A Bright Future

Volunteers have changing expectations of what they want from volunteer service. Attracting volunteers (Lions) in today's word is hard work. There are no simple, standard answers for recruiting and retaining Lions. Membership retention is a primary goal of District Governor Eunice. As an organization we must look carefully at the factors affecting our ability to attract and keep members.

Attracting and cultivating new leadership and volunteers requires new approaches to how we do the work as well as new messages about the value of the work and the personal grow and development that comes with volunteer and leadership service. Many young volunteers are less interested in making a difference and more interested in the personal return on their investment, that is, "what's in it for me". Today's younger volunteers are attracted to the opportunity for skills building, career enhancement, network ing and professional/leadership development that comes from board and committee work.

Lions should be a safe, reassuring avenue to learn new skills. Young Lions have the ability to learn quickly on their own. They like access to resources so they can self educate.

Keep orientation and meeting materials brief and scannable. Engage Generation X Lions quickly and make them feel like insiders. Give them meaningful assignments, listen for their preferences and concerns, respect their skills and opinions, recognize their contributions and remember they are very good at multitasking.

Volunteering in Lions should be pleasurable and fun. Build in socializing and celebrations, have a meal or snack. To retain Generation X members it is ever more important to be mindful of the time and keep meetings on schedule and brief. Run tight, efficient meetings that respect the contribution of personal time. Have copies of all materials available. Make it easy for people to participate. Recognize individual contributions.

We need to help each Lion, no matter the generation, find personal satisfaction from volunteer service as a Lion.



Lions International Essay Contest Rules

This contest is open to students who are considered visually impaired according to their national guidelines and will be 11, 12 or 13 years of age on November 15, 2010.

Only a Lions club can sponsor the contest. The contest may be sponsored in a local school(s) or organized, sponsored youth group(s), or individuals may be sponsored as well. A Lioness club can sponsor the contest through its sponsoring Lions Club.

The contest theme is "Power of Peace".

Essays must be no longer than 500 words in length, submitted in English, type written in black and double-spaced.

Only one entry student per year and each entry must be the work of only one student.

Essay entries cannot have already been published

One grand prize winner will receive an award of \$5,000. The winner will be notified by June 1, 2011.

The postmark deadline for a club to send one winning essay to the District governor is February 15, 2011. Note: A participating club should notify its district governor in advance of sending an entry.
