Painful news about Haiti's HOPE hospital, a recipient of support from MRUCC

You may remember an impactful presentation in June by Dr. Thony, the director of Hope hospital in Haiti. MRUCC provided funds for solar panels to power the facility's operations. A few weeks ago, a group of about 50 masked men surrounded the hospital and then half entered and roughed up the staff, ransacked offices and Dr. Thony's residence. Fortunately, Thony was tipped off before the raid and fled to Denver, where his brothers live. Four or five staff members were injured. The group threatened to return and threatened staff with their lives. HOPE has suspended operations to keep the staff safe and the hospital has remained closed since the raid.

HOPE is working to get a number of staff to safe havens either in Rochester or Florida or wherever they have family. HOPE has been in communication with the Ministry of Health who shares the sadness and dismay at what has been done but seems to be unable to undo it. HOPE is trying to figure out next steps if there are any. It is devastating for HOPE and the staff who have dedicated their lives for the past couple of decades to improving the lives of those in Borgne, Haiti. But most troubling, it is not clear how the people of Borgne will get healthcare and live in peace with the increased political violence.

Please keep HOPE and the Borgne community in your prayers.

Church Council

It was as I was leaving the upper church parking lot after a Monday night Spiritual Growth Group that I had a strange urge to park my car in the lower level parking lot and check the lower level doors. Our group hadn't met or parked on the lower level that evening and we were the sole occupants of the building that night yet something nagged at me. Well, that nagging sense was correct. The lower level doors were open and may have stayed that way until morning at minimum. My first encounter with a security need...

Fast forward to this summer: an after-worship visit from an individual who objected to our inclusive message of love and welcome to all, a broken window framing a sign portraying the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (cause unknown but disconcerting for many), a cyber hack message sent to congregants "from" Pastor Kelly asking for money/gift cards, and an emailed bomb threat targeting our Etz Chaim friends and our shared house of worship. Not to forget, the early spring incident of our rainbow Mountain Rise banner set on route 31 being dislodged and relocated a distance away from the church. More security encounters...

We are not alone in concern for safety. According to the UCC.org, these past few years, UCC local churches have been targeted by extremist groups and other groups and individuals that attack the churches' theological positions on anti-racism, the inclusion and affirmation of LBGTQIA+ people, and the churches' other justice ministries. "Preparing our church to protect itself from violence and harassment is good ministry," the UCC says on its website, "Time and attention spent on safeguarding the church's resources now may avoid damage to critical infrastructure, including people and property, that will disrupt the church's essential ministries."

As I continue to think about safeguarding our Mountain Rise family members I wonder about our "people preparedness". When was the last time you participated in a fire drill at Mountain Rise? As a 20+ year member, I can't recall one time. I look at our youngest worshippers and I know for a fact that if they attend public schools, they participate in not only fire drills but numerous other safety drills every year. As a public school teacher, my students and I participated in no less than 8 fire drills, 2 emergency exit bus drills, 2 "hold in place" drills, 2 "lockdown" drills, 1 evacuation drill (leave the school grounds), and 4 active shooter drills EACH year. Public schools have to examine and review their safety plans yearly. When was the last

time our church did the same? Better yet, what are our safety protocols here at Mountain Rise? Is there consistency among all of us using our building as to safety expectations and procedures?

At our September Council meeting we discussed Mountain Rise's safety and security vulnerabilities. As a result, Council approved the creation of an ad Hoc Safety and Security Team to conduct research and make long and short term recommendations for action. A team was formed and on Monday, September 25th, Averil Riley, Rod Walters, Pastor Kelly and I met for our first meeting (Doug Bloom was out of town but will be joining the team upon return). Plans are set in motion to work with Walt Hazelton, Property Chair, local law and fire resources, UCC resource people, as well as Federal Homeland Security resources. The team will also be reaching out to Perinton Nursery School and Etz Chaim to assist in completing a full safety and security review. Please do not hesitate to contact any of the Safety and Security Team members with your thoughts and concerns.

Here at Mountain Rise we fully embody the UCC's adage that "no matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here". Your Council is committed to the safety of our congregants, staff and pastor while making sure Mountain Rise acts on our religious belief about welcoming all, and creating a just world for all.

We enjoyed a simple lunch, an icebreaker activity, talked about safety (one being the need for 2 adults in the classroom- so if a teacher is in a pinch you might be approached on a Sunday morning to just be in the classroom)... and some basic teaching guidelines. It was also a chance to explore possible curriculum options (Seasons of the Spirit being the main one at this time). I also included the opportunity for us to speak about other resources, and ideas that could be brought to the classroom experience. It was a very productive and fun time together. Thank you to each of you who came, and I can't wait to see each of you bring your gifts each Sunday you are involved. FYI: The contributions that are shared each week during the children's moment are now supporting The Heifer International Project. The children picked out the farm animals (chickens, pigs, water buffalo, bees), as a part of helping deal with the issues involving hunger, poverty and the needed sustainable living in more than 125 countries around the world. Funds will be collected over time, and given to Heifer International as one larger contribution.
