Horse: A Novel is May Book Group Choice

The Mountain Rise book group will meet on Zoom on Tuesday, **May 16 at 7:30 pm** to discuss *Horse*, an historical novel by Geraldine Brooks. Its central story, about the great race horse Lexington, is set in the precivil War and Civil War South. It is a story of race: the whites who own the horse, and the young black slave who trains him to become the greatest race horse of all time. The book is also set in the present day: at the Smithsonian Museum of Natural History, a young woman scientist accurately articulates the bones of Lexington's skeleton. Outside work she forms a friendship with a Nigerian art history graduate student. Their story is also shaped by the story of race in the United States today.

New Signage Planned for MRUCC on Rt. 31

Plans are in the works to place a new Mountain Rise UCC sign on Rt. 31. The sign will be surrounded by a colorful pollinator garden and placed a short distance east of where the trees that for years have held our church's banners. The design will include sections that can be swapped in and out to advertise our Jazz, Easter, Christmas and outdoor worship services as well as the names and logos of Etz Chaim and Perinton Nursery School.

Renderings of the sign and garden will be on the kiosk in the welcome area in mid to late May for everyone's perusal. A generous grant from the estate of **Julie Francis** is helping make this project possible.

A variance from the Town of Perinton will be necessary to place the new sign close enough to Rt. 31 to be visible to traffic traveling east and west. If you haven't done so, please take a look at the incredible work done by several people to clear out dead trees and brush to make the church building much more visible from Rt. 31. Thank you to all who participated; this is a huge gift.

The current sign on the corner of Mountain Rise and Rt. 31 has served us well, but is in pretty rough shape. Additionally, the sign is only slightly visible from the east. Many a guest has mentioned they have driven by the church 2 or 3 times before finding it. We look forward to letting more people know where MRUCC is housed and welcome them to join us.

Happy Spring, Mountain Rise friends!

A quick walk outside reinforces that the natural world around us is waking up and sharing the beauty of its growing season. Mountain Rise continues to grow as well. Specifically, I am thrilled to share with you the Endowment Fund grant allocations and the MRUCC Transition Team members that will guide our interim ministry work with Pastor Kelly.

Council is pleased to announce the allocations for the Endowment Fund distribution this year. We accepted four grant applications and recommended a fifth one be funded using monies already in the 2023 budget. The total amount awarded to date is \$18,792. Here are the four projects that will be funded:

Caring Ministry Committee / Stephen Ministry- \$ 1,687 *

Funding was actually part of the Endowment Fund distribution from 2022*; Caring Ministry asked for an extension on their 2022 grant which will support the participation of one layperson from Mountain Rise in the Bridge Leader's Training Course required to become a Stephen Leader. Adding another Stephen Leader will strengthen our Stephen Ministry program so that we can continue to provide confidential one-on-one caring support to individuals going through a difficult time by providing a sustained weekly compassionate relationship for as long as needed.

Service & Advocacy Ministry Committee- \$5,000

Funding will be used to support the "Sobriety Sounds Inc. Community Workshop Supplies" project. This project supports a creative approach through music to provide a healing space and opportunity for those in our community with addictions. Scott Fitzgerald is the Director of Communication for the organization.

Service & Advocacy Ministry Committee- \$12, 292

Funding will be used to support the "Solar for a more sustainable and resilient ASB hospital in Borgne, Haiti" project. This grant will help to support the installation of solar systems at the HOPE-ASB hospital to reduce energy costs and environmental impact in a rural community in Haiti.

Universal Justice Committee- \$1,500

Funding will be used as a one-time donation to the "Perinton Ambulance Funding" project. This donation will support the Perinton Ambulance 2023 budget.

Property Committee

A grant request was made to fund church roof repairs. Council decided that there are currently sufficient funds (\$38,791) in the Capital Reserve Restricted Funds that can be used for repairs at this time. If such a time arises that the current amount in the Capital Reserve Restricted Funds does not cover needed expenses, Council will be contacted.

There are still Endowment Grant Funds available for distribution this year. Committee Chairs are encouraged to apply again if there is a creative idea for Mountain Rise to foster better connections and community. Council will share more information with these chairs in May.

A month ago Council looked to the congregation to suggest names of people who might best serve on a Transition Team for Mountain Rise. Council received thirty-one responses to our request! Thank you to all who took the time to nominate a person(s) for this extremely valuable team. This team, with the guidance of Pastor Kelly, will lead our community of faith through a process of self-study, discernment, and visioning to rekindle our call to mission. Service and Advocacy For Justice and Peace

Committee for Universal Justice

"This can't be the right place."

"I think it is."

"But I can't drop you off here."

"Jim, it's fine. You go on home."

"But I hear our mother's voice in my head right now. I'd at least better walk you to the door."

That was the parting conversation that my brother and I had as he dropped me off at the Welcome Center in Phoenix, Arizona, a place where migrants who had recently crossed the border stopped for their first taste of American hospitality. Sponsored by the International Rescue Committee (IRC), asylum-seekers are provided food, medicine, legal assistance, shelter, showers, and clean clothing. Many of them arrive having had their personal belongings confiscated by ICE officials at the border; some have been detained for two or three weeks. All are weary.

Four to five buses (approximately 150-200 migrants) arrive daily in Phoenix. Many are fleeing unimaginable violence, and many are traveling with small children. Most do not speak English. Contrary to popular opinion, however, these folks have host families who are expecting them. The somewhat dilapidated structure that concerned my brother is actually an abandoned elementary school that has been organized to provide a safe place for the travelers to rest before resuming their journey. Though most come from Latin American countries, many who departed the buses when I was there came from Russia, China, and other countries where personal freedoms are denied.

IRC relies on local churches and humanitarian organizations to do most of the work. These volunteers come, primarily, from First Church UCC, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints, Salvation Army, Refugee Aid, a local synagogue and other government and charitable organizations.

Though the Heister's and I visited at different times, our experiences were similar. Yes, we were appalled at the treatment the migrants received at the border, and the fatigue and anxiety of the travelers was very apparent, but so was their joy. I worked at the women's shower stalls, and I will never forget the relief experienced by the young women, especially, when they exited the shower room and were able to indulge in body lotions, deodorants, hair products, and toothpaste. We used a great deal of sign language, of course, but nothing spoke as loudly as their sighs and smiles and hugs.

Finally, I can't begin to tell you enough about the UCC church where the three of us worshipped. I do not know which is greater...their commitment to service or their joy. This diverse congregation celebrates on Sunday as passionately as they serve the community on the other days of the week. Pastor Susan's messages remind her people of the joys and costs of discipleship. And the music? Phenomenal.

The Service and Advocacy Committee has allocated funds for this mission through your support of the church's current budget. The Team for Universal Justice is excited to share this news. We would also like to thank one of our own – Jim Mietz – for calling our attention to this plight at the southern border and for urging us to act on our own disbelief, to respond. As a sign on the lawn of First Church reads: "Jesus didn't reject anyone; neither do we."

In closing, I would like to share a prayer of blessing recited on the Sunday I attended their service: "As you leave this place, may God bless you with seeking. Seek out the hungry. Seek the weary. Seek the good in every person you pass. Seek out the hopeful. Seek the faithful. Seek God in each of us. As you seek and as you wonder, may you find what you are looking for. In the name of our loving God, who is always seeking us, go now in peace. Amen"
