with others, and to experience the joy of deepening relationships with other participants or helping others.

While some of our groups and committees are well known to most Mountain Risers, there are many others about which less is known, such as their purpose, how one becomes a member, what talents are utilized, how often they meet, etc.

So in this and future newsletters we will be placing in the spotlight various groups and activities that bring life, joy and creativity to Mountain Rise. In our newsletter this month we are spotlighting spiritual growth groups.

Spiritual Growth Groups

Spiritual Growth groups started about seven years ago, using the idea of covenant groups brought by Bill Holliday from his winter church in Florida. The current facilitators of the groups are Jack Heister and Rick Watkins. There are currently three groups, but we look forward to more groups forming.

The Spiritual Growth groups provide participants with a warm and safe place to share life experiences and talk about the most important aspects in the living of life. Each group decides how they will conduct their group. Typically, a group:

- 1. Numbers about 8-10 (not too large)
- 2. Meets monthly
- 3. Meets for about two hours (important to keep time frame)
- 4. Maintains ground rules of confidentiality, not interrupting, and taking turns
- 5. Has an agenda
 - a. All share experiences and concerns from the past month (~30 min)
 - b. Discuss a program topic (~1 hr)
 - c. Begin and/or end the meeting with a ritual, a prayer or a thought

Where and when a group meets, whether they have refreshments, and topics for discussion are decided by each group.

The essence of each group is in the sharing of each person's life experiences and faith on a given topic for the evening. Each individual in a group shares what they are comfortable sharing with the group. Greater understanding, closer relationships, and joy arise from the listening and sharing.



Last year during a few email exchanges at Christmas time, I learned a little bit about his wife's work to start a non-profit organization called Asociacion LIDERA . David's wife, Evelyn Cantor, has been working for three years to start a school for young children. Recently Evelyn and I have exchanged a few emails. With the help of Google Translate I was excited to learn about the new organization.

Evelyn wrote "I want to share with you about Asociacion LIDERA. For 3 years I have been interested in starting a school for children in our community. I want to help children with education to boost early stimulation, early development of reading and writing, and improvement of mathematical reasoning skills. I want to create a space to introduce them to art, leadership, English, and entrepreneurship from the early childhood stages."


Asociacion LIDERA will use space at *Viviendo en Amor y Fe* and pay rent to the church.

Immigration

Most American citizens are the progeny of immigrants, so immigration has long been part of our country's history and ongoing conversation. In the past few years, there has been a dramatic surge in the numbers of people trying to cross at our southern border, and this reality has resulted in diverse suggestions and solutions for addressing the problem.

Title 42, which was implemented in March of 2020 by the Trump administration, was actually from a law that dated back to 1944. According to Deepa Shivaram of NPR, this public health order was implemented in order to counter the spread of communicable diseases. With the spread of Covid-19, the 78-year-old law was reapplied to our most recent health threat. According to Shivaram, however, it was never "imagined to operate as central to the debate over immigration and asylum law" (3).

As of 11:59 PM, May 11, 2023, Title 42 is no longer the law. Title 8 is now the controlling mechanism to process and remove migrants who do not meet the criteria for crossing legally. "On April 27, 2023 the US Department of State (State) and US Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced sweeping new measures to further reduce unlawful migration across the Western Hemisphere, significantly expand pathways for protection, and facilitate the safe, orderly and human processing of migrants" (Fact Sheet: State and DHS, 1). This initiative attempts to manage the flow of migrants by requiring the migrants to use legal avenues if they wish to enter the US. If they don't abide by these new terms, they will be flown back to their country of origin and denied reentry for at least five years.

The government fact sheet to which I'm referring actually organizes its discussion of measures to be used into three categories: Imposing Stiffer Consequences for Failing to Use Lawful Pathways, Humanely Managing Migration Flows with Regional Partners, and Facilitating Safe, Orderly, and Humane Processing of Migrants. It is from the second of these that I am elaborating on in the following paragraph. These are merely highlights; please consult the short article in its entirety by following the link at the end of this article.

Several countries are working together to set up regional processing centers (RPCs) where migrants can legally sign up for asylum by phone (2). In addition, an aggressive campaign targeting criminal networks was implemented on April 20, 2023 by Panama, Columbia, (in South America) and the US. The campaign is focused on "disrupting criminal networks that encourage the illegal movement of people. Smugglers use disinformation to profit off vulnerable migrants. To combat this tactic, the three countries cited above are collaborating to broadcast accurate information (Ibid). Thirdly, the program increases the number of flights for people who need to be returned to their home base because they did not meet the terms for migrating. Finally, Title 8 intends to combat the misinformation of smugglers and to encourage all government officials not to contribute to misinformation tactics (lbid). Migrants are encouraged to use one or several of the eleven pathways to migration as described in this document.

The challenges to providing humane, compassionate treatment are real. The question for us remains: How can we help?
