History Revisited: MD5M Female District Governors

I was honored to be elected the first female district governor for 5M2! The election was exciting and a female district governor was something brand new for our district. Following the election, I was excited and also a little apprehensive – how will I be received by Lions in our district and those in MD5M; what about those governors that I will serve with; can I really "keep up" and face my first-graders every day; what about all that "paperwork". Lots of thoughts and questions!

Times have changed a lot since 1997-98! I met some of my fellow district governors as a vice district governor, but our first "official" meeting as a DGE group was in March for a short MD5M training prior to the Council of Governors Meeting. There were two other female governors in our group: Darcy Paxton (5M3) and Joyce Sauter (5M6). The male members of our group were wonderful and decided that we would be called "The First Co-ed Blue Team". There was NEVER a male/female DG – just a District Governor! We headed to Philadelphia for most of our training, really bonded as a group, sweat A LOT at the parade (always wore our uniform at every event), watched

the most spectacular fireworks right out of our hotel window on July 4th, and felt "ready to serve".

I was well received by the Lions Clubs in our district, had the BEST group of first-graders and a boss that would let me leave a "little" early if needed, a mailman that survived all the mail (no electronic reports), and a group of DG's that soon became "family". The year went by quickly and we have so many wonderful memories!!

I may have been the first, but I definitely was not the last! The number of female Lions elected as a District Governor continues to grow! As of today, District 5M2 has had 11 female governors! MD5M has welcomed 76 female governors in the last 25 years – pretty amazing! In addition, four have been elected to serve as Council Chair and one has served as an International Director.

I am sure that those being elected to the DG position are still excited and full of apprehension, but I know they will have the most amazing experience of a lifetime! I also know there are many, many more that will fill the position in the next 25 years!!!

What We Tried

Below is a list of things the Convention Committee tried new or did to help maintain costs.

- Sweet & Salty Table Secured donations to create a sweet and salty table instead of purchasing appetizers from the caterer.
- Program First year trying to sell ads to cover the cost of the programs. Ad sales exceeded the printing cost by \$1000.
- Dessert Individual cakes versus having caterer provide. Less than half the cost, received 10% discount on cakes and flowers.
- Purchased items which can be used in future years chargers, votives, tabletop flags, ornament holders and picture frames.
- Did not solicit items for goody bags.
- Did not produce a convention pin.
- Asked clubs to provide raffle baskets instead of door prizes. The money raised helped offset convention costs.
- A new band which provided a \$400 cost savings.
- Displayed all the Peace Poster winners, purchased poster boards to display them which can be reused in future years.

Considerations for 2023 – These are either from comments or lessons learned. Some of the items would add additional cost.

- Location of the convention. Does it stay in Mankato? Are there other facility options in Mankato?
- Mayo Event Center Utilize space on the second floor for speakers and business meeting. This would require individuals to relocate between floors. Thought was given to the time it would take to move about and the ease of doing so.
- Programs Number of programs printed was based on the number of registrations when the printing deadline was due. Consider
 increasing the number of programs printed based on 2022 registrations. QR code was provided at registration, this allows the
 schedule to be viewed on a smart phone. Consider posting a printed master schedule.
- Majority of the registrations come in late and/or after the deadline. This makes it difficult to plan meals, space requirements and printing needs. Committee's goal was to accommodate everyone the best we could.
- Cost of meals includes a 20% gratuity and taxes added by the caterer. Friday night meal should be lighter and lower cost.
- Celebration of Life There is not a requirement for club members to register to attend this event.
- Charging a registration fee helps spread the cost among all participants. Other districts upcharge the meals to cover convention costs. Some districts hold fundraisers throughout the year to help offset convention costs. All things to consider.
- Have coffee available all day, juice for breakfast and provide more meal choices for breakfast.
- Video the speakers to allow clubs to replay at meetings. This would require someone to be hired to do this.
- Print the convention rules in the Program.



Kelley's Story

(not her real name or photo)

Born deaf in her left ear, little Kelley went through numerous tests to figure out the cause of her hearing loss. Because she appeared to be otherwise healthy, her doctors suspected a genetic or structural issue was to blame.

But when Kelley also showed signs of a delay in her gross motor development at 2 months of age, a special education teacher who works with infants with hearing loss wondered whether **cytomegalovirus** (CMV) was instead responsible.

CMV is a herpes virus that most women of child-bearing age have already acquired. Pregnant women who are infected with CMV rarely have symptoms, but rather their developing baby may be at risk for congenital (meaning from birth) CMV disease. CMV Exposure in Pregnancy

Kelley's pediatrician thought CMV was unlikely to have caused her hearing loss. But her parents pushed to have her tested. At 10 months, through retrospective testing of a blood sample given at birth, they learned Kelley had been born with CMV.

Together, the physician and Kelley's parents decided to put Kelley on a yearlong course of antiviral medication in hopes of preserving the hearing in her right ear and minimizing the wrath of CMV on her developing body.

So far, 4-year-old Kelley is meeting developmental milestones and will be monitored closely as she grows. With the help of weekly speech therapy and regular audiology visits, Kelley has amassed a substantial vocabulary and is working hard on articulation. She loves chasing her 5-year-old sister around the house, helping in the kitchen, and singing "Let It Go" (from the movie "Frozen) at the top of her lungs.

Kelley gets on-going testing at the Lions Children's Hearing Clinic.



Jo Finds New Educational Cause Thanks to Hearing Assist Dog Gladys

January 12, 2022

A few decades ago in her early 20s, Jo was about to start a role of educating others when she first became aware of a disability. "I failed a hearing test for student teaching," she admits. Although she hadn't even realized her hearing was as bad as it was at that time, she continually lost more hearing and went "through every hearing aid that there was."

She then got a cochlear implant, but acknowledges she still misses sounds and parts of conversations, despite her best lip-reading efforts. Jo says, "I was withdrawing a lot socially because I wasn't sure that I was hearing things." She mentions that she always felt tense, wondering "Am I missing something?"

Beyond the social aspect, her lack of hearing also became a safety issue. "I was feeling unsafe in some situations because of my hearing," she notes. "I had several situations where I was in real danger because of the hearing." She describes one instance when she was taking a bath in a hotel room and the tub was leaking to the room below. As the hotel staff pounded on her door, she was unable to hear them. Luckily, no personal harm occurred, but realizing she needed help, Jo did some research and discovered Can Do Canines.

A wiggly, loving black Labrador Retriever named Gladys soon pounded on the door to Jo's heart. Gladys is not Jo's first canine love though. Jo has had dogs for much of her life and even showed them competitively for a while as an adult. In the 1990s, she owner-handled one dog to a status of fifth in the nation.

Gladys is quickly becoming a champion companion for Jo, who says, "I feel much safer. She makes me calmer and I don't have to stress about what I'm missing." With much less worry, Jo knows Gladys will always alert her to the sounds in their life because "she is listening for me." When they're out for walks and there's a noise that Jo doesn't hear, Gladys's body language will give Jo a cue to that change in their surroundings.

Feeling grateful for this extra set of ears, Jo hopes that others will be willing to lend an ear to her voice. She fervently states, "I want to be an ambassador for Can Do Canines." Now, engaging in this new form of teaching, she adds, "I have no problem telling people about my disability. I kind of feel like it's my role to kind of educate too, so I tell them about Can Do Canines, and what she does for me. I like that!"

Board Actions

In addition, we already decided to earmark half of our proceeds from the Brunch to the Childhood Cancer Foundation, which is part of the Parade of Green this year so we will be giving about the same amount as we did last year. 
