of learning is visual, early detection is crucial for a child's success in school.

To streamline the process of conducting school screenings, we recommend connecting with school nurses early and requesting that the vision screening consent form be included in the packet of forms sent to parents at the beginning of the school year. Ideally, this consent should be an "opt-out" format, so that the Lions Club does not need to collect individual permissions.

We are now recommending screenings for students in grades 6–8, as this is a critical time when vision may change due to puberty. Some clubs are also participating in kindergarten roundups in the spring—another great opportunity to get involved and ensure children's eyes are checked.

Once schools see how efficient and effective our process is, they are often eager to invite us back. Our friends in Canada have also been doing a tremendous job with screenings, and we're proud to see Kidsight becoming an international program. Our success continues to grow as more children are reached through our collective efforts.



Many clubs and individual Lions have contributed greatly to the program's success. A special shout-out to the Lions Clubs of Gibbon, Green Isle, Arlington, Lake Crystal, Glencoe, Le Center, Lonsdale, Montgomery, Faribault, Northfield, Norwood Young America, West Carver, and Prior Lake—your hard work has made a real difference. Apologies if we missed anyone—we know many more clubs are doing incredible work. Lions like Dick, Walt, Carroll, and Loretta have truly been Rock Stars for Kidsight. Thank you all!

Don't forget—we also have a tent available for summer screenings. It's currently housed at Lion Harry's.

We'll once again be offering screenings at the Minnesota State Fair. While the location will be different this year, we still plan to provide tickets for volunteers. More information will be shared after our Foundation meetings in May. Sign up here:

Leader Dog for the Blind is collaborating with advanced Ophthalmology elective Veterinary Medicine students from Michigan State College of Veterinary Medicine to deep dive into the world of eye care. Leader Dog for the Blind has invited these students to do routine eye exams in the breeding stock dogs. The students whom are choosing to participate have a keen interest in ophthalmology. In making this opportunity for hands on experience and it allows these students improve skills in examining eyes.

During the time students perform ophthalmology exams using a specialized lens and head-loop to get a clear look at the eye. This method allows them to observe the retina and other vital areas to identify potential vision issues.

They also use a slit lamp to examine the lens of the eye. This technique is able to detect cataracts and spot any other conditions they could affect the dog's ability to see properly, potentially impacting their ability to work as guide dogs.

You ask why do this? Eyes can change rapidly as we have observed in doing Kidsight Exams. If you think of your

personal health, eye exams are often part of our yearly healthcare routines. So, this essentially is fulfilling Helen Kellar's request to be Knights of the Blind, but in dogs. Leader Dog provides this exam for their dogs for their future clients to increased safety during the time of service of the dog. As humans age, eye exams are crucial as part of our annual eye exams. By examining the dogs in training, they are being proactive in any future potential eye problems. This gives Leader Dog for the Blind more confidence that their dogs are in top health and capable of producing healthy offspring. Leader Dog's Assistance Director of Canine Health and Reproduction Dr. McRae believes this program and cooperation with the Michigan State College will only grow providing an invaluable hands-on experience for the school's Veterinary students.

Special Olympics Minnesota Summer Games is at the University of Minnesota from June 20-22nd.

The university of Minnesota will host the annual Special Olympics Minnesota Summer Games! Roughly 3,000 athletes will be competing in basketball, basketball, swimming, and gymnastics throughout the weekend. Outside of competition, there will be entertainment in the athlete Village, health screenings for athletes, Celebration Ceremonies, and many other activities for everyone! Summer Games is open to the public and family friendly!

The Lions have played a major part in this competition for many years, and will once again host the Opening Eyes screening. As part of the Healthy Athletes program offerings, Opening Eyes provides a complete eye exam, conducted by eye doctors and eye care professionals. During the Opening Eyes screening, Athletes have the opportunity to receive new eye glasses, sunglasses or sports goggles, free of charge! Opening Eyes is presented by Lions Club International.

Opening Eyes in Minnesota was first undertaken by Lions Clubs of 5M5, but we need you to make this screening happen! Opening Eyes volunteers directly impact the health of SOMN Athletes! Volunteers will also have the opportunity to meet and interact with Special Olympics Minnesota Athletes, and also meet Lions from other clubs and other districts. 
