Gold Award Project: Mural Madness: How Art Can End the Alienation of Minorities

Lillian's Girl Scout Gold Award, "Mural Madness: How Art Can End the Alienation of Minorities," brought diversity education to YMCA summer camps throughout the greater Pittsburgh area. Working with a diversity expert from the Children's Museum of Pittsburgh, she researched the proper language and methodology to teach empathy and the importance of representation while still acknowledging her own privilege.
