

I think that setting goals and staying focused on them is important, but I also think that it is important that we "Celebrate The Journey!"

Everything You Need to Know About Reporting 2017-18 Club Officers

Fiscal year 2017-18 is quickly approaching! We are asking the clubs you represent to report their new officers as soon as they have been elected. Here's why this is important:

- New officers get early access to the MyLCI site beginning April 1.
- When clubs report their officers in MyLCI, the information is immediately available to your district and to international headquarters so no extra paperwork is necessary.
- The <u>Club Locator</u> on the Lions' website displays their new officers.
- Timely monthly reporting by the clubs in your district will provide up to date and accurate district/multiple district membership reports

How to report

- Reporting club officers is easy using MyLCI. Click video to view a short video demonstration.
- Clubs not using MyLCI can report officers using the <u>Club Officer Reporting Form</u>. Mailing instructions are included on the form.

Update other club information

We have let the clubs in your district know that this is also the ideal time to:

- Verify their new officers' contact information and mailing preferences.
- Confirm the club's meeting location, date and time.
- Update club members' contact information.

With new features added, clubs can now accomplish more in MyLCI

- International Convention voting delegates can now be assigned in MyLCI.
- International Convention Invitation (visa) Letters can be printed by club officers using MyLCI.

Centennial Service Challenge:

Lions worldwide served almost 5,000,000 people again this month in our four Centennial Service Challenge Areas. At this rate, we will make it to almost 225 million by the end of our challenge on June 30, 2018. More than double the original goal!

57 Clubs in District 5M2 have now reported in at least one area. We have served a total of **66,869 people.** We are now up to 47 Clubs (72%) that have reported projects in at least two areas of the challenge.



Club Secretaries: This would be a good time to check your records to make sure you haven't forgotten to report any projects, or have forgotten to check the appropriate box to get your project credited towards our Centennial Service Challenge.

Remember: One donation to LCIF can be designated toward any area of the Centennial Service challenge each year.



COMMUNITY GARDENS

According to the National Recreation and Parks Association there are more than 18,000 community gardens throughout the nation. Community gardens allow community members to grow food and friendships while planting, tending, and harvesting locally grown fruits and vegetables. These small community tended gardens grow respect for the environment within a community and aide in adding plant life to areas that are otherwise lacking in green space. Many community gardens distribute produce to food banks and other local organizations that can then take and distribute food to those in need.

HOW TO GET INVOLVED

Clubs can find local community gardens by volunteering time or funding. Find a local Minnesota community garden at https://www.gardeningmatters.org/find-garden

If you are in an area that does not have a community garden then you can also become involved by starting one as a club! Generally, a community garden can be arranged within a year. Gardening Matters (https://www.gardeningmatters.org/coordinate-garden/starting-community-garden) lists online guidelines to how to set up a garden. We have heard so many testimonials by Lions and others who travel to less developed countries delivering glasses to many who no longer have vision that could be correctable by eve wear. We are so fortunate to have Minnesota Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center right here in Sauk Rapids. What a great gift is provided by the dedicated Lions team there who sort glasses and then send them on to Rosholt, Wisconsin for final preparation on their way to other countries. Many of us have heard the Vision Honduras presentation given by PDG Orville Trettin and his crew.

Current figures are astounding. In August, 2016, MLERC delivered 83,000 pair of glasses to Rosholt. In March, 2017, the trip included 84,500

pair. Next trip will be this summer. Since its beginning a few years ago, MLERC has delivered 10,442,918 eyeglasses.

We are so grateful to clubs recycling. If ever you are in need of some new boxes and labels, give Lions Diana or Mary a shout. Also, remember that we can take your collections at any time of year, not just at Midwinter. We will deliver to MLERC in a timely fashion.

For over 50 years, Minnesota Lions have been a partner critical to the great reputation of the University's Department of Ophthalmology and we want to continue our legacy. CAN DO CANINES

Thanks to the support of Lions Clubs across 5M, Can Do Canines continues to train specially trained for people with disabilities and provide them to those in need, free of charge.

One recipient of a Can Do Canines assistance dog is Remington "Remy" Christoph. Remy now has a greater sense of freedom, independence and peace of mind since thanks to Autism Assist Dog Candy. Read their story below.



REMINGTON CHRISTOPH & AUTISM ASSIST DOG CANDY

Chocolate is often associated with candy, right? Well in this case, Candy is a type of chocolate that isn't edible. Candy is a lovable, outgoing, energetic two-year-old chocolate Labrador Retriever that has been paired with Remington (Remy) Christoph and his family from Victoria, Minn. Remy is a lovable, energetic seven-year-old who has autism. At an early age mom, dad and other family members noticed Remy's language skills were not developing as well as they should have and his lack of eye contact was concerning. His diagnosis sent his mom searching for a way to not only help Remy but their family as well!

An acquaintance of the Christoph's recommended Can Do Canines and suggested that they do some research to find out if a service dog would be helpful. After a three-year wait, almost to the day, the Christoph's met Candy!

As luck would have it, Candy is a perfect match for Remy! Both are high energy, love to be outside and chase after balls. Candy does not currently attend school with Remy but she does wait for him when he comes home. "Remy looks forward to coming home after school to see and take care of Candy," said his mom Nicole. "It's important for Remy to have household responsibilities just like his sister," she said. Remy is able to give Candy commands such as sit, wait, and go, so that she may eat. This simple activity enables Remy to use and develop his fine motor skills, improves his vocabulary and contributes to his sense of accomplishment.

Candy provides much more for the Christoph family than meets the eye. Candy has given them back their freedom. A trip to get milk at the store may seem like a simple task but a child with autism can become overwhelmed by stimulations and often times a meltdown results. With Candy tethered to Remy, she is able to keep him close to mom and dad and also provide a way to comfort him if he comes agitated when errands take just a little too long. They continue to find ways to be more active and look for activities they can do as a family with Candy.

Not only does Candy provide safety for Remy but she also helps refocus his energy. Twice a day, or more often if possible, Candy and Remy spend time throwing and chasing a ball. A little boy, a ball and a dog – a classic image of Americana! The experience Nicole says, "Has been amazing!" She has nothing but praise for the Puppy Raisers and those that cared for and trained Candy in the Prison Program. Waiting for three years to receive Candy was often challenging but the rewards are paying off daily now.

As Frankie Valli & The Four Seasons hit song, "Candy Girl" goes, "...been a-searching all this big wide world; Now I've finally found my candy girl...with huggin' and kissin' and lovin', she's mine, mine, mine!" The Christoph family and Remy have their very own Candy girl to hug, kiss and love for a very long time!


